UNIVERSITY VILLAGE TO FOLD AT END OF SEMESTER

University Village will be closed as living quarters for UCSB students this semester, Miss Velma Morrell, housing director, announced this week. Only buildings 92, 93 and 94 will be available to men students, without board.

A sharp drop in enrollment at the Village this semester, coupled with increased rooming and boarding facilities in town, was responsible for the decision taken recently by the college dormitory committee. Village residents were notified of the action in a letter sent out last week.

Now More Non-Vets

The Village was opened in September, 1946, to accommodate the influx of veteran men and women at UCSB. As other housing became available, non-veteran Gauchos were given permission to live there. At the present time, the number of non-vets exceeds the veterans.

Residence in the three buildings remaining open will be limited to veteran men. Either single room or ward type accommodations will be available, and the moderate cost will not include board.

Applications Due

Students ineligible to live at the Village next semester should contact Miss Morrell at the Housing Office on the Riviera campus. Applications for next semester's housing should be made by April 15.

Veteran men desiring to live in one of the three buildings at University Village should apply at the office of the Dean of Men.

Roadrunner Hopfuls To Be Notified

Enthusiastic over the returns from this week's tryouts, the '48 Road Runner Committee has announced that acceptance of talent for the forthcoming show will be made thru the mail boxes sometime next week.

All those accepted will be required to attend the first rehearsal, which will be a general orientation to the theme and fast pace of the show. Rehearsals thereafter will be scheduled to accommodate participants, and to polish individual acts and skits separately before an entire group rehearsal is staged.

Muncy Replies to Phone, Fag Inquiry; More Data Sought

J. A. D. Muncy, business manager, stated in a letter to Student Council Tuesday night that the phone and cigarette concessions on campus cannot be transferred to ASSB because it is the policy of the administration to allow the student body to operate services such as these only "when the facilities are installed in student operated buildings."

The letter was in reply to an inquiry Council addressed to him two weeks ago regarding the transfer, which would put commissions from the concessions into the Associated Students.

Council Dissatisfied

Several members of Council expressed dissatisfaction with Muncy's reply, pointing out the inconsistency of the coke and cigarette machines, both in the cafeteria lobby, being operated by Associated Students and the business office respectively. The question was also raised whether the pay phone in the Administration building, until recently an ASSB concession, was located in a "student operated building."

Table Discussion

The matter was tabled pending further investigation by ASSB president George Graves.

Graves declared that, in the event any concessions machines fail to deliver, refund may be obtained from Mr. Harold Cole in the bookstore, in the case of the shoeshine machines in the men's lavatories, and from Miss Spike in the cafeteria office in the case of cigarette machines.

ASSB PREXY SENDS SHARP REPLY TO BRUIN ARTICLE

In a letter to the editor of the UCLA Daily Bruin this week, George Graves, Associated Students president, sharply refuted statements made by Richard Hill, Bruin city editor, in an article about the Gaucho campus, in which he asserted that UCSB's student constitution is "pre-Magna Carta," its Council "self-perpetuating, its student body "apathetic" and its newspaper "throttled."

Declaring that Hill's article "utterly avoids facts with few exceptions," Graves pointed out that there are 54 recognized organizations on campus, not just the "fraternities, sororities, departmental groups — and the Five-Footers" Hill had mentioned.

Regarding the turnover in *El Gaucho* editors, the president

Uclan Hill Describes Goleta Speculation

The current speculation on the Gaucho campus concerning the future status of UCSB if the University acquires the former air station at Goleta as a "ninth" campus was the subject of a second article in the UCLA Daily Bruin by Dick Hill, Bruin city editor who visited here recently on a tour of Cal campuses. Hill's first story, describing UCSB as "plagued with student apathy and an outdated student body constitution," stirred much comment here.

Burning Question

Declaring it "a burning question," Hill discussed the various viewpoints of liberal and applied arts students towards the prospective Goleta campus, and ended: "Where will the UCSB sophomore be going to school two semesters hence? If President Sproul knows, he isn't saying. And in the meantime, campus atmosphere reflects something of the uncertainty."

COUNCIL CONSIDERS ESTABLISHMENT OF STUDENT BODY COUNCIL OF ARTS

The possibility of establishing a Gaucho division of the Council of Arts to work with the main organization in Santa Barbara was suggested to Student Council last Tuesday night by H. Klyne Headley, associate professor of music and temporary chairman of the C of A.

Describing the Council of Arts as a "sociological experiment" designed to spread to every level of society the idea that the cultural life of a community need not "just happen," but can be planned, Headley told the Student Council that over 50 Santa Barbara cultural organizations have already joined the C of A. They include such representative groups as the schools and churches, radio stations, newspapers, women's clubs, Art Museum and library and the various dance and music clubs.

ASSB ELECTIONS DUE; FILING OPENS TUESDAY

The 1948 student body election machinery will start rolling next Tuesday, April 6, opening day for the filing of candidates' names and the securing of petitions. Elections will be held on May 5.

Qualified Gauchos may file for president, vice-president, secretary and head yell leader of Associated Students, all to be elected by a vote of the entire student body; two Student Council class representatives, one man and one woman, from next year's Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes.

To qualify for the ASSB offices, except yell leader, candidates must be upper classmen, regularly enrolled, during their term of office, and must have been in regular attendance at UCSB, with a grade average of C or better, for at least one semester prior to their nomination. The yell leader must meet all these requirements except that he need not be an upper classman.

Class Rep Qualifications

Class representatives must also be regularly enrolled with a minimum C average in all work, and must have attended here since last fall at least.

All candidates must have filed

their names with the Graduate Manager by April 20, and must be prepared to pass a test on the ASSB constitution, to be given by the elections committee, Al Rasmussen, chairman, on April 27.

250 Names

In the meantime, each candidate will circulate a petition for student signatures, and should turn in his petition by the day before the May 4 Election Assembly, with 250 signatures.

Campaigning will officially begin on April 20, the deadline for announcing intention to run.

Name Administrator For Architectural Development of UCSB

An administrator has been named to coordinate architectural development of UCSB, University officials announced this week. He is Robert Floyd, a member of the University's architectural staff.

The Board of Regents originally created the post of architectural administrator with the development of the Mesa campus in mind. It is now more likely that he will direct remodeling and building at the prospective campus on the Goleta mesa, provided University attempts to acquire the property from the War Assets Administration are successful.

Floyd is expected to establish an office on the Quad in two or three weeks, as soon as he finds living quarters for his family. He will work with the supervising architect of UCSB, Windsor Soule.

Sundeck, 4-Bit Lunch, SnackBar Featured In Cafe Changes

Starting Monday there will be some radical changes made in UCSB eating habits.

The first of these will be the reopening of the roof garden, which will remain open for the rest of the semester. Two types of service, a la carte and Gaucho special luncheon, are to be featured in the cafe beginning next week. The Gaucho special will include soup, choice of entree, two vegetables, bread, butter and a drink for 50c. On this meal, milk will be 5c extra.

Sketches are now being made and plans drawn up for an outside snack bar, to be situated on the Ebbetts Hall lawn behind the Graduate Manager's office. Milk, coffee, sandwiches, hamburgers, and doughnuts will be served from nine to three. It is expected that the snackstand will open for business in three weeks.

Tri-Beta Field Trip To Study Island's Plant, Animal Life

A three-day field trip to Santa Cruz Island off the coast of Santa Barbara is planned for some 25 members of Beta Beta Beta, honorary fraternity of biology students. The group will leave on April 9 to study plant and animal life on the virtually uninhabited island off the coast.

Of particular interest in the island's flora and fauna is the ironwood tree, which is apparently native to Santa Cruz but has been transplanted here to become the "official" tree of Santa Barbara. Gaucho Robert Kallman of BBB has been making a special study of the plant.

Besides harboring numerous bald eagles, which are rare on the mainland, the island is the home of a small fox which is found nowhere else in this country.

Dr. Barbara Blanchard and Dr. Karl Grossenbacher will accompany the group.

Fencers Journey to L.A. For Practice Bout

The Santa Barbara College fencing team will journey to Los Angeles, Saturday, to meet Faulkner's Studio for the first match of the season, it was announced today by Coach Nick Carter.
