We are inclined to feel that our State college should be "widowless" if the views of the "College Widow" are to be taken seriously; for, in the first place, she says that "Hooten-Anny is lacking in college spirit," because the latter objects to the hideous and unbecoming tam o' shanters infilieted on the Freshmen, and, secondly, a real "college widow" should be smart and chic and have more than a mere provincial taste in clothes. This sort of small town hazing reminds the writer too much of a little "one-horse" college in a town in Ohio where he once visited. 


