BRITAIN BACKING ITALY

Rumors of a secret British report on Ethiopia, which contends that Italian control over Ethiopia might be of aid to the country and also British territory, was the subject of much discussion among diplomats yesterday. The report stated that the English government would make for territorial control over Lake Tana, a corridor linking Egypt with the Sudan region. The statement also pointed out that in case Ethiopia was controlled by Italy, assurance must be given that the open door policy will be continued.

When Japanese authorities in Manchoukuo proposed the establishment of a mixed commission to settle the frontier borders between Russia and Manchoukuo, Russian officials refused to enter into any discussion. They also said it would be to the best interests of all concerned if Japanese military authorities would withdraw white Russians who are being used as spies in Soviet territory.

Miss Severy checks credits for great and small, transfers and freshmen, and keeps these records up-to-date. From this energetic teacher, a student receives his "unit status" or just how he "stacks up."

Almost any Thursday night, when the legislative council meets, Miss

Severy will be there in the capacity of President Clarence Phelps' representative to the student body.

As chairman of the program committee, she draws up plans for the student "laundry sheets," involving the schedule of all classes for the school year. After thinking this over, students will probably do less quibbling over the small charge of ten cents made for each program. When exam week rolls along Miss Severy starts it rolling with a well-executed test schedule.

In her extra time she teaches classes in inorganic, organic, food, physiological and textile chemistry. Kaime Offers Bureau Plans for Publicity

Public Relations Bureau Is Outlined; Further Study Is Suggested

Finance Board to Consider Band and Baseball Allotments

Details of a plan for founding a Public Relations bureau on the campus were announced before the student legislative council meeting last night by Dick Kaime, formerly associated with the Santa Barbara Daily News. The function of the bureau, according to Kaime, would be to publicize campus organizations. Press releases, radio programs and other forms of advertising would be employed by the bureau for accomplishing its purpose.

Council Considers Matter

The council will be given a week to consider the advisability of referring this matter to the finance committee. A special meeting of the group will probably be called next Thursday to act upon Kaime's plan.

One recommendation of the three offered by the finance committee was voted upon. The council approved the motion that budgets will be due March 23 from all organizations allotted student body appropriations. Groups failing to comply with this ruling will be penalized a five percent reduction of funds. Lyman Goldsmith, chairman of the finance committee presented the recommendation.

Council members agreed that the chairman of each organization receiving student body money must file a complete financial statement with Fred Alfred, controller, every month. This ruling was accepted to keep groups within their budget allotments.

Band Asks Monetary Aid

Concerning the recommendation of the welfare council to appropriate old class funds to cover the losses incurred by the band in its trip to Occidental last Fall, the council suggested that the president of the alumni be consulted to determine what possible action might be forthcoming and also to acquaint the alumni association with the fact that money is available.

Student Controller Announces Sale of New Sport Tickets

For the first time in the history of Santa Barbara State college season tickets for baseball and track will be sold to the Gaucho fans. The purpose of the advance sale is to relieve the burden of the annual loss which these sports load on the Associated Student reserve fund.

The price of the season tickets will be one dollar for the baseball games and fifty cents for the track meets. The large number of home games and meets makes the average cost to the spectator of each baseball game less than five cents and the track meets less than 25 cents each.

The proposed ticket sales cover all of the local service clubs and townspeople that are interested.

Herman Keane Talks to School Assembly

Through the cooperation of the art department of Santa Barbara State college, Mr. Herman Keane, professional lion hunter and speaker, has been secured to talk at a special assembly Tuesday morning, second hour. The lecture is to be illustrated by moving pictures.

Mr. Keane is well known in Santa Barbara and Santa Paula for his talks on wild animals. An admission fee of ten cents will be charged. Tickets are on sale by members of the art department.

Express Your Views

In last night's student legislative council meeting was presented a plan, which will in future years be considered the awakening of the Santa Barbara State college. Through the proposed publicity department, future students, other colleges and universities, cities, towns and all others "out on the pampas" will become aware of the presence of Santa Barbara State.

That we have something to offer to the youth and adults at large within our scope is an acknowledged fact to us, but to relay it to the waiting, oft-times yearning, ears of those who can make use of advantages offered by our college has been in past years an insurmountable obstacle both financially and a lack of someone to handle the position. In the originator of the present plan, Dick Kaime, we have a man who is interested in State, having attended here in earlier years; a man who has full time to give to the job; a man who has contact locally that a student or outsider would have to cultivate, thus losing time; a man whose previous experience, having been associated with a local newspaper, and also having handled football publicity at State for the last two years, will undoubtedly stand us in good stead.

Tentatively we have found a means of supplying half the deficiency which heretofore we have suffered. Small details in the qualifications of Mr. Kaime are not totally acceptable. However, the advantages to be gained for the institution and student body so favorably smother the disadvantages that failure to progress with the plan would surely be our own undoing.

The second part of our former seemingly insurmountable obstacle was the financing of such a bureau or department. As presented nearly a year ago, the proposal of a public relations bureau demanded no such great outlay of expense. The present proposition demands an amount of finances which to all appearances, will be impossible to acquire. However, in view of the fact that Mr. Kaime has offered to work the remainder of this semester on an experimental basis, with his salary and expenses coming from funds derived from his own promotion and in increase to be derived from the surpluses created by his own promotion. We agree that the instigation of such an organ on State college campus is essential to the future growth of our institution.

We favor the proposed plan with few exceptions, the principal one of which is, let us not rush into a set policy, but rather a bit of experimentation to estimate the actual dollars and cents value to be derived. This could very advantageously be carried out during the remainder of this Spring semester with an eye toward the founding of an ideal proven publicity organization.

Varsity Takes on Redlands in Final Contest

Bulldogs Favored to Take Win Over Gauchos in Their Last Stand

Coming north to defend their Southern California conference lead the Redlands' Bulldog moves into town tonight to do battle with the Santa Barbara State college Gauchos in the Armory gym at eight o'clock, while the Gauchos will meet the Bull-pups in a preliminary at 6:30.

The Gauchos are definitely in the cellar position, but in this their last conference game of the season will be out to upset the strong southern quintet. The Bulldog holds victories over Occidental, San Diego, Whittier and La Verne and goes into tonight's game a heavy favorite to win.

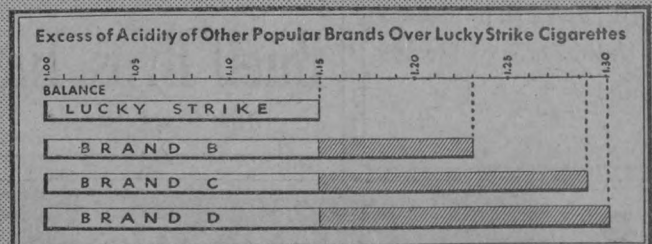
