

FRATERNITY WORK DAY GREEK WEEK TRADITION

Greek week is in progress at UCSBC, with activities getting under way last night at the weekly dinner and business meetings of the Greek organizations on campus. A local minister, rabbi, or priest was guest speaker at each meeting.

This annual event is designed to acquaint the town of Santa Barbara with the college's fraternities and sororities and to give the organizations a chance to show participation in the spirit and affairs of the city.

Work Day

One of the affairs that is becoming traditional at this campus is the Work Day. All fraternities participate in helping the city park department clean up the city parks and parkways. This idea was initiated last year and was copied by the University of Minnesota that year.

It is hoped that the plan will take hold all over the nation. Work Day will be publicized throughout the country through the facilities of United Press.

Brief Outline

A brief outline of the events for the entire week includes many such ideas to demonstrate the Greek organizations' interest in other affairs outside campus activities.

Tuesday night a meeting for the representatives of all sororities and fraternities will be held at the Mesa Campus Auditorium. Dean Hand, dean of Liberal Arts, Dean Snidder, dean of Applied Arts, Mrs. Wilcox, and Mayor Norris Montgomery of Santa Barbara will speak.

Porchlight Drive

Wednesday night a porch-light drive to collect used clothing to send to Germany will be held by the fraternities under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Goedhard, both former students of UCSBC. Warm clothing is desired, such as sweaters, wool skirts, and warm suits in repairable condition.

Thursday night is the night of the All-College Rally and Sing. This includes a program of speakers, the introduction of the baseball and track teams, and try-outs for cheer and song leaders. *The public is invited.*

Baseball and track members will be presented to the student body by emcee Ted Knudson during the All-College Sing on Thursday, April 12, at 7 pm. The Quad will be lit by two bonfires, one at either end of the pool.

A feeling of cooperation between campus groups, in keeping with the spirit of Greek Week, is the aim of the Sing, according to Pat Welsh, Assembly Committee chairman.

Tryouts for yell leaders and song leaders will be part of the evening's program.

The fraternities and sororities to participate in the singing will be organized into three groups. The program will be as follows: Short talk by Dean Ellen Bowers, followed by the first group of fraternity singing; speech by Dean Lyle Reynolds and another group of fraternity and sorority songs; introduction of baseball and track teams and song and yell leader tryouts; last group of fraternity-sorority songs.

Abusing their lungs in the yell leader tryouts will be Spud Morrow, Jack Carroll, Bill Grannis and Jiggs Pierson.

Panhellenic, headed by Carlene Etter, is in charge of all arrangements for the Sing.

Dr. Baer to Attend Aesthetics Meeting

Dr. Kurt Baer, associate professor of art at Santa Barbara College, left Wednesday night for Portland, Oregon, to attend a three-day meeting of the American Society of Aesthetics. He will read a paper on "The Problem of Art Criticism in the Newspapers."

Composed of leaders in all of the fine arts, the society will institute a new chapter in the northwest at the Portland session.

Friday night will be kept open for the Dance Concert, to be held in the Riviera Auditorium at 8:30 pm.

Saturday's events will start at 8 am with all fraternities sending out 15 representatives each to participate in the Work Day clean-up program from 8 am until 1 pm. Meanwhile, the sororities will send five girls from each house to repair the used clothing collected in the porch-light drive. At 2 pm the town will sponsor a dinner for the fraternity members at Oak Park. Local grocers will furnish the food.

Track Meet

Saturday afternoon there will be a track meet. A dance will follow at the Recreation Center, given for the benefit of the Servicemen's Hospitality Fund, from 10 until 1 am. It is sponsored by the IFC and the Panhellenic Council. Admission is 50c per person. *The public is invited.*

Sunday afternoon the fraternities will hold open house from 12 until 2 pm. This is for the benefit of the townspeople, in order to give them a chance to get acquainted with the fraternities. There will be an AMS Steak Fry at Tucker's Grove from 2 until 5 pm that evening.

Forty Booths Entered in Carnival Coast

Santa Barbary Coast 1951 will feature upwards of forty booths, it was disclosed today by the Special Events Committee, with the first registration call of April 5 netting thirty-two organizations.

A map of the Coast area will appear in *El Gaucho* in the near future, giving the general lay-out of the carnival area.

Locations Assigned

Thursday's meeting of all booth chairmen made possible assignments of locations for all booths, together with the stressing of general Santa Barbary Coast policy for finances, awards and regulations.

Another meeting of the booth chairmen is scheduled for North Hall 101 on Thursday, May 3, at

4 pm to clear up any technical problems which may arise during preliminary planning of the Carnival.

Continuous Crowds

The area for the carnival has been centered on four main avenues of traffic, the Men's Gym lawn, the Upper Drive adjacent to North Hall and Pine Hall, the Lower Drive adjacent to the Administration Building and Quad, and the Quad itself.

This area will be "boxed in" to provide the crowds with a continuous path throughout the entire area. Public address facilities will feature a barker for the entire area, announcing booths, show times, and directions to spectators.

Earl Cantlay, Special Events finance manager, guarantees a large volume of Barbary Coast money to avoid sell-outs. Money will be sold at four ticket booths, conveniently located so as to serve all of the carnival area.

Each organization will turn in all money each night to Special Events in the Student Body office and receive a receipt. Organizations checks will be in the mail Sunday, May 20.

BASEBALLERS OVERTURN IN SUBURBAN HOMEWARD-BOUND FROM FRESNO GAME

Johnson, Hackett and Robinson Injured

Homeward bound from the Fresno games, seven Gaucho baseball players, riding in one of the University's large suburbans, overturned with three receiving serious injuries while the remaining four came out with only minor hurts.

The accident took place at 10:05 am Sunday, April 8, approximately twenty-five miles east of Paso Robles on Highway 41. The occupants of the carrier, similar to a station wagon, were Dave Gorrie, Ed Miller, George Perry, Ron Robinson, Al Cox, John Hackett, with pitcher Bobby Johnston at the wheel.

Rolled Over Twice

The suburban left the left-hand side of the road and rolled over twice and spun, stopping but four feet from Johnston and Robinson, who had been thrown through the windows of the vehicle. Later measurement showed that the carrier had rolled a distance of 131 feet.

Injured

Johnny Hackett, speedy utility

infielder, suffered cuts on the face, right armpit, and a bad wound which severed the tendons of his upper right wrist. He was sitting in the seat to the right of the driver and was thrown out onto the ground. He is expected to be released from the hospital within a few days.

Veteran two-year letterman Ron Robinson, third base, crashed through the rear side window and received facial cuts, a broken nose, and an injured back. The extent of the back injury cannot be determined until his condition is improved sufficiently to allow x-rays.

Great Loss

Bob Johnson, '49 and '50 letterman, all-league pitcher last year, was victim to a badly strained and cut left ankle. He was released for transfer to the local Infirmary Sunday evening.

The other four walked away with some bad bumps and minor cuts but were able to continue toward home in the evening. The three injured men, a deepfelt loss to the Gaucho nine for the rest of the season, were taken to the District Hospital in Paso Robles.

How and Why

Questioned as to how the accident happened, Bob Johnston and Al Cox explained that they were passing a 1939 Chevrolet on the narrow two-lane road. The other car swerved toward them and Johnston swung to the left to avoid hitting it, while in so doing he immediately cut back to stop from going over the side of the road.

The top-heavy suburban swayed and the left rear wheel hit the soft shoulder causing it to roll over, all but completely demolishing the vehicle. Johnston said that it was the "fish-tailing" action of the top-heavy vehicle which caused him to lose control.

BRADLEY TO SPEAK ON FOOD PATTERNS

Miss Alice V. Bradley, professor of home economics, will speak on foreign and domestic nutrition patterns for the next All-College Lecture. It will be given at 4 pm Wednesday, in Pine Hall 100.

On a trip to 29 campuses in the United States and Europe and visits to homes of various countries, she obtained data which she will discuss in her talk on "Nutritional Patterns and Modes of Living Here and Abroad."

Four factors which she found controlled nutrition are race, religion, social and economic standings, and will be taken up by her lecture. It is sponsored by the University of California Extension and the Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music.

Effect and Solution of Enrollment Drop

A general drop in enrollment throughout the University of California—it sounds discouraging, doesn't it? It's not so discouraging in light of the fact that it may possibly be due to the graduation of large numbers of the veteran students who swelled the enrollments right after the war, and due also to the drafting and enlistment of men students caused by the Korean situation.

It is discouraging when the figures indicate an 18 per cent drop on this campus from 2,130 students in the fall semester to 1,742 in the spring semester, as compared with an overall drop of 13 per cent throughout the University.

Faculty Views

Many faculty members and administration officials do not seem to be discouraged by this drop, expressing the view that such a drop was to be expected and that enrollment will increase when the "war babies" come to college. However, we wonder if they realize that a small enrollment cannot support a large faculty. It is rumored that steps are already being taken to decrease the faculty next year. This means that less courses will be offered, making it even more difficult to attract newcomers, and possible decreasing the enrollment even more.

"Selling UCSBC"

The Associated Students President and Legislative Council are greatly concerned with this turn of events and are seeking to institute a program to "sell UCSBC" to the many high school and junior college students throughout the state who have never even heard of this branch of the University, much less plan to go to school here. The student leaders have expressed the opinion that if more publicity can be given to UCSBC in areas where there are many potential students, the enrollment will show an increase. This feeling is also prevalent throughout most of the student body.

As yet, this plan is not supported by the Administration, but it is hoped that they will realize the gravity of this enrollment drop in time to help the student body build itself back up to a normal number.

The cap and gown rental will be \$3.00 with 50c of this refundable if the outfit is returned immediately following the commencement exercises. Cancellation of the cap and gown reservation may be made until June 8 with a full refund given.

Ordered announcements and personal cards cannot be cancelled after April 20. In all cases the orders must be accompanied by cash.

GOODALL SEEKS BOOKSTORE INFO AT UCLA, DAVIS

Associated Students President Frank Goodall and Jim Mulick, representative-at-large, spent last Friday and Saturday on the UCLA campus investigating non-teacher job placement and bookstore financing.

Goodall stated that the purpose of the trip was to try and establish some sort of liaison between the Bureau of Occupations on the UCLA and UCSBC campuses. Non-teacher job placement has been an issue here for some time, but money has never been available for establishing an occupation center here.

The Associated Students are again trying to persuade the University to allow the students to operate the College Bookstore. The Legislative Council at their last meeting passed a resolution presented by Ed McCann requesting control of the Bookstore.

At present the student body is formulating a plan to show the University how they would operate the Bookstore. Mulick and Goodall are trying to determine how to keep the inventory as low as possible in such an enterprise and therefore reduce the sum of money required to finance it.

Saturday, April 14, Goodall and several other members of the Legislative Council are planning to attend the annual Cal Aggie Picnic Day at Davis and at the same time investigate bookstore financing on that campus.

Another boy to watch is Bobby Smith who has topped 14 feet in the pole vault a number of times. The meet record is 13'6". Smith, a senior now, has been NCA pole vault champion for the last two years.

Single

The Monday following the Cal Poly double, the Gauchos take on the California Bears in a single game at the Laguna Field, 8 pm.

Thus far, with twelve games having been played of the '51 schedule the Gauchos are batting a cool .330 as a team. Danny Kutch heads the batsmen with a torrid .471, banging out sixteen hits in 34 times at bat, including one home run.

Corkey Johnson and Bob Tally have both socked two four-baggers to lead the home run parade thus far with Eddie Miller supplying one also to fill the bill.

Fielding

In the fielding department, three regulars, Allan Cox, George Mattias and Roger Wilson have a bobble-free record and a 1.000 field average.

The Gauchos took the blue ribbon in 12 events and tied for another first.

High Pointer

High Point maker was Ted Vick, who scored firsts in both the 220 and hundred and was a member of the winning relay team. Teammate and footballer Ron Ternquist showed lots of zip as he picked up two seconds in the dashes for his best efforts of the season.

In the 440, a crowd-raising duel for second place behind winner Bob Daly was staged by Arizonian Larriva and Don Marks, who showed a determination and drive which carried him past the visitor coming off the last curve. Marks also showed up well in the winning relay team by lopping off a temporary Arizona margin of several long yards.

Two-Mile Thriller

Another thriller was the finish of the two-mile with Jim Evans and Don Crie taking first and second, respectively, as they ran the Arizonian Sidel into the ground on the last 200 yards. Crie picked up the only wide margin first of the day when he took the mile, in which Evans placed second.

Sore-armed Delf Pickarts watched Brick Reed take a first in the frog-sticking event as the redhead pitched the javelin 185 feet for his best mark of the season. Reed also picked up a third in the discus.

Field Events

In the other field events Beacom took the broad-jump as per usual, Dancer took the high jump despite some stiff muscles, and Jack Sinclair leaped to a three-way tie for first honors in the pole vault.

A thrilling finish to the meet was the relay event which saw four individual exciting races including the final lap of Otey Scruggs' which saw him duplicate his 440 victory over a determined, long-legged Sancti. Other members of the relay team were Daly, Marks and Vick.

WHEREAS the bookstore would be a large source of income for the Associated Students, for at the rate of \$100,000 gross with a 10% margin of profit it would be an annual income of \$10,000, and

WHEREAS the Associated Students, if it is to keep its activities and functions, which are a benefit to Santa Barbara College as a whole, operating on the present scale, must have a new source of income,

Therefore be it resolved that the Associated Students of the University of California Santa Barbara College immediately petition the Administration of the University of California to grant control of the bookstore of the University of California Santa Barbara College to the Associated Students, with the understanding that the business office exercises some supervisory control over it.

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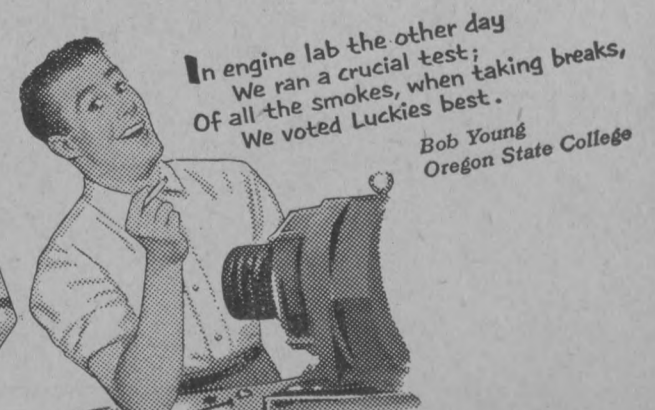
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
