UCSB Sluggers Get Impaled by Spartans, Losing 2 of 3

Gauchos Lose Homestand to San Jose St. in a Crucial Series

It was home sweet hell for the Gaucho sluggers this past weekend.

In a crucial matchup in the Big West conference, the UCSB baseball team (15-22 overall, 5-4 Big West) lost two out of three to the San Jose State Spar-

tans (21-16, 2-4). Friday's game was won by the Spartans, 3-1, in a well-played affair by both teams — characterized by excellent pitching on both sides. Actually, though, the Gauchos repeatedly had men on base throughout the game, only to see them stranded.

"To me that was the toughest game of the year,' UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "It was an important game, a conference game. We had a quality pitcher on the ropes

and we couldn't put them away."

The game began on a bad note for UCSB's starting pitcher Steve Lane (4-4), when Spartan lea-doff man LaVerne Thomas hit what looked to be a routine fly ball to right field, but turned into a wind-aided home run. San Jose added another run in the second inning when Willie Moore hit another solo shot to right. After the second inning, Lane pitched very effectively, al-lowing only one more run and going the distance. The Gauchos pounded

out 11 hits against Spartan starter Dave Sick (6-0). However, he was able to bear down with men on base, allowing his only run of the game in the third inning when Wynter Phoenix's single knocked in Peter Muro.

"Sick is an outstanding pitcher," Brontsema said

"I've got to give him credit. He had to be doing something different in the tough situations. We were getting him into some jams, but we just couldn't finish the job."

UCSB had a chance to tie or win the game in the ninth against San Jose's stopper Mike DesRoches. The Gauchos loaded the bases with two outs for cleanup hitter Matt Bazzani. With the runners going on a 3-2 pitch with two outs, DesRoches was able to strike out Bazzani sw-inging, earning his second

Six full teams competed with Nebraska taking first place. Stanford, national champions for the last two years, took second place and Oklahoma took third, ahead of UCLA.

The three UCSB women gymnasts competing in the NCAA regionals at Boise, Idaho, returned home yesterday, unable to advance to the Nationals.

Gaucho Emily Tripiano finished 16th in the regionals with an allaround score of 37.425, while Margie Hoeffler came in 19th with 36.925 points and Lauren Yee received a score of 36.150.

"We didn't do very well," Hoeffler said. "We

The motivation factor was a key issue for the gymnasts. With their team back home and the Gaucho season over, the competitive spirit just couldn't be found. Not competing with the Gaucho team, each gymnast had to tag along with a different team. Yee competed with the University of Oregon, while Tripiano joined up with UCLA and Hoeffler teamed with Cal State Fullerton.

"It [the regionals] was weird because last year we went as a team," Tri-piano said. "It was hard without the team."

The Gaucho gymnastics team narrowly missed the regionals this year, coming in eighth in the Western region — the first seven teams qualify.

"It was fun because it was different being with another team," Hoeffler said. "But I wasn't really motivated."

Hoeffler did not hit her routines as consistently as she did during the season, falling a few times throughout the meet.

This was the final score that indicated a UCSB rout of Stanford in the annual men's lacrosse matchup this past weekend. But the Cardinal, following a short layoff in their schedule, did not play up to their potential.

The scary part is, neither did the Gauchos.

"We were up 9-1 at the half, but we were not playing well," said UCSB Head Coach Pete Ginnegar, after securing his 100th career victory. "But Stanford is de-finitely a better team than they showed us on Saturday."

The offense went to work against the complacent Stanford defense as junior attackman Scott Cerny scored a seasonhigh six goals to complement the two put in by linemate Chris Goodroe, and an im-pressive hat trick from 6-foot-4 midfielder

Steve Wynne. The Gaucho defense also dominated, even without the intimidating presence of 220-pound Chauncey Kim, whose in-jured ankle prevented him from playing this weekend. Freshman defender Dave Winnacker has lived up to preseason expectations, guided by upperclassmen Kim and Tom Osbourne, who was recently named to the starting lineup for this year's WCLL All-Star Game.

The goaltending was steady as usual, with starter Davey Deffinbaugh seeing most of the shots before Dan Zuckerman

"I felt really strong the whole time," Bradbury ad-mitted. "My laps seemed

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
consistent and I was quick tively slow." at the end. I was lucky because the weather conditions were perfect during my race."
