Hazardous Waste Violators Forced to Pay \$75,000 Fine

A local factory has been slapped with a steep fine and cleanup costs earlier this month following years of violating state Hazardous Waste Control laws that led to a chemical leakage in the Goleta area.

A Superior Court judgement was filed on Sept. 18 of this year requiring Channel Industries, Inc. to eliminate soil contamination caused by lead and barium and to pay \$75,000 in civil penalties. The sonar equipment and ceramic producing company on Ward Drive has been under investigation by the district attorney's office since 1990.

The violations made by Channel since 1989 include leaving the lids off of barrels of hazardous waste and keeping hazardous waste longer than the 90-day allowance for storing such material, according to Senior Deputy D.A. Eric Hanson. Until a site assessment is completed, the extent of the contamination in the surrounding soil will not be determined, he said.

"Despite assurances that

they'd do a better job of house-keeping, they hadn't done a thing to change," Hanson said, adding that health inspectors admonished the company on two occasions in 1989 and 1990 for violating the state Hazardous Waste Act.

Channel Industries Vice President Bill Newbury declined comment on the violations except to say: "There was no spill."

A routine Santa Barbara County health inspection in late 1990 revealed that the company was still not handling its waste properly. "The inspector noticed that the barrels that catch this waste ... had overflowed," Hanson said. "The soil was stained where the liquid went into the soil."

Inspectors took soil and liquid samples to determine the connection between the hazardous waste being produced by Channel and the pollution of nearby soil. "From that, we could tell the soil was contaminated with lead and barium," Hanson said.

Although health inspectors were aware of the violations, it

Reverend Jesse Jackson to Address UCSB Community in Storke Plaza

Friday's Rally Comes With Hopes of Support for Democratic Ticket

The Reverend Jesse Jackson will descend upon Storke Plaza on Friday afternoon spreading the Democratic gospel to the UCSB community and Santa Barbara's faithful.

Jackson will be appearing at a noon rally to support the Democratic presidential ticket of Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton and Tennessee Senator Al Gore. He will be joined by several prominent area Democrats including 3rd District Supervisor Bill Wallace and 22nd Congressional District candidate Gloria Ochoa, according to UCSB Campus Democrats President Geoff Sievert.

While the civil rights leader is not running for office this year, he has been crisscrossing the country to support the Clinton-Gore ticket and to register new Democratic voters, especially Blacks.

However, Jackson has maintained a much lower profile this election season than in past years, leading to charges that the Clinton campaign is ostracizing him and ignoring the liberal wing of the Democratic Party.

"He's been deliberately isolated by the Clinton campaign. They are appealing to the 'Bubba vote,' the so-called 'Reagan Democrats' and have distanced themselves from Jackson and his wing of the party," Black studies Lecturer Otis Madison said.

At this year's Democratic National Convention

in New York, Jackson delivered an impassioned plea on national television imploring the centrist Clinton not to forget his party's roots.

"History will remember us not for our positioning, but for our principles. Not by our move to the political center, left or right, but rather by our grasp on the moral and ethical center of wrong and right.

"We who stand with working people and poor have a special burden. We must stand up for what is right, stand up to those who have the might," Jackson said.

Sievert agrees that Jackson is not as visible as he was in 1984 or 1988. "I think the Clinton campaign has done as much as they can to bring him in, but they have to be careful not to project the wrong image about what the campaign and the party represents," he said.

However, Jackson's lower profile may have serious consequences for the Democrats hopes in the November election. "If Black people do not come out and vote, especially in the urban areas, Clinton could lose this election. He is taking for granted that Black people are not only going to vote but vote en masse," Madison said.

Despite his shrinking influence the former presidential candidate and current host of CNN's "Both sides with Jesse Jackson" remains fully committed to the Democratic ticket. "Jackson's been historically loyal to the Democratic Party just like [Martin Luther] King and [former Atlanta Mayor] Andy Young and all of them," Madison said.

Former Student Faces Investigation

A former UCSB graduate student whose discrimination complaints against the university sparked a government investigation has been charged with student misconduct and prohibited from contact with a number of administration officials.

Paul Westwind, who has visual and balance disabilities, faces disciplinary action on 14 counts of campus regulations for student behavior. The charges stem from Westwind's efforts this spring to force the university

to respond to his claims that UCSB does not adequately meet the needs of its disabled students.

According to Assistant Dean of Students Joseph Navarro, a hearing date to review the case has not been set by the Student Faculty Committee on Student Conduct.

Most of the allegations stem from a number of visits Westwind made to university staff as well as a large volume of mail sent to campus offices to express his complaint. According to a letter sent to Westwind by Navarro, Westwind disrupted campus operations and "displayed

conduct that was personally and emotionally threatening" to staff members.

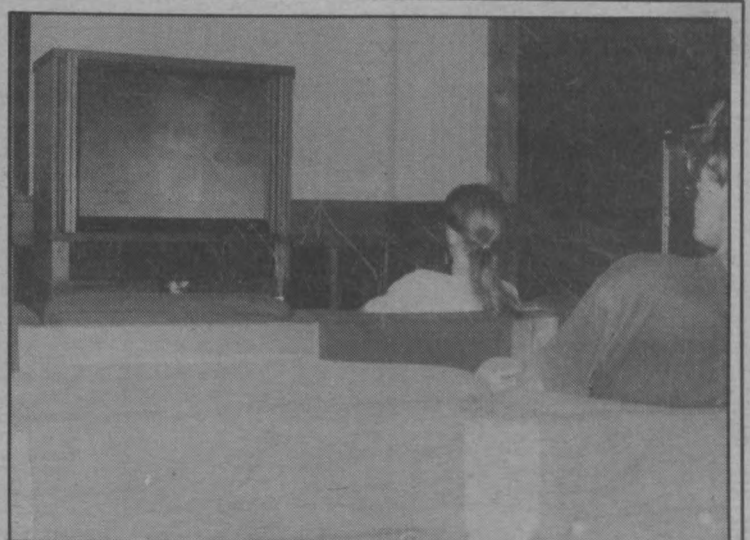

Perot refused to confirm persistent rumors that he will formally re-enter the presidential race, saying only that he plans to meet with the leaders of his volunteer effort on Thursday and he will abide by their decision.

AIDS Foundation Defies Marines Over Controversial Ad

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The U.S. Marine Corps has declared war on the San Francisco AIDS foundation over an ad that features two shirtless men, one of them tattooed with the Marine emblem, locked in a romantic embrace.

But the foundation is holding firm and plans to use the advertisement unchanged in several San Francisco publications, spokesman Joe Fera said Monday. The ad ran in the magazine section of the Sunday *San Francisco Examiner* in June.

The Marines have threatened legal action against the foundation unless it stops its "unauthorized and ... inappropriate" use of its eagle, globe and anchor emblem. The ad, headlined "Sex is Good," is an effort to convince sexually active people to get tested for HIV, the antibody that causes AIDS, Fera said.

It features photographs of four separate couples shot nude from the waist up. Two couples are heterosexual, a third is lesbian and the fourth is made up of two men. One sports a Marine emblem on his forearm.

"Our attorney doesn't think there's any statutory violation," Fera said.

The Marine Corps urged the foundation to cease its use of the emblem in a July 15 letter by Maj. K.H. Winters, assistant staff judge advocate for research and civil law.

"The use of our emblem in your advertisement could create the inference that the Marine Corps is somehow partially responsible for the spread of AIDS in the San

Francisco area," Winters wrote the foundation.

"Further, your use of the emblem could be viewed as tacit approval of homosexuality in the Marine Corps," Winters continued. Homosexuals are ineligible to serve in the U.S. Armed Forces.

"Quite frankly, if they just remove the emblem, I don't see that it would do any harm to the proposed purpose of the advertisement," said Lt. Kim Miller, a Marine Corps spokeswoman.

Fera said the appearance of the emblem did not violate federal statutes aimed at guarding against copyright infringement.

"We are not selling anything," Fera said. "This is not an advertisement. We are using it as part of an AIDS education campaign we have been running for years ... and there happened to be a tattoo on the model."

Fera said the foundation would announce the ad's use in other publications. He said he believed the Marine Corps would not have reacted as strongly if the man wearing the tattoo was with a woman.

Pakistani Jet Crashes With 167 Aboard: No Survivors

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP)—A Pakistani jet filled with Europeans plowed into a pine-covered hillside Monday, and rescuers searching the burning wreckage reported no survivors among the 167 aboard.



Officials said one American was also on board the Pakistani International Airlines Airbus A300 when it crashed on a landing approach. This has been the second air disaster near the capital in as many months.

The pilot had given no indication anything was wrong before contact was lost with the plane, and the weather was normal, officials said.

Airline sources in Pakistan said the plane may have been flying too low as it approached the city ringed by Himalayan mountains thousands of feet high. The sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the plane was flying at 7,500 feet when it should have been at 9,000.

Rescue crews that reached the site by helicopter said the plane was on fire. An airman lowered himself on a rope for a closer view, but found no evidence of survivors, said Napendra Prasad Ghimire, deputy chief of Katmandu airport.

The state-owned Nepal Radio announced the bodies of victims found by rescue teams would be handed over to relatives at Katmandu airport on Tuesday.

Death Row Convicts Freed Under Political Agreement

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—The government Monday released from prison a white supremacist who slaughtered seven people, and an ANC member who killed three white women with a car bomb.

They were among the first prisoners freed under a government-ANC agreement to release hundreds of prisoners in an effort to restart South Africa's political talks on ending Apartheid.

Barend Strydom, nicknamed "White Wolf," was sentenced for a sidewalk shooting spree in downtown Pretoria. He avoided reporters after he was set free.

Robert McBride, convicted in the car bombing, was greeted by cheering African National Congress supporters as he walked out of Durban prison. He punched the air with a clenched fist and yelled "Amandla [Power]" and "Viva, ANC."

Under the agreement, about 150 political prisoners are being released immediately and another 300 could be freed by Nov. 15. Strydom and McBride were sentenced to death, but the sentences were changed to life in prison.

Bush Vetoes Bill Imposing Restrictions Against China

DALLAS (AP)—In another election-year battle over his policy toward China, President Bush on Monday vetoed a bill that would impose restrictions on renewal of normal trade relations with Beijing.



In a statement, Bush said that he shared Congress' desire to promote progress on human rights and fair trade with China and to restrict its sales of weapons. However, he said the measure "would not lead to faster progress in advancing our goals."

Bush rejected a similar bill earlier this year, and Congress was unable to muster the two-thirds majority needed to override the veto.

The bill would impose conditions on granting most-favored nation trade status with China, a designation providing the lowest possible tariffs on exports from Beijing. The most-favored status is granted to all but a handful of countries.

Bush said that China has taken limited steps on human rights but he deemed them inadequate.

"It is easy to be discouraged by the lack of progress in this area," the president said in a statement issued during a campaign stop. "But it would be a serious mistake to let our frustration lead us to gamble with policies that would undermine our goals."

New Statutes Could Allow Mining in National Parks

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interior Dept. is close to approving rules that could open national forests to strip mining unless the government buys the mineral rights.

Interior spokesman Steven Goldstein insisted Monday that there are no plans to allow strip mining in national parks because in each of those cases the government would buy up mineral rights or arrange for a land exchange.

Goldstein said the policy change involves "fundamentally a constitutional issue" over the right of those holding mineral rights to be compensated.

"This could be the most disastrous action taken by any administration in the 76-year history of the National Park Service," Paul Pritchard, president of the National Parks and Conservation Association, a private advocacy group on park issues, said in a statement.

An association spokeswoman, Kathy Westra, said the issue of compensation should not be dealt with administratively, but left to the courts, and that the proposed Interior policy change could strain the department's fund for handling compensatory claims.

Bradley to Join L.A. Office of International Law Firm

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mayor Tom Bradley announced Monday that he will join an international law firm after he retires next year, bringing to the practice a wealth of business and political contacts from 20 years as mayor.



"I expect to use those contacts to help expand the practice, the business of the law firm," Bradley said in a news conference at City Hall.

Bradley said he made his final decision to join San Francisco-based Brobeck, Phleger & Harrison on Thursday, the same day he told hundreds of supporters he would retire at the end of his fifth term next June.

Bradley said he would work in the Los Angeles office. He declined to say how much he would be paid, saying that as of July 1, 1993, he will be a private citizen and no longer subject to such scrutiny.

"That's a question which is off limits," he said. At 74, Bradley is long past the traditional retirement age, but he dismissed any notion that he would be slowing down after he leaves the mayor's office.

"I feel younger than 65 and I simply could not, would not and will not sit in a rocking chair and do nothing," he said.

Bradley said he started thinking about his career options a year ago and had received many offers from businesses and law firms.

Southern California Braces for Arrival of Killer Bees

SAN DIEGO (AP)—After five years of worry and warnings, South American killer bees are close enough to have Southern California rescue workers and civil leaders planning for their inevitable arrival.

"We'll have to learn to live with them," said entomologist Bill Routhier, the California Dept. of Food and Agriculture's manager for San Diego and neighboring counties. "The sooner we learn that, the better off we'll be."

Some of the slow-moving but seemingly unstoppable Africanized honey bees already have reached Texas.

Swarms moving toward San Diego, their first expected metropolitan stop in California, are now 170 miles south of the U.S. border in the Mexican state of Sonora. Given their 300-miles-a-year flight, they're expected to reach Tucson, Ariz., by next year.

"Once the bees cross the Colorado River, they can be in downtown Los Angeles in a year," Routhier said. "A lot of people think we still have time. You don't."

Local governments throughout Southern California are bracing for the bees.

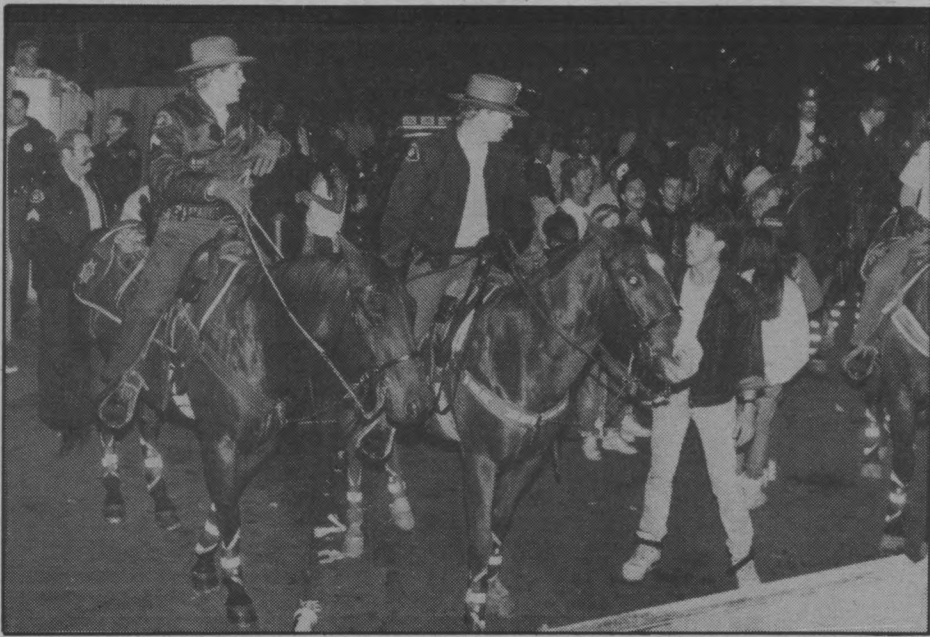

Preparing for Pandemonium

With rumors of huge parties and packed streets flying around Isla Vista, local law enforcement and community agencies are already gearing up for a raucous weekend-long Halloween celebration.

In 1987, the last time Halloween fell on a weekend, massive unrest broke out in the streets of I.V., which thundered beneath the feet of thousands of locals and visitors from hundreds of miles around for the two-day party. This time, however, police officers are ready. "Before there was a

more coordinated response, we had major problems that weekend," said UCSB Police Lt. Tony Alvarez. "We learned a lot of things since then."

Over \$100,000 of the Santa Barbara County budget was set aside during last week's budget hearings to pay for increased law enforcement Halloween weekend, according to Mark Chaconas, aide to 3rd District County Supervisor Bill Wallace.

Although Halloween is on a Saturday this year, Chaconas said the funds had put into Halloween police efforts in the last few years. I.V. Foot Patrol

Lt. Ken Shemwell "has been told to do more with less," Chaconas said.

To combat problems associated with tourists flocking to I.V., residents are urged to discourage out of town guests from coming to the area. "We're trying to keep it local. The people that are getting arrested are from UCLA" and other areas of California, Chaconas said. "The problem is, we have people from San Diego and Fresno coming to I.V.," he said.

Alvarez agreed. "People outside of the area ... are less responsible than someone who belongs to

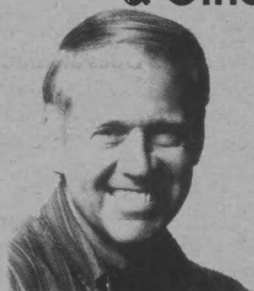

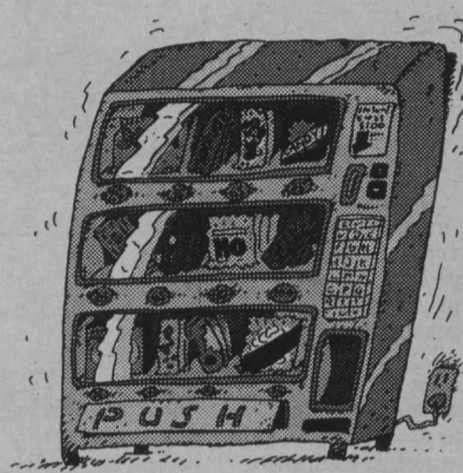

RecCen Project Going up to Bat

Cranes and bulldozers will soon grace another part of UCSB as ground is broken on the Recreation Center project near Robertson Gym tonight.

Chancellor Barbara Uehling will mark the start of construction at 7:30 p.m. by turning on 14 new lights on the Rob Gym lawn, at which time students and staff members will come out for a softball game.

The RecCen is part of a \$33 million project ap-

proved by students in 1990 by a 60.8% vote, despite a vigorous campaign launched against the expansion. Students agreed to assess themselves a \$44.70 fee each quarter beginning fall 1994 to construct the new facility and expand the existing University Center.

The new center will be constructed in the northwest part of campus near Harder Stadium and will include two outdoor swimming pools, a gym,

racquetball and squash courts, a weight room, lockers, offices and meeting rooms.

The RecCen is the latest realization of the Long Range Development Plan, the blueprint for UCSB's physical growth for the '90s. Construction on the Physical Sciences Building has been going on for almost a year, and construction on the UCen is expected to begin this winter.

The letter further prohibits Westwind from having any contact with a number of administrators, including officials at the Graduate Division, the Office of Equity and Advocacy, Financial Aid and the UCSB Bookstore. Should Westwind meet with the listed parties, the letter states that the university is authorized to have him arrested.

Navarro said on Monday that he wrote the letter in response to harassment complaints made by UCSB staff.

Should a review determine that Westwind's behavior fell outside accepted university regulations, he faces "a range of options, from warnings to dismissal from the university and exclusion from university property," Na-

varro said.

Westwind said his actions were necessary to counteract what he perceived as UCSB's insensitivity to the needs of disabled students. "The university treats the handicapped as a second-rate protected class," he said. "In the United States of America we have a legal right to express our opinions."

Westwind withdrew from UCSB in August, and said he has no plans to return. "I want to forget about UCSB and get on with my life," he said.

The dean's office must continue the case in order to "put formal closure to the charges," Navarro said. "If someone commits harassment, we follow it up."

In July, Westwind's letter-writing campaign prompted an inquiry by the U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil

Rights, which is currently investigating the university's level of accessibility to handicapped students.

According to Raymond Huerta, Affirmative Action coordinator, such inquiries are a benefit to the university as well as students. "These things are positive. They identify areas we may not have been conscious of," he said. "They help find ways of enhancing our services to the students who need them."

The OCR investigation will take several months and include an on-site review by an Education Dept. official, Huerta said.

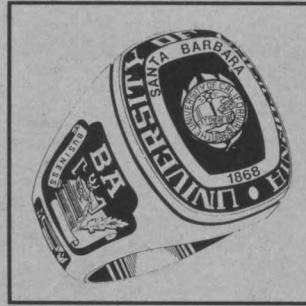
Westwind feels the charges against him represent university retaliation for bringing about the OCR investigation. "What I've learned is that if you file a discrimination complaint against the university, they will try to get you thrown out," he said.

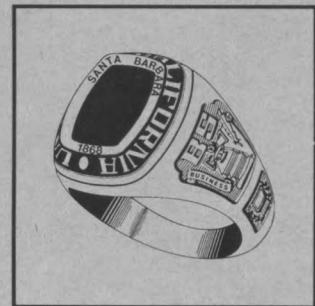

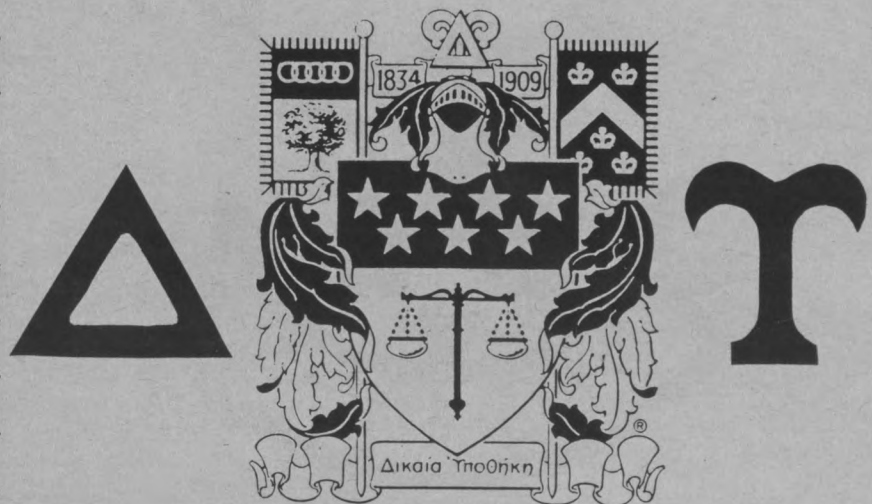

took over two years to render a decision on Channel, according to Jim Morris, Environmental Health Services enforcement officer. "What takes a long time is gathering the evidence and reviewing it. Sometimes we'll wait for sampling results," he said. "It was a complicated case."

Channel is currently working under the guidance of Environmental Health on a site assess-

ment that will evaluate the damage to the area and detail a plan to clean up the leakage, according to Morris. Until the damage is assessed, there is no way to determine how long the cleanup will take, how much it will cost and what the environmental impact has been.

"If it's in the groundwater, they would have to pump it," Morris said. "If it's in the soil, they would excavate it." He believes the cleanup effort will run over \$100,000, all of which will be paid by Channel.

Channel is now under a court order to comply with the California Hazardous Waste Act and regular annual health inspections will determine if the company cooperates with state codes of handling waste materials. However, Hanson said Channel is denying the violations. "For them to admit they were wrong places them at risk of lawsuits," he said.

"From our side of things, we don't care if they deny it as long as they clean it all up and submit to the court order," Hanson said.

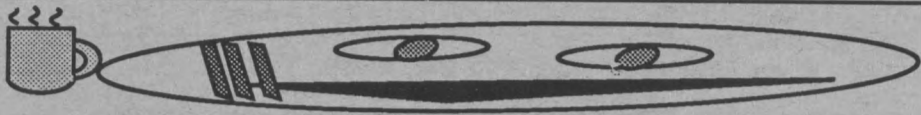

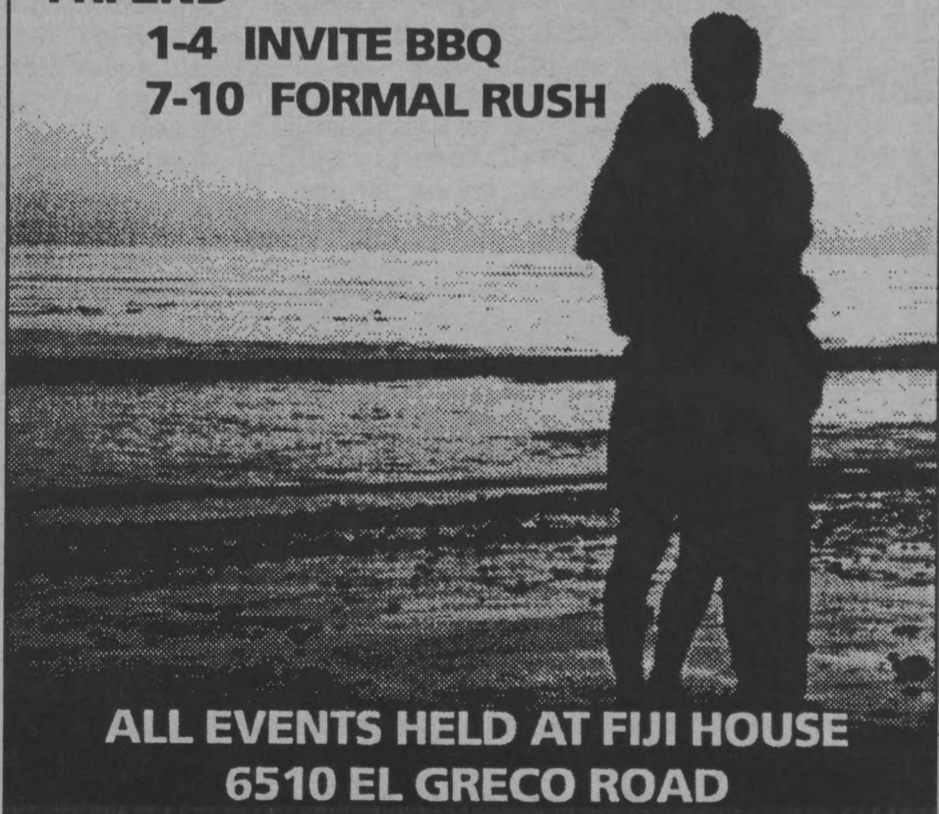

"But you're not in debt. You're great. You talk about the deficit. You tell it to us straight." The voice is getting anxious.

"But we can't do it, Ross — oops, I mean sir. We

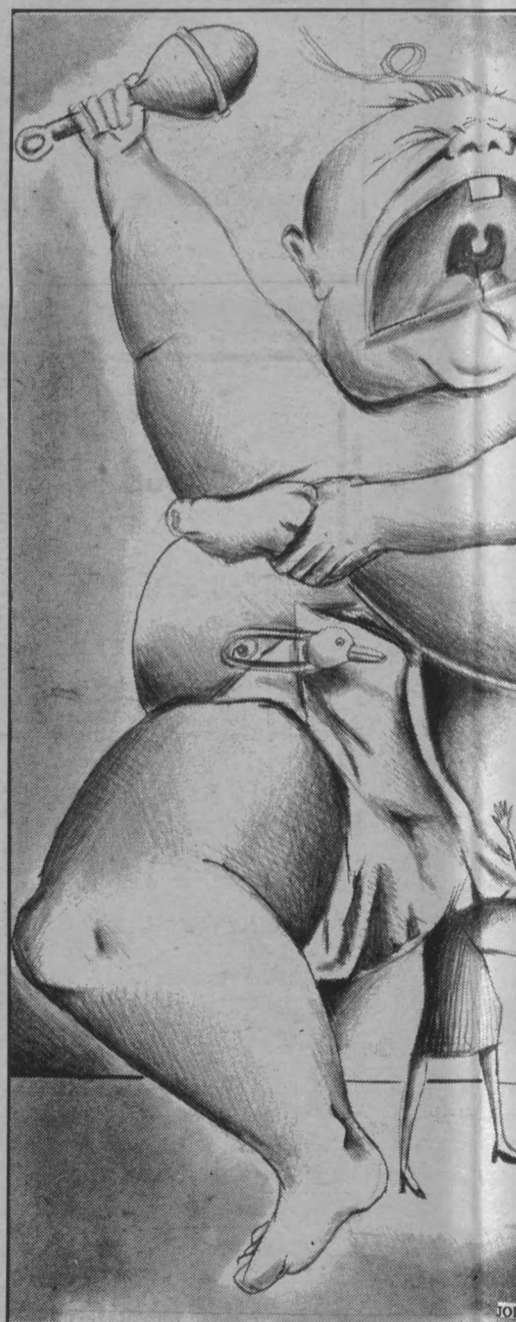

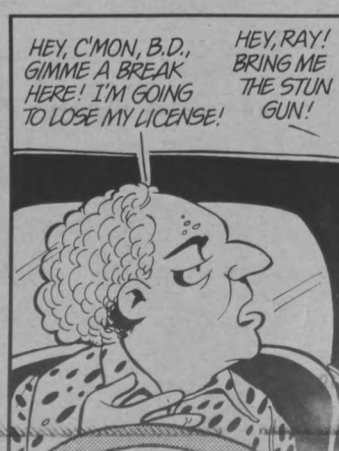

Bring on the Dads

Murphy Brown missed the point. In last week's classic Quayle-bashing epi- sode, our heroine Murphy avoids the real question and sticks to the rhetoric. But how can the show think single- motherhood is glamorous? Actually, Dan Quayle's specific sentence was that the show "mocks the importance of fathers."

In all this admiration of single mothers, Hollywood has dismissed the importance of fathers. You don't need a psychologist to tell you that children need a stable father figure in order to learn about the male sex, especially in how he relates to a female, i.e. a mother and a father. A male child learns how to treat a female peer; a female child learns her early self-respect and sense of femininity through the admi- ration of her father. Perhaps more impor- tant is the consistent stream of love and attention from both parents which teaches the child to express love in return. The sudden disappearance of a father or mother figure, for whatever reason, teaches a child to fear giving love to some- one who may or may not return it. This af- fects romantic relations later in life. Much of the "dysfunctionalism" in society is a result of nearly an entire generation (our generation) growing up in less stable, single-parent homes. Perhaps the glaring tension between the sexes is due to the fact that we have few models of how to understand and respect one another.

Clearly children can grow up in a single parent household. The real question is whether it is the best environment. For example, how can the basis of fundamen- tal security be formed in a child if the single parent must always be at work? You'll notice that Murphy certainly doesn't plan on raising her child; she is

going to rely on a paid nurse to give the day to day quality time. You'll also notice that the most stable father figure is Eldin, her painter. We have no idea where the child will learn about romantic and sexual relationships.

Instead of addressing the issue of a father figure, Murphy indignantly coun- terattacks the relevance of the nuclear family in the modern age. The response is that, while families do come in many shapes and sizes, so-called nontradi- tional families are usually due to misfor- tune. That does not take back that the best circumstances for raising children are with a mother and father present and accountable. In fact, most single parents wish they were in that circumstance.

What is reprehensible is Annie Potts' character on Designing Women. Deliber- ately choosing to have a child without a father present is pure selfishness. Simply because one wants a child does not justify ignoring what that child will need. Yet we are supposed to cheer when she con- ceives. Like Murphy Brown, the glorifica- tion of single motherhood comes from the triumph of this woman's plight de- spite all obstacles.

Many liberals perceive this view as in- tolerant of nontraditional families and the wants of women. It is, however, a question of holding parents accountable. Raising children requires the commit- ment of parents to provide the best envi- ronment possible. More importantly, by advocating single parenthood as a viable alternative, we may be raising a genera- tion even more dysfunctional than our own.

GOP Is Losing Paradise

ATLANTA — Johnny Isaacson, the 1990 Georgia Republican gubernatorial candidate and leader of the growing but still struggling state GOP organization, knew this recession was different when it came right into his suburban neighbor- hood and zapped the family in the quarter-million-dollar house next door.

"We've had a Reagan Democra- tic recession," Isaacson told a visi- tor the other day, "a middle- income, middle-management recession," which hit hardest at the very people who had left their Democratic family roots to support Republicans in the presidential elections of the 1980s.

"Now, we're recovering," he said, "but there's no zoom, no sense of euphoria. There's nothing in place to fuel a great spike upward. And everybody I know is mad at somebody — their lawyer, their re- staurant owner, their laundryman, whoever. But the only ones they get to vote against are the president, the senator and the congressman. And that's why it's tough to run as an in- cumbent this year."

The suburban malaise that Bush- loyalist Isaacson describes is pre- cisely why the president is trailing in Georgia and many other states where he racked up easy victories in 1988. In four suburban Atlanta counties, Bush won by 65% to 77% majorities, getting almost two-fifths of his statewide margin in these four counties.

Today, private polls for both parties show Bush lagging far behind those margins in the Atlanta sub- urbs. There, voters like Dave O'Brien, who moved to California in hopes of improving his job pros- pects, say they won't vote for Bush. "I'm a Reagan-Bush Democrat, but this year I'm voting straight Demo- crat," O'Brien said. "Bush lied to us about 'no new taxes.' He was so busy with his Persian Gulf victory parades he never even noticed we were in a recession."

In Texas, 10 days ago, Republi- can officials told me that Bush's greatest "growth potential" is in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex, meaning that he is lagging furthest behind Republican norms in that area. He has similar problems, I was told last weekend, in Westchester County, N.Y.

New York is a state which is

probably out of reach for Bush him- self. But the GOP needs a certain performance level from the top of the ticket to avoid terrible damage to senatorial candidates like incum- bent Al D'Amato in New York and challenger Paul Coverdell here, who look to the suburbs for their vote.

The suburbs are also where Re- publicans must find whatever gains they make from redistricting of House seats. A Republican con- gressional campaign strategist said that "if Bush can't pull himself up at least to 46% nationally, there's no way we can pick up any House seats," despite the anti-incumbent sentiment so obvious this year.

Conservative political analyst Kevin Phillips, in his newsletter, *The American Political Report*, suggest reasons other than the econ- omy that add to Bush's weakness in the suburbs. Despite years of Re- publican anti-crime rhetoric, he notes, crime rates are rising in many suburbs. And the growing influence of the Religious Right, reflected in speeches at the Republican Na- tional Convention, "is a killer for the GOP in moderate northern sub- urbs," Phillips writes.

That problem is not confined to the North, according to GOP offi- cials here and in Texas. The defection of Republican women in the Dallas and Houston suburbs cost Republicans the 1990 gubernatorial race in Texas and the same problem threatens Bush in states like Texas and Georgia this year. Becky M. Seely, a teacher in a private school in the upscale Atlanta suburb of Buckhead, fears that Bill Clinton "will give the green light to tax-and- spend Democrats in Congress," but she disagrees so strongly with Bush on abortion and control of semiau- tomatic weapons that she may not vote for him again.

Like others in suburbia, she was initially attracted to independent Ross Perot by his emphasis on budget-balancing and early- childhood education, but "I hardly know what to make of him now. It's difficult to tell if he's serious about running or not."

She is not one who will be swayed by Clinton's draft record. "I don't care a flip about that. Every- one I knew his age was trying to stay out of Vietnam."

So Bush has a lot of persuading to do in places like this.

the community," he said.
"The community is left
with the aftermath."

Police and other local agencies, including the UCSB Major Events Committee, have adopted a policy of "preparing for a worst-case scenario and working toward having a best-case scenario," Alvarez said. There will be three phases of keeping order during the weekend, Alvarez said, a procedure that police officers have

found effective in the last five years.

The first phase involves police officers patrolling the area, the second includes roadblocks in the internal streets of I.V., such as Del Playa and Sabado Tarde, according to Alvarez. The third phase and last resort used by police will be closing off entrance into I.V. entirely.

"It's pretty much a turn-key operation, we know where to station the paramedics," Chaconas added.

"We have the main station, the police officers and we know what to expect."

Many local groups are taking an active part in preplanning the weekend, according to I.V./UCSB Community Liaison Katherine Boyer. "We've been encouraging people to have a good time and to keep it local," she said.

Volunteers from Red Alert, a student safety group, will fill the streets during the revelry again this year, helping partiers who may be lost or victims of violence, Boyer said. Local merchants are also being encouraged to restrict beer sales to cans because of the danger bottles pose.

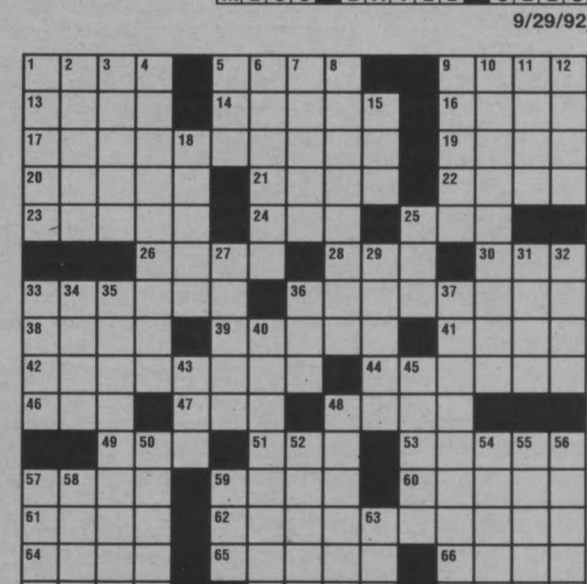

After Weekend Loss, Gauchos Will Host Santa Clara Tonight

Record Now 6-2

It's always nice to have an easier slate of matches following a tough contest, and the UCSB women's volleyball team has been afforded just that as it plays host to Santa Clara tonight (7:30, Events Center).

Fresh off a heartbreaking five-game loss to Pacific, the Gauchos will look to rebound against the Broncos. UCSB holds a lifetime 10-1 edge in the series and getting number 11 shouldn't be too difficult, although Gaucho hitter Kristie Ryan emphasizes that Santa Barbara isn't looking ahead.

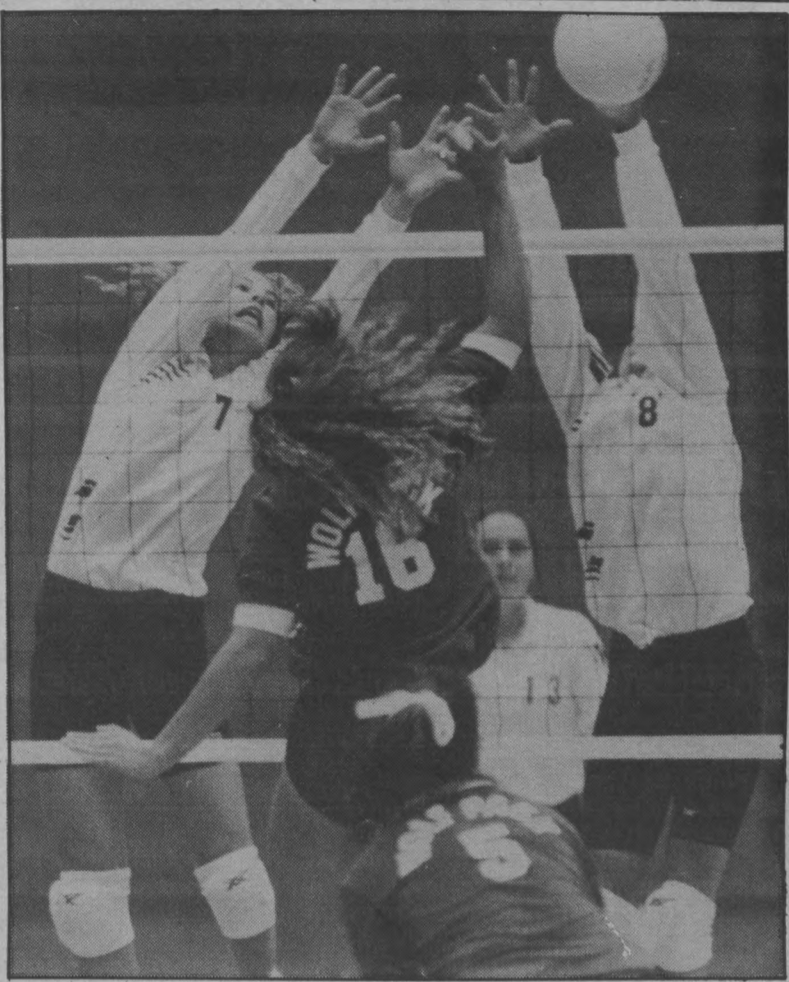
"Santa Clara has some pretty good hitters and some good ball-handling skills," Ryan said. "But if we play as well against them as we did against Pacific, we should beat them, but it will be a tough match."

One concern UCSB will have has a familiar face. Bronco middle blocker Holly Racine, who transferred to Santa Clara from UCSB last year, is third on the team with 131 kills and is adding almost one block per game. Racine, who was an All-Big West Freshman Team selection for UCSB in 1990, saw limited time with the Gauchos in 1991 due to injury problems and left the team to be closer to her San Jose home.

Another concern for the Gauchos is starting setter Chrissy Boehle, who stopped a fall with her head during Monday's practice. Boehle suffered dizzy spells and sat out the rest of the session but is expected to play tonight.

"I feel much better right now," Boehle said Monday night. "My neck is still stiff, but I'm not dizzy anymore. I'm going to get some treatments, and I'm planning on being out on the court (against Santa Clara)."

If Boehle can't go, the Gauchos will look to transfer Lisa Suwara to fill the setter role. Suwara was recently cleared to play after a transcript

mistake muddled her eligibility.

"We'll probably take advantage of our next few games to try different things," UCSB Assistant Coach Sharon Kasser said. "It's a good time to maybe try different people. Playing a team like Pacific helps you pick apart your weaknesses and it lets you know what you need to work on."

Lady Hoopsters Beat Odds, Begin German Pro Careers

When male athletes have outstanding senior seasons in college, many of them can look forward to opportunities in the professional sports ranks. However, for women, college has almost always marked the end of the line for an athletic career.

But not for a pair of former UCSB women's basketball standouts. Recent graduates Lisa Crosskey and Erika Kienast boarded planes bound for Germany last month to pursue careers in a European professional women's basketball league. Two of the key members of the Gauchos' 1992 NCAA Tournament squad, Kienast and Crosskey received offers to go abroad in July and began playing for their German teams this month.

UCSB Head Coach Mark French indicated Monday that although he hasn't heard the details of his former players' experiences in Germany, the early results have been positive.

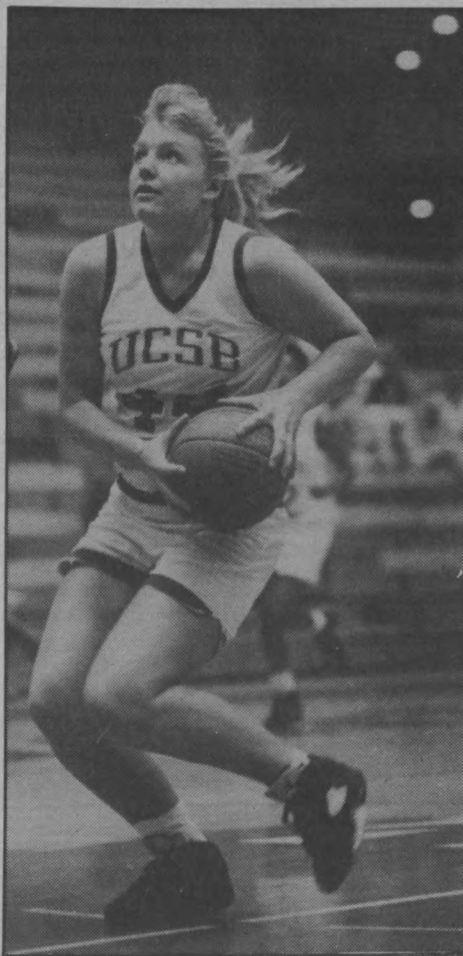
"We have pretty sketchy reports on how Lisa and Erika are doing," French said. "I've talked to both of their parents, and they're adjusting fairly well."

Crosskey was second in scoring for the Gauchos last year with a 14.8 point-per-game mark and also averaged 4.5 steals a game in her two years at UCSB. Kienast led the team to a Big West title in March, and ranked second in the conference with 11.1 rebounds a game last season.

A pair of former Gauchos not on their way overseas are Susie Matthews and 1992 Big West Player of the Year Barbara Beany. Both had received offers to play professionally in Europe, but both decided to follow educational pursuits. Matthews is currently studying physical therapy at Northern Arizona University, while Beany will remain at UCSB to complete her degree.

"Barb felt that the offers she got weren't right for her, as far as what country she wanted to go to or the level of competition," French said of Beany, who will also help coach the 1993 Gaucho squad. "She had the option of coming back and finishing her degree, which is a very high priority for her, so she decided to stay here."
