COACH ROY ENGLE PR EPARES for PRACTICE OPENING

The hardest worker and number one booster for the 1949 football team is Roy Engle, Santa Barbara football coach. Conscious of the importance of the outcome of the first game to the school and team's morale, Roy has been preparing to give Whittier College everything that the Gauchos have. Practice will start September 6.

The season will include the first appearance of the Gauches in the Los Angeles Coliseum when they meet Cal Aggies in a preliminary game before the UC-UCLA game as part of a four-campus day for the state university.

The setting of an Armistice Day afternoon game with Cal Poly as a tradition will be furthered as they meet for the second year on that date. This year the Gauchos will travel to the Cal Poly gridiron for their first football appearance in San Luis Obispo.

The school is fortunate in being able to play four strong organizations outside the conference. These are Pomona College, operating out of a modified "T", fast and tricky in the backfield. Occidental College, undefeated last year, strong line and good backs, a tough game in all phases. Cal Aggies, beaten by the Gauchos this year, barring an upset should repeat. Whittier, unknown this year, always a good line, important as the first game.

A shift in the schedule replaces College of the Pacific with Pepperdine College, as the new member of the CCAA. This will be the first football meeting between Santa Barbara and Pepperdine.

PICKARTS GAINS NEW LAURELS

By scoring his first victory on his current Scandinavian AAU tour, Delfs Pickarts gained added laurels for Santa Barbara College with a javelin throw of 228 feet 6 inches at Goetborg, Sweden recently. This outstanding throw beat Pickarts best previous toss by 7 feet.

Monday, Pickarts gathered another first place ribbon with a throw of 219 feet 9 inches at Stockholm.

Delfs will bring home several items for his wife, as first place winners are awarded Swedish vases, instead of the usual wrist watches given in the United States. Several festive banquets have been given the touring American track team, with special dishes in each of the cities visited. Pickarts gets a fine chance to see the Scandinavian countries as the team is split up into small groups to permit some 14 meets in 16 days with track teams from the smaller cities visited. The group will reconvene at Oslo, Norway, on August 16 for the return trip home.
