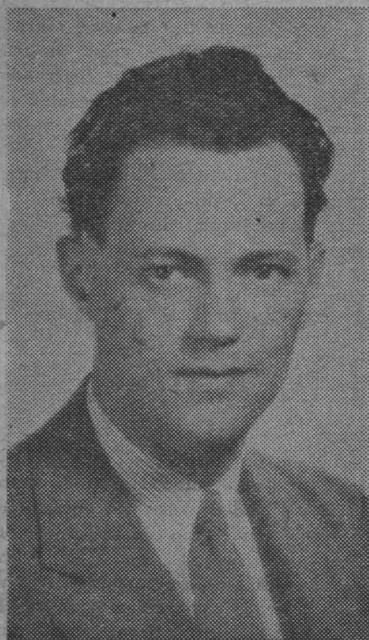

## Council Passes New Measure

### Constitution Amendments, Bradbury Appointment Feature Session

● In one of the most productive legislative meetings of the year, the student body council met last night in Pine Hall to pass many important measures. Of chief importance was the passage of many new amendments to the student body constitution, deemed necessary to meet present practices and situations, according to the student amendment committee which reported the changes.

Ann Seymour, head of the amendment committee, read the changes including the formation of an athletic board of control; a revision of athletic awards; a change in the voting members of the council; a new plan for election of class council representatives; and an act making the rally committee smaller. All of these proposals will be printed in El Gaucho next week, and will be submitted to the next student body assembly for vote.

### Bradbury Appointed

The finance committee chairman, Ed Cole, read recommendations appointing Walter Bradbury advertising-publicity manager under the new set-up of that bureau. The recommendation was passed by unanimous vote. Funds to support the department were voted from a surplus of the football program advertising, with the department going into operation at once.

Upon recommendation of the rally committee, the position of song leader was officially removed from the constitution, an amendment which will also be submitted for vote with the others to the student body. ## El Gaucho Returns to Weekly Ranks

● Beginning next week, El Gaucho will be issued weekly for the rest of the semester, upon action of the publications board. The paper will be issued on Friday mornings, being enlarged to a seven column size with a longer printed page length.

The change will bring a complete alteration of deadlines for stories to be printed and necessitates a more rigid enforcement, in order that the larger paper may be published on time. All feature stories, including letters to the editor, columns, poems and similar material will be due Wednesday afternoons by three o'clock preceding the issue date.

### Society Deadline

Society articles including all social sorority, fraternity, and honorary fraternity news will be required by Thursday noon. Sports will be finished by four o'clock on Thursdays with the exception of night events of that day, with general news meeting an eight o'clock deadline on the nights before publication. Absolutely no stories will be accepted after 8:00 p.m. unless personally approved by the editor.

All students interested in the outcome of the publication board meeting concerning the weekly printing of El Gaucho are asked to refer to the editorial columns of this issue.

## WORLD NEWS

● LOS ANGELES, MARCH 3—The heaviest rainfall of the year bringing over eleven inches of rain in the 4 day storm left the southland with 150 persons dead or missing and property damage estimated at 10 million dollars. With the weather report at 8:00 p.m. indicating scattered showers and clearing weather, flood danger and further trouble were not expected.

Los Angeles tonight was still without railroad lines to any outside points, with many communication lines down, one quarter of the city without lights, and traffic moving slowly if at all, on the majority of its highways. The Roosevelt highway north of Santa Monica is closed to all traffic, with northern traffic going by way of Sepulveda Blvd. to Ventura Blvd. to go north to Ventura and Santa Barbara. The Ridge Route to Bakersfield was able to carry only a small amount of traffic with the larger part being sent by way of Palmdale.

San Bernardino reported by way of radio that it was facing a food shortage as all roads of all kinds were closed leaving it completely isolated. Palm Springs, also reporting a shortage of milk supply, is to be relieved by morning through airplane dispatch.

## Assembly Runs Erosion Film

### Conservation Chief Shows Talking Picture as State Observes National Week

● National Conservation week, from March 7 to 14, will be observed by Santa Barbara State college with an assembly featuring a talking motion picture entitled "Muddy Waters," which will be shown by M. F. Herbert, chief of the United States Soil Conservation service.

The picture will show the results of the slack methods of conservation in the past and how effective methods have been employed for the prevention of soil erosion and floods. The picture comes to Southern California at an appropriate season of the year, since the Southland is suffering now from ineffective methods of flood control.

### Conservation Week

Conservation week programs throughout the United States will touch all fields of the service and public education programs, including forest conservation, desert reclamation, soil erosion, crop rotation, and wild life perpetuation.

In the case of meetings, which are optional, the freshmen will meet in the auditorium; the sophomores, in Pine hall 80; the juniors, in 42. Seniors will hold their meeting at some future date.

Gertie Notsobad, that's the frill's name, is a special friend of a friend of mine. We wanted to pay the dame a visit as she was not feeling very well. After obtaining the necessary references and letters of recommendation from the various deans and presidents we sallied forth with quaking things. Parking the

red monstrosity in front of Gertie's house we crept up the front walk. Coming to a huge iron fence that wasn't there last time we visited the joint, we saw a button with a sign saying "ring for attendant." As it was raining and kind of cold, and the fence was too high to climb we rang the bell. After several minutes of suspense a little window was opened and a little old lady in grey stuck her countenance through the aperture and wanted to know who, what, where, and why we were here and what we wanted. After telling her that we were Moreless Mockingbird and Robert Pickmeup calling to visit Gertie Notsobad she unlocked every one of the seventeen locks on the door and invited us in to her office. It was a bright, cheerful place and the bars on the window gave it that little domestic touch that prevails at girls' boarding houses. After offering us chairs and switching on a bright light that shone right in our faces she asked for our credentials. Robbie, who carried our trunk, pried off the lid and shoved it toward her.

Three hours later, when, upon reading all of our letters, birth cer-

tificates, and references as to our moral standing with the college, she directed us to place everything in our pockets on her desk. After removing our cigarets, pipes, and Robbie's little jug from the pile she returned our belongings and ushered us into Gertie's room that she shared with three other coeds from state.

### Unlucky 13

"You have thirteen minutes", smiled the house mother, as she left the door ajar and retired to her office to check up on our recommendations. Gertie, after saying "hello" in a hushed voice motioned us to straight backed chairs on the opposite side of the room. As we walked across the room we simultaneously cracked our craniums on a little can-affair suspended from the chandelier. Gertie explained that it was a dictaphone which led to the house mother's office; and also that that little box contraption in the corner of the room was even now engaged in taking motion pictures of everything that went on during our visit. ## The Future at Stake

AS was expected, and explained in the previous issue of El Gaucho, the publications board approved the recommendation of the finance committee to revert this paper to a weekly for the remainder of the semester. The action was taken, as expressed by the publications board, as an emergency financial measure, temporary in nature, and looking forward to a return to a semi-weekly paper next year under a new setup.

The important concern at this time is that this aim of bringing El Gaucho back to its proper standards relative to other activities on the campus not be forgotten or "pigeon-holed" when budgets are presented for the coming year. That danger was an actual occurrence last year when a verbal understanding for the carrying of El Gaucho was given by the finance committee then in office. To the end that no repeating of such an unfair happening be allowed, El Gaucho will feel it a duty to continue reminding the students and student council of the needs of this branch of student activity and the justification for them.

One of the brighter outlooks for the future of El Gaucho is that both an introductory and advanced journalism class will probably be given next year, much to the aid of both outside publicity work and this paper. Of second importance from our standpoint, comes the action of the enlarged publicity-finance committee which last week recommended the setting up of an advertising-publicity manager for next year to the council, which was accepted. Yesterday, upon authority delegated to it to consider applicants for the position, the committee chose a capable man, who was accepted by the council last night, so that he may go to work at once. With a closer lineage of El Gaucho and the new bureau, better advertising and news will undoubtedly result.

Although the staff of El Gaucho deeply regrets this step, yet agrees as to its necessity, the extra time for preparation of each issue should produce a more finished publication, and at the same time not interfere to such a degree as heretofore to the class work, study and sleep of the persons who are in the editorial and printing departments.

NOW that you are all nicely settled in your college homes and have been attending classes for at least six months this school year, we are giving you a gentle jolt from an educating easterner that maybe it's all a waste of time.

Simmons college's president is the jolter, and here's the jolt: "Don't assume that your . . . life is blighted . . . if (you don't) go to college." But, if you're already there, says he, "college work should be above all, an intellectual experience."

## Local Short Wave Saves Police Trapped by Flood in Auto

• The rain was literally coming down in sheets. The lights dimmed and blinked in an effort to keep burning and then finally faded out, leaving the city dark and wet. Except for the scurrying around for candles every activity came to a standstill and in a few radio shacks of amateur operators batteries were drug out in an effort to get the stations on the air. Bridges were out, telephone and telegraph lines washed away. This left the radio amateur stations the only possible means of communication.

With the amateur SOS, communication is made to tell of the conditions in that vicinity. One told that several hundred people are out of living quarters and that medical aid was needed; another radios that everything is all right in that community.

"QRA, (the SOS signal of amateurs) QRA, QRA, QRA, Santa Barbara, QRA, Santa Barbara, QRA, Santa Barbara, come in please," reached my ear as I sat in the Gaucho radio shack. Quickly I turned on the transmitter and said "W6HVM in Santa Barbara State college answering QRO and standing by, come in."

"Hello W6HVM this is W6\*\*\*

in Newhall calling. Two deputy sheriffs were patrolling near here on R\*\*\* road when an avalanche of water and mud swept down on them and washed their car from the road and nearly buried it in the mud. I heard them attempt to reach the Bakersfield police with the transmitter in their car but they couldn't establish contact. These men need help at once. Contact Bakersfield."

Quickly I answered the Newhall station and told the operator that I received his message right and that I would call the police. I called KGZO, the local police radio station and told them what I had just received and then tuned to the frequency of the police radio.

Just then the broadcast started, "KGZO, Santa Barbara Police department calling KSAC Bakersfield police, KGZO, Santa Barbara calling KSAC, Bakersfield police and standing by."

It wasn't long before the Bakersfield police had received the message and had rescued the stranded men. I turned the power in the Radio club's shack on again and spent most of the rest of the night listening for any more distress signals that I might hear and be able to be of some assistance in aiding.

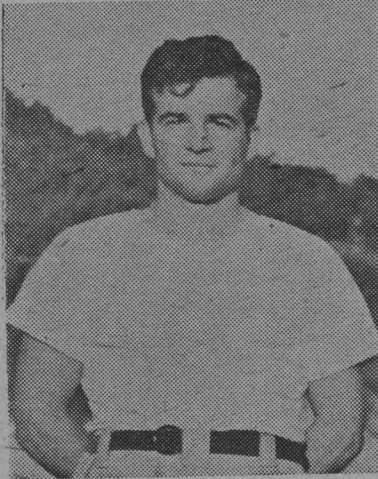

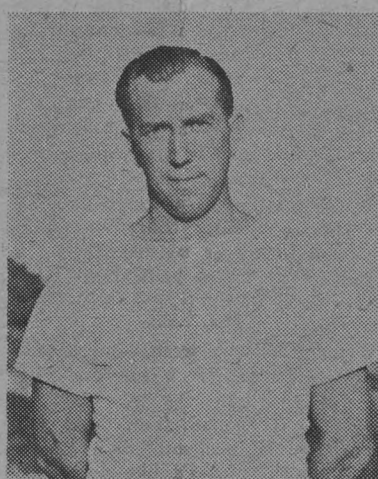

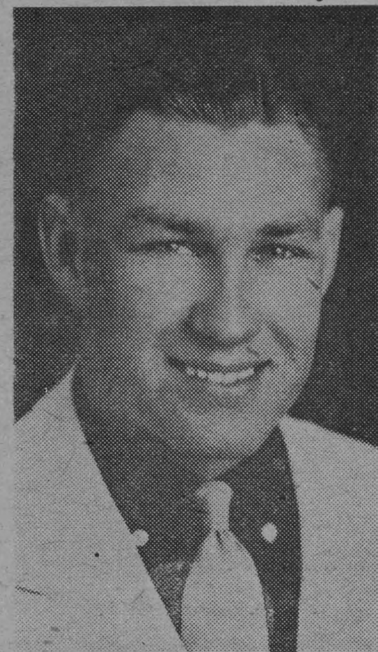
