Lady Gauchos Find UOP to Their Liking, Sweep Series

73-66 Win Over Tigers Gives UCSB First Sweep Since '90

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Sweeping Pacific has never been an easy thing to do for the UCSB women's basketball team. But Sunday the team had its shot and took full advantage of it to cap off a successful weekend.

The Gauchos (12-9 overall, 9-4 in the Big West) defeated the Tigers 73-66 in the Events Center to complete their first sweep of UOP since the '89-'90 season. Santa Barbara was also victorious in Friday night's game against San Jose State 75-68.

Against Pacific, UCSB seemingly had the game in hand midway through the second half with a 13-point lead, but a 14-2 Tiger run over the next five minutes cut the lead to one.

However, the Gauchos used a late 9-0 run, including two lay-ins from Christa Gannon (13 points, 10 rebounds) to spread the lead back out to 10 points and all but decide the game. The win pushes UCSB back into fourth place in the conference standings. Freshman Erin Alexan-

der led Santa Barbara with 16 points, including 9-for-9 from the free throw line. UCSB had a huge ad-vantage from the charity stripe shooting 28-for-37 while Pacific only shot 7-for-16.

"This is a really big win for us," Alexander said. "I don't think since Christa's [Gannon] been here we've beaten Pacific both times in the regular season. So, yeah, it's big for us."

Foul trouble plagued the Tigers all game as three of their top players fouled out. Karen Vesecky (16 points) was the first to go with 4:55 to play and then Sandy Hoge (15 points) and Geri McIntire fouled out with less than a minute to play. For Pacific Head Coach Melissa DeMarchi, that may not have been the only factor.

"They put Iesha Smith on the ball and she's a little bigger player and we just didn't make a good adjust-ment to it the first couple of possessions [after Pacific's run] and that was key," DeMarchi said. "And then we just sort of lost our momentum."

The Gauchos had to overcome a major shortage at the point guard position. Alexander was

SB Gymnastics Squad **Get Respect at Meets**

Going up against two of the top teams in collegiate gymnastics, the UCSB men's gymnastics did better last weekend than most expected.

The Gauchos traveled north to Palo Alto where they competed against Stanford and BYU before moving further to Berkeley Saturday in a meet which included a nonconference meet with the University of Washington Huskies who hope to join the Big West.

Stanford took Friday's meet ahead of BYU and

Same Story as Baseball Team Drops 2-of-3 to Sacramento St.

Once again, the UCSB baseball team displayed pitching difficulty and run-scoring prowess. The Gauchos dropped two of three games in a weekend series at Sacramento State; a series not lacking offensive firepower.

The Gauchos (2-6) began Friday's game in a familiar way, spotting the Hornets (2-2) a 7-1 lead. The lead was too large to overcome for UCSB, who eventually ended up losing the game, 13-7. UCSB Starter Steve Lane (1-1) took the loss, giving up 12 hits and nine earned runs in 3 1/3 innings.

Sacramento State pounded out 18 hits in the game, with a trio of Hornets collecting three hits and three others collecting two apiece. Designated hitter Steve Thobe had two doubles and four runs batted in.

"We threw more strikes and I was pleased to see that," UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "However, we didn't necessarily hit our locations."

UCSB's defense was also sub-par, as the team committed four errors in the game, seven total in the series. "There's no way we can commit errors like that," Brontsema said. "Especially if our pitching isn't sharp, we need our defense to be stronger. Right now the defense isn't where it needs to be."

Saturday's game was made into a doubleheader when the teams decided to move Sunday's game up a day in order to avoid rain. "Moving the game actually turned out to be a detriment to us," Brontsema said. "We were short on pitching and our relievers couldn't go as many innings.

In the first game, the Gauchos were able to jump out to a lead, scoring four runs. Shortstop Matt Bokemeier paced the offense with three hits, two runs and three **RBIs**.

"One of the things the coaches were happy with is that after we got beat on Friday, we came out and took the first game on Saturday," Bokemeier said. "We really had a chance in the second game, we just lost in the last couple of innings. We played well for 17 innings that day."

Starting pitcher Jared Janke (1-0) earned the win, pitching six solid innings. Steve Cain came on in relief and was touched for three late-inning solo homers, but UCSB managed to hang on to win.

In the second game of the doubleheader, the Gauchos had trouble on the mound and at the plate.

Sacramento won 11-6, allowing UCSB only six hits and two earned runs. Hornet starter Jason Beeman (1-0) earned the win, scattering four hits and two earned runs over five innings.

Gaucho starter Ryan O'Coyne lasted only 1 1/3 in-nings, giving up four hits and five runs. Although Scott Randall (0-1) pitched well in relief — allowing only two hits and one earned run in 4 2/3 innings — he took the loss for UCSB.

"Randall's really come on and pitched well," Brontsema said. "When he gets his stamina up, we're going to use him quite a bit more."

UCSB's offense in the game was provided by Doug Smaldino, who had two hits and scored three runs, and Clark Parker, who hit a solo shot in the third inning. Smaldino also stole three bases in the series.

Pitching definitely remains the Gauchos' biggest worry. In the three-game series, the Hornets scored 31 runs on 41 hits, including six home runs. The Santa Barbara bats were also productive as the team belted out 23 hits and scored 23 runs in the series. The Gauchos return home to Caesar Uyesaka Stadium

for a Wednesday afternoon game at 2:00 against the Cal State Northridge Matadors.

Which they did, as the frontline trio of Doug Muse, Rob Ramaker and Kyle Milling turned in one of their best collective efforts of the season. Ramaker had the best performance thus far in his rookie campaign as he scored a career-high 17 points, grabbed 12 rebounds and made 5-of-7 free throws in the final few minutes of the game to help keep the Tigers at bay.

"I wish there wasn't so many bounce-backs and there were wins right after wins," Ramaker said. "This team is fighting a lot of adversity and it's good to come out right after a loss and play hard. We've just got to keep playing this way. We've got to get a streak going."

Milling snapped out of his offensive doldrums as he scored 15 points on 6-for-7 shooting. The so-phomore forward played aggressively on both ends of the floor and looked to score more than he had been doing recently. Muse scored 14 points and ripped down nine rebounds though he only played 15 minutes of the contest due to foul trouble.

Muse picked up his third and fourth personal fouls less than three minutes into the second half. He fouled out with 5:58 to play when he was called for going over the back of UOP's Glenn Griffin. Sophomore guard Phil-lip Turner led UCSB with 18 points and six assists on the night while freshman guard Adam Jacobsen led Pacific with 23 points. Jacobsen did his damage from three-point land as he hit six on the game. Tiger gunner Michael Jackson, who torched the Gauchos for 38 points last month in Stockton, was held to just 12 points on the night.

In the final 3:37, the Gauchos hit 15-of-21 from the free throw stripe to hold on for the win. On the season, Santa Barbara had been shooting just under 63% from the line as a team. Though UCSB was at only 67.6% for the game, they made the free throws when they had to.


'[The free throws] were a big factor," Pimm said. "We've been working on it and it's good to see that some of the concern and work has paid off."

The Gauchos blew open the game late in the first half after the lead had seesawed back and forth. After Jackson's leaner off the glass tied the game at 29-29, UCSB went on a 14-3 run over the final 3:57 of the first half. Mark Flick and Tecon Madden hit back-to-back three-pointers and a Madden 15-footer gave UCSB a 39-31 lead. With 1:00 remaining, Turner drove the lane and got a spinning, off-balance jumper to fall with Jacobsen draped all over him.

A lane violation was called on UCSB to deny Turner the three-point play but the Gauchos went into the half with a 44-32 lead.

"We were pushing the ball and getting easier shots," Turner said. "We didn't have to work as hard. The big men were running and filling the lanes and we were getting easy buckets."

"We were just trying to redeem ourselves from the last game and we had a much better combination of offense and defense tonight," he added.



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"We just didn't play out on him as much and give him a chance to drive," Pimm explained. "We looked at his three-point percentage (24.1%) and we know we have him in a situation where he's not nailing the threes. We wanted to exploit that and guard off of him to contain


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Spikers Finish in Sixth at San Diego St. ASICS Tournament



die. At no point during the game did either team have a lead bigger than the final margin of seven. There were five lead changes and 13 ties along the way in what was one of UCSB's most nerve-racking games of the year.

The Gauchos ultimately won the game at the free throw line, scoring eight of their final 10 points from the stripe after SJSU tied

15-12, 15-5) but lost to #11 Hawaii (15-13, 15-13, 13-15, 13-15, 18-16), #9 SDSU (15-6, 15-12, 11-15, 15-8) and #8 Cal State Northridge (15-7, 15-11, 10-15, 15-6). The Gauchos' overall record is 5-6, while the squad's MSPF record remains at 2-3

Déjà vu set in on Friday morning during UCSB's first match of the weekend as Hawaii, who handed the Gauchos their first loss of the season in a fivegamer several weeks ago, made UCSB earn 16 points in the rally-scoring fifth before taking the match.

The Rainbows outhit (.321-.276) and outdug (58-46) the Gauchos as UCSB's freshman outside hitter Donny Harris re-corded a team-high 26 kills (.370). Junior outside hitter Daren Torbet added 13 kills (.385), 12 digs and eight blocks while junior middle blocker Carter Reese recorded 10 kills (.333) and 10 blocks.

Later that afternoon against George Mason, UCSB hit an outstanding .417 as Torbet amassed 18 kills (.593). Senior outside hitter Sean Stafford added 15 kills (.571) and eight digs.

Long Beach was Santa Barbara's next victim as the Gauchos hit for 37.3% efficiency while outblock-ing the 49ers 19-14. Six Gauchos recorded double Gauchos recorded double figures in kills with sopho-more outside hitter Doug Hughes finishing with a match-high 20 kills (.429) to go along with eight blocks. Reese added 13 kills (.296) and 10 blocks and sophomore Todd Ro-gers recorded 12 kills (.450), eight digs and eight blocks.

The hosting Aztecs made it 2-0 against the Gauchos in 1994 on Saturday evening as SDSU grossly outblocked UCSB

15-13, 15-7) and #15 (29-13). On the flip side, George Mason (15-12, the Gauchos grossly outdug the Aztecs (86-52) as Harris had 21 kills and 11 digs. Reese added 17 kills (.391) and Rogers dug 22 balls.

With the loss to the Aztecs, the Gauchos dropped into the consola-tion bracket where they made the LMU Lions look like kittens on Sunday morning by outhitting Loyola .389-.215. Torbet and freshman middle blocker Robert Treahy each finished with a

match-high 13 kills (.571 and .286 respectively).

In the squad's sixth and final match of the tourney, Santa Barbara committed a team weekend-high 21 service errors and 33 attacking errors. Rogers finished with 17 kills



"Obviously, now look-ing back on it, it was a very poor decision," said **UCSB** Head Coach Mark French on playing Aguinaldo. "Those decisions are always left to our medical staff and Dio wanted to play. But ... maybe we shouldn't have done it. Dio can't play any other way and it's a dangerous

way for her body." "She gave us a huge spark and I'm sure one of the reasons we won the game was because people were on the bench saying, 'Dammit, let's not lose this game. Let's do it for Dio."

In Friday's contest, Gannon had one of her biggest games of the season, scoring 17 points and pulling down 10 rebounds. Iesha Smith the game at 65-65 with 3:01 to go. Alexander (10 points, four assists) hit on all four of her free throw attempts in the final 22 seconds to seal the game.

'The thing that pleased me about the game was that with about seven minutes to go, I called a time out and told the team that I thought they were outhustling, out-scrapping and out-hearting us," French said. "I told them that this might be the turning point of the year. This is a point where we're sick, we're hurt, we don't like the officials, etc. There's all sorts of reasons to fold and I was pleased that we were able to hold together and respond to the challenge.
