Hibernating; **Team Falters**

When a team is playing at its best, it takes advantage of every opportunity afforded it during a game. Every hit seems to find a hole, and every big out is recorded.

Lately the UCSB softball team (20-19 overall, 4-10 in the Big West) has not been able to get that key hit or crucial out. Consequently, it has lost five of its last six games.

Sunday the Gauchos were shut out twice in a doubleheader sweep at the hands of Cal State Fullerton. Santa Barbara had eight singles in the first game, but left 10 runners stranded in a 4-0 loss.

In the second game, Titan pitchers Danielle Ferreira and Dana Coombes combined to shut out the Gauchos 1-0 in a pitcher's duel.

UCSB freshman pitcher Jennifer Tolton threw seven strong innings in a losing effort. Tolton gave up only two hits, and the one run was unearned. Fullerton center fielder Rachel Olivera dropped down a bunt and managed to make it all the way home

NCAA Tourney Opener

WASHINGTON, D.C. — When down by 17 points, the only thing left to do is attempt to charge back. The UCSB women's basketball team nearly did just that March 15, when the squad's season came to a close in a controversial 72-69 loss to Tulane University in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

The Gauchos (24-7) reached the NCAA Tournament after defeating UC Irvine 81-66 March 8, earning the Big West Conference's automatic bid. Santa Barbara was then shocked and dismayed as the NCAA selection committee gave the team a #13 seed and placed it in the East Regional.

The early pace of the game vs. Tulane favored UCSB, as both teams raced up and down the court in the opening minutes. The Gauchos struck first as senior forward Amy Smith, who was named Big West Tournament MVP, knocked down a jumper 21 seconds into the game. Freshman Kristi Rohr made one free throw and Smith buried another jumper before the Green Wave posted its first points with 16:45 left in the first half.

Tulane (27-4) struggled to find a rhythm in its half-court offense but eventually began pounding the ball inside to its post players. Senior center Barbara Farris scored Tulane's first five points of the game, using her size to dominate the paint. Once secure in its offense, the Green Wave went on a 10-0 run to build a 13-7 lead midway through the first half.

Although Tulane owned a size advantage in the middle, Head Coach Lisa Stockton was surprised by UCSB's defense.

'They are a lot more physical than we expected," Stockton said. "We are used to playing more traditional post players, so Smith caused us some problems."

Freshman point guard Stacy Clinesmith responded to Tulane's in-side game by scoring seven of UCSB's next nine points to put Santa Barbara back on top, 16-13. The Green Wave then went on another run in the last five minutes of the first half to go up 29-21 at the break.

Men's Basketball Loses First Game in Big West Tournament to Aggies

The UCSB men's basketball season ended similar to the way it was for most of the year - without fanfare.

The Gauchos (12-15) bowed out to Utah State 81-66 in the opening round of the Big West Tournament on March 7 in Reno, Nev

Led by First Team Big West selection Marcus Saxon, the Ag-gies attacked Santa Barbara on offense and played ferocious defense.

'They broke us down with the dribble and then beat us on the backboards," said UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm. "I thought we did a good job of getting it back to where we had a chance. It took a lot out of us. It's just too bad that we couldn't sustain it."

Utah State took a commanding edge inside with its post play-ers, out-rebounding the Gauchos 40-31, including a 22-3 edge in the starting-forward positions.

Gaucho Baseball Remains Confident After Slow Start, Ready to Turn Things Around

Last year's UCSB baseball squad started Big West Conference play slowly, losing its first three games. That squad, however, stormed back in the middle of the season to earn a berth in the NCAA West Regionals at the end of the year. The 1997 team is hoping to

have the same kind of turnaround. After starting the conference season 4-8, the Gauchos now own a sub-par 14-17 overall record — far below the 20-11 mark they had at this point last

will rest on their pitching. With only seven regular pitchers on the team, the staff is eager to live up to its task.

"Our pitchers will need qual-ity starts," said junior starter Seth Bean. "When you have good starts, you keep your confi-dence and you build confidence for the rest of the team. I see the same thing happening this year as last year. I think we'll rebound well.

The starting pitchers showed signs of brilliance this weekend. With Brontsema juggling his rotation, senior Bryan Noyes (2-2), freshman Barry Zito (1-5) an Bean (2-5) all turned in solid performances against Nevada.

Like most college baseball tailed in conference play. Led by teams, the fate of the Gauchos senior David Willis, Santa Barsenior David Willis, Santa Bar-bara is batting at a .310 clip and averaging 7.9 runs per game.

Willis, an All-American can-didate, leads the squad with a .393 average, nine home runs and 31 RBIs. He is also the team leader in doubles (12), total bases (87), slugging percentage (.744) and on-base percentage (.493).

Five other Gauchos in the lineup are batting above .300: sophomore second baseman Bryan LaCour (.327), sophomore left fielder Brad Wright

"Inside, we had a size advantage, but they had a quickness advantage," said junior guard Raymond Tutt, who scored 22 points to lead UCSB. "We really couldn't cover down off of their guards because they're great shooters. We had to just go one-on-one with their post players, and they just got us." Tutt, whose 22 points made him the all-time single-season

scoring leader with 649 points, was held in check for most of the night.

"It seemed like they knew our plays," Tutt said. "They were ready to play.'

Saxon had 25 points and four assists in his 32 minutes. Senior Maurice Spillers contributed 21 points and 11 rebounds while junior Antwan Smith added 14 points and 11 boards for the Aggies.

These are tough guys right now," said Utah Head Coach Larry Eustachy. "When we can spread the floor late, have a nice little lead and go to the foul line, we're looking good."



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
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
