Close Leads Women Over the Rainbows

Senior's 24 Points, Free Throws Key SB's 64-60 Win vs. Hawaii

When the women's basketball teams of UCSB and the University of Hawaii meet up, the game always seems to come down to the wire; when the teams faced off Sunday at the Events Center, the afternoon game was no exception.

The Gauchos (4-6 overall, 3-0 in the Big West) were able to extend their winning streak to four after squeaking out a hard-fought 64-60 victory over the Rainbow-Wahines. For Hawaii (9-3 overall) the loss was its first in the conference after going 3-0 in league play.

Senior Cori Close was one of the main reasons the Gauchos were able to prevail yesterday, as the UCSB point guard scored a game-high 24 points on the day, including two clutch free throws with :07 left to seal the win.

"This morning, [assistant coach] Tony Noonan stood behind me and said that if I missed a free throw, my shorts were going down," Close said of UCSB's Sunday morning practice. "I made 20 in a row with him standing right behind me.

"There's really no pressure there," added Close of the free throw line, where she shot a perfect 6-for-6 Sunday. "You've just got to do what you do every day in practice."

There were eight ties and eight lead changes in the game overall, and neither team had a lead of larger than five points at any time. UCSB Head Coach Mark French indicated that he had expected such a close contest heading into the game.

"Our offenses are very similar in terms of on-ball screens from the points and the motion offenses," French said. "We kind of billed this match up all week as [Hawaii's Melanie] Azama versus Cori, and it was going to come down to which of those point guards was going to get the better of things. I think Cori rose to that challenge very well."


Santa Barbara might not have been able to stay in the game early in the first half were it not for the hot outside shooting of sophomore Anna McConnell. With the Wahines ahead 12-8, McConnell nailed four jumpers from the 15-foot range in a three minute span, the last one cutting Hawaii's lead to 19-18. The teams then traded baskets all the way to halftime, with the Rainbows leading 30-29 at the break.

As play resumed, UCSB took a 31-30 lead on a Becky Brown lay-in, a lead the Gauchos would hold for the next 10 minutes of play. It didn't stand, however, as Hawaii's Alison Golnick connected on an 18-foot jump shot to give Hawaii a 49-48 lead with 9:20 to go.

The Wahines held the lead until freshman Sasha Scardino's leaning 5-footer put UCSB ahead to stay with 5:27 to go. The Gauchos did get a scare late when junior forward Christa Gannon fouled out with 4:10 to go, but Close then took over for the rest of the game, scoring eight of Santa Barbara's last 10 points.

"[UCSB's] a very good team, well-disciplined," Hawaii Head Coach Vince Goo said. "At halftime, we knew they'd come back and play hard. I think we should play better than that, but they outplayed us, out-rebounded us, got the loose balls, played better defense, better free throw shooting, everything. That's the type of team they're

Busy Swimmers, Divers Roll to Victories During Weekend

UCSB Squads Dominate in Wins vs. Lafayette, UCSD

The UCSB men's and women's swimming and diving teams are no strangers to busy schedules.


The diving team competed during each day of the weekend, hosting Lafayette (Penn.) College on Friday and then traveling south for the UC Irvine Invitational Saturday. Meanwhile, after hosting a pair of meets last week, UCSB's swimming squads defeated both Lafayette and UCSD during the weekend.

The Gaucho swimmers and divers were

expecting to prevail over their weekend opponents, and UCSB was able to put away Lafayette and UCSD with relative ease, taking first place in every event. The women blew away both teams with a meet score of 157-41, and the men trounced on Lafayette 169-69.

"The two programs that came here are coming off of an intense schedule and weren't concerned with the score," UCSB Head Coach Gregg Wilson said. "They came to Santa Barbara knowing they were going up against a team that was deeper and faster so their primary con-

Russell Adds Another Young Talent to UCSB Women's Tennis Program

UCSB women's tennis head coach Chris Russell, who is in the midst of building what is possibly his most talented team to date, added another piece to the puzzle of the Gauchos' future recently.

Russell successfully recruited the #2 player in Northern California's 18 and under division, as highly touted prep player Naneeah Piccuta has signed a letter of intent to attend UCSB next

year. Piccuta will join a 1993-94 squad that will consist of three sophomores, seven juniors and only one senior.

"She is a very spirited and explosive player, who is definitely going to help our program break into the top-20 in the nation," Russell said of Piccuta.

While top schools such as San Diego State and UC Berkeley also recruited the 18-year old Monterey native, Piccuta indi-

cated that she chose Santa Barbara because of its warm climate and friendly atmosphere, which remind her of her hometown.

"UCSB is where I really want to go, and I know my hard work that I put forth in tennis will help me work hard in my academic interests of psychology and environmental studies," Piccuta said.

Russell added that he was impressed with Piccuta's interest in

being part of building a top-20 program.

"This is the deepest and youngest amount of talent I've seen and Naneeah coming in next year will only deepen and strengthen us further," Russell said. "Our talent—added with a strong work ethic and desire to excel—will be a powerful force for our opponents to deal with."

Piccuta indicated that she hopes to compete in singles play,

help motivate the team and push UCSB's squad to its potential.

"Chris Russell is a big part of why I chose Santa Barbara, because he is the kind of coach that helps win championships and motivates his players in positive ways," Piccuta said. "Also, how can you beat UCSB's campus, with the outgoing people and the beach?"

and competition."

UCSB and Lafayette had never met each other in competition prior to this weekend, but because Wilson and Lafayette Head Coach Mike Recine have been longtime friends, the matchup was arranged. The two coaches put on a training camp together over the summer months and have anticipated the meeting of their two teams in season competition.


"It's great to finally be matched up with Coach Wilson because we talked about competing a year or so ago," Recine said. "It was nice to finally get it together and come to Santa Barbara. We like it in Santa Barbara, it's a nice change for us."

The Men

The Santa Barbara men swam in off events and still proved to be the dominant force in the dual meet. UCSB junior Bill Sweeney swam in the 500-yard freestyle for the first time and placed first with a time of 4:52.18, while freshman Tim Gair won the 100-yard butterfly in 53.45 seconds.

"The 100 fly was a pretty good swim for me," Gair said. "My time was the fastest I wanted to swim, so it was a good race."

UCSB's Kevin Hoffman came two seconds shy of his season best in the

100-yard backstroke (52.65 seconds) and freshman Ted Poser placed first in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 22.26 seconds.

"I'm feeling good and happy that I'm getting consistent," Hoffman said. "Things are definitely progressing."

UCSB team captain Derigan Silver led the Gauchos with first place finishes in both the 100 and 200-yard freestyle events. In the 200-yard freestyle, Silver was just seconds shy of his all time season best with a time of 1:44.47.

"I was hoping that my 200 freestyle would be a little bit faster," Silver said. "I wanted to go season

best but I was happy with the way the race turned out."

The Women

The Lady Gauchos also controlled the meet with first place finishes in all events. The UCSB squad was up against both the women of UCSD and Lafayette, and won without much effort.

"We weren't expecting a lot from Lafayette and UC San Diego," UCSB swimmer Meredith McLain said. "Everyone was a little low-key in this meet and we didn't all swim in our best events."

Switching events didn't hinder the performances of the Santa Barbara women, as UCSB junior Ste-

phanie Raymond and freshman Kelly Bauer swam their season bests. Raymond topped her time in the 200-yard backstroke (2:11.53), while Bauer posted a best with a time of 2:31.09 in the 200-yard breast stroke.

"I thought I did well considering the weather conditions weren't ideal and the meet was basically a low-pressure meet," Raymond said.

Other Gaucho standouts included sophomore Stacy St. Martin, who won the 1,000-yard freestyle in 10:24.16, and freshman Ashley Cusato, who placed first in the 500-yard freestyle (5:14.67) and second in the 1,000-yard freestyle with a time of

10:45.19.

"I saw some real good performances from the women and I think we have achieved what I wanted out of the meets against these teams today," Wilson said.

Diving

Meanwhile, the Santa Barbara diving team also cruised to victory over Lafayette, as the Gaucho squad posted victories in both the 1-meter and 3-meter diving competition.

On the men's side, UCSB junior Ted Moore won on the 1-meter low board, with sophomore Rick Alter taking second place. In the 3-meter high board, freshman Toby Reclusado placed first. For

the women, Santa Barbara junior Erin Evans took top honors in both the 1-meter and 3-meter boards.

"We are really looking strong and the performances we got from the team really helped to get us ready for the Invitational in Irvine," UCSB diving coach Mike Lewis said.

In the two-day invitational, the Santa Barbara squad went up against teams such as UC Davis, Colorado State and Northern Arizona. The Gauchos took two first place finishes and placed third in two diving events.

Evans took first in the 1-meter low board for the UCSB women, while Reclusado also won on the low board for the Santa Barbara men. UCSB freshman Shannon Brown took third in the 1-meter competition and Moore placed third in the 3-meter.

"We had some good competition and I was happy with our teams' diving performances," Lewis said. "It was raining throughout the weekend and sometimes, psychologically, it can be tough."

Despite the strong performances over the past week, the Santa Barbara squads are looking ahead to their biggest dual meet of the season when they travel to UNLV next week.

"These recent meets were good preparations for us, but we are really going to have to focus in for UNLV," Wilson said. "They are an excellent dual meet team and are going to be tough to beat away."

Before Sunday's UCSB women's basketball game against Hawaii, one of the members of last year's Gaucho team that went 27-5 into the NCAA Tournament was honored as the 1992 NCAA Woman of the Year at Santa Barbara.

Recent UCSB graduate Susie Matthews was given the award for her outstanding achievement on the court, in the classroom and work in the community.

"I'm really honored to receive the award because I was much more of a well-rounded player than a star," Matthews said. "So it was nice to get rewarded for my accomplishments. I had some really great teammates and I feel blessed to be able to have been a part of that."

Matthews now attends graduate school at Northern Arizona University, where she is working for her master's in physical therapy.


