Antoon, Gauchos Double Their Pleasure

1st-Baseman Sets Doubles Record as UCSB Wins 2


Another weekend brought another record for UCSB first baseman Jeff Antoon at Loyola Marymount.

Antoon, who last weekend became UCSB's and the Big West's all-time RBI leader, is now also the school's and conference's all-time doubles leader as the senior pounded out five doubles in three games against the Lions to lead Santa Barbara to wins in two of the three contests.

After rain wiped out the scheduled series opener Friday afternoon, the Gauchos and LMU played a doubleheader on Saturday and split the pair — UCSB winning the first game, 10-6, while the Lions came back to take the darknessshortened nightcap, 4-1 in six innings. Santa Barbara captured the series finale Sunday afternoon, 6-3.

Antoon now has 53 career doubles, breaking Erik Johnson's earlier UCSB record of 50 and Fresno State's Eddie Zostra's Big West mark of 51.

Two of Antoon's doubles came in Saturday's first game when the Gauchos also got a power burst out of freshman catcher Matt Bazzani, who hit two home runs to give starting pitcher Armando Delsi (2-0) a big

lead. After UCSB held a 7-1 in the fourth inning, the Lions closed the gap to 7-6 at the end of the seventh. However, the Gauchos (6-2) were able to put up three more runs in the ninth to seal the victory.



If this philosophy is to be believed, than the UCSB men's track and field team was very successful in its season opening meet Saturday at Pauley Track.

Not that the nonscoring meet against Azusa Pacific, Westmont and San Francisco State resulted in a poor performance from the Gauchos. In fact, Santa Barbara piled up six first-place finishes, eight seconds, seven thirds and three personal-bests during the

Showdown Tonight for Lady Gauchos

1st-Place UCSB Hosts 2nd-Place 49ers

The Events Center will be the site of a collision between the two top teams in the Big West conference tonight, as the 28th-ranked and first-place UCSB women's basketball team (15-3) will host #25 Long Beach State (14-5) at 7:30.

The teams are currently one-and-two in the conference,


with the Lady Gauchos sitting alone atop the Big West with an 8-1 mark, while the 49ers are tied for second at 8-2. Tonight's game is a rematch of a Jan. 25 contest at Long Beach, which saw UCSB record its first-ever victory over the 49ers, ending a 26-game losing streak spanning 19

While many expected the 49ers — Big West champs four of the last five years — to defeat UCSB last month, the Gauchos are set to prove that the victory was not an upset with a win again tonight.

Winners of 14 of their last 15 games, the Lady Gauchos are currently on a five-game winning streak, while Long Beach St. is coming off a Saturday loss at Fresno State, which dropped the 49ers into a three-way tie for second place with Hawaii and UNLV.

The 49ers are led by guard Trise Jackson, recipient of the most recent Big West Player of the Week honors. Jackson reached the 30-point mark in each of her last two games upping her season average to 18.1 points per game - third best in the conference. Jackson's teammate Kari Parriot, a 6'2" center, leads the Big West with an 11.9 rebounding

The Lady Gauchos enter tonight's game riding the hot shooting of forward Barbara Beainy, who upped her scoring average to 16.9 ppg with a 36-point performance last Thursday against Fresno State. Guard Lisa Crosskey led the attack for UCSB last month at Long Beach with 24 points, nabbing four steals and hitting two key threepointers down the stretch to seal the Lady Gaucho win.



UCSB setter Eduardo Rezende came up with a big service ace in the first game against San Diego State on Friday leading to the Gauchos' three-game sweep of the Aztecs, 17-15, 15-6, 15-10.

Spikers Sweep SDSU for Season's 1st Win

The UCSB men's volleyball team notched its first win of the season Friday, sweeping San Diego State in three straight games, 17-15, 15-6, 15-10.

The match was not only an important win, but was poetic justice as well. Last year the Aztecs defeated the Gauchos so soundly that San Diego St. Head Coach Jack Henn had his players practice after the match to give them a better workout. But this year Santa Barbara (1-3) had

more to prove than just coming up with a win.

"They were just a better team than us last year," UCSB outside hitter Éric Fonoimoana said. "Humiliation is very crucial to me. If you humiliate me once, you won't be able to do it again."

But this time there was nothing for Fonoimoana to be ashamed of, as he led the Gauchos with 20 kills and eight digs, at an impressive .452 clip. Gaucho middle blockers Jason Mount and Rob Heidger were equally impressive, as Mount compiled an attack percentage of .500 with 15 kills, while Heidger finished with a .547 clip with 13 kills.

Although it may seem as if it was an easy victory for the Gauchos, the match actually started off closer than UCSB would have desired. The Aztecs took an 11-9 lead in the first game before Santa Barbara battled back to tie the game and eventually go ahead, 16-15, on a service-ace by setter Eduardo Rezende. UCSB's Kory Hull completed the comeback with a roof at game-point to give the Gauchos the first game, 17-15.

"We didn't play as well tonight as we did last week at Long Beach," UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston said. "Maybe we wanted it too bad in the first game. We were a little jittery, and it just didn't seem to be clicking at that point.

The Gauchos never looked back, as they cruised through the next two games, while losing the lead only






