Suspect at Large for Ellwood Rape Attempt

Although caution is usually encouraged for women on excursions alone, female residents of Isla Vista and Goleta have especially good reason to be wary on their daily runs.

An attempted rape occurred Wednesday, Feb. 18 at approximately 9:30 a.m. The female victim was alone in the grove on the Ellwood Mesa just outside of I.V. when she was attacked at gunpoint by an unknown male, according to Santa Barbara County Sheriff Sgt. Jim Peterson.

"The 20-year-old female was walking along the trail when the suspect approached her and attempted to talk to her," he said. "She continued to walk, but the suspect produced a small blue-steel handgun and attempted to grab her. ... [The victim] was able to fend him off."

Though the man was last seen fleeing the area on a mountain bike and was not found when deputies were dispatched to the scene, the victim was able to provide a description, Peterson said.

"The suspect is described as a white male, 30 to 35 years old, six foot one, 160 pounds, with blond curly hair. He has approximately three days of growth on his beard," he said. "He was wearing a blue and red flannel, blue jeans and white hightop shoes."

I.V. Foot Patrol Senior Deputy Chip Messmore said that the IVFP is

Student Body President Target of Crank Call, Derogatory Epithet

■ Anonymous Voice Mail Cause for Concern

Suspicious were raised in the office of the Associated Students as a campus student government leader found himself on the receiving end of a racial controversy.

An anonymous voice mail message addressed to A.S. President Wayne Calvin Byrd II was found on the office answering machine on Feb. 5 at approximately 8 p.m., according to Byrd.

"I basically had to brush it off," he said. "I had to in order to maintain sanity. This is an individual who wanted to express what was on his mind."

The contents of the taped message are as follows:

"Wayne Byrd, motherfucker, you haven't done shit for the school, quit while you're motherfucker ahead. What's up nigga!"

Senior law and society major Tia Favors was the secretary that dis-

covered the message as she came in on Friday morning to check the machine. According to Favors, prank calls are not a rare occurrence at the office, although not many are this controversial. Prior to the message in question, there were several hang ups.

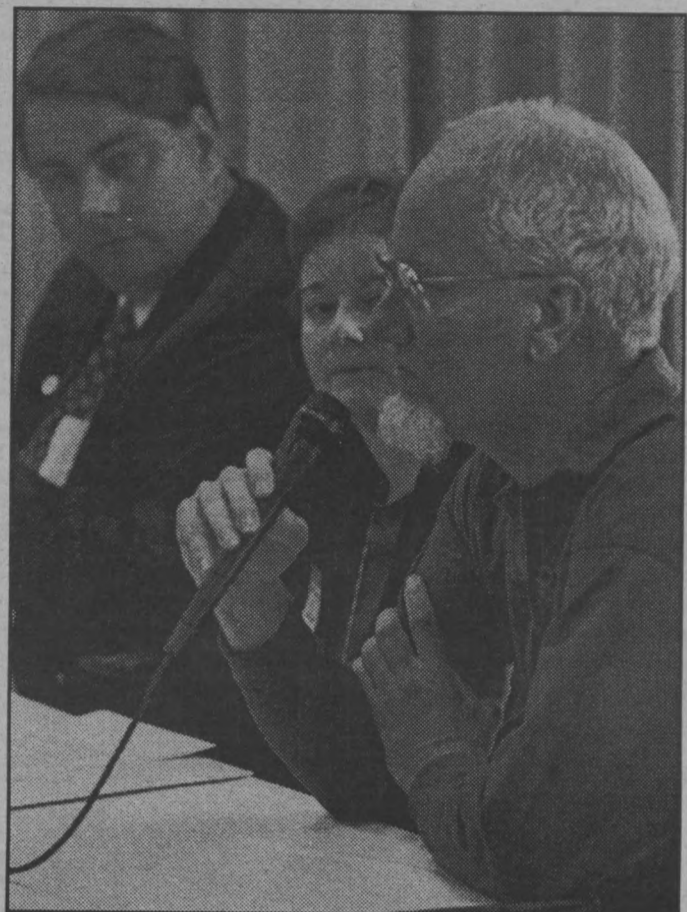
"There were quite a few hang ups, then I heard the message," she said. "We get some crank calls, but normally if it was a crank call, they just hang up or they don't give a name — so we disregard it. But this time, Wayne's name was given."

Favors presented the tape to her supervisor just as the A.S. attorney general walked by and heard the tape. After hearing the message, he instructed Favors to contact Byrd, who later documented a complaint, according to Favors.

Dean of Students Yonie Harris called the episode a rare act of cowardice.

"We don't get a very large num-

Candidates Prep Local Vote in Special Election Debate

With the 22nd Congressional District special election rapidly approaching, the three candidates met to debate several issues including the federal budget, IRS reform and the candidates' visions for the future of the central coast.

Republican candidate and Assemblyman Tom Bordonaro (R-Paso Robles), Libertarian candidate Robert Bakhaus and Democratic candidate Lois Capps' campaign manager Cathy Duvall spoke at the forum, which began at noon, Wednesday, Feb. 18, at the Goleta Holiday Inn. The Greater Goleta Chamber of Commerce hosted the debate, which

was mediated by the *Santa Barbara News Press* Editorial Page Editor John Lankford.

Bordonaro began the debate by explaining his view on the Federal Emergency Management Administration's role in disaster relief.

"Floods don't care if you're a Republican or a Democrat, neither do tornados or earthquakes," he said. "I would work to explore with the House Appropriations Committee on how we can set up some sort of a contingency fund."

Capps was unable to attend the debate because of prior commitments, but her responses were read by Duvall. In her statement, Capps expressed the need for cooperation between

Students Sleep Outside With Dreams of Secured Housing

Students braved the elements Tuesday evening, many of them sleeping outside overnight in a makeshift shantytown in order to ensure roofs over their heads for next year.

In hopes of securing a residence for the 1998-99 school year in University-owned off-campus apartments, students lined up outside of the UCen. Though contract sign-ups were available Feb. 18 at 10 a.m., students feared that yet another housing crunch would result in a shortage of vacancies, according to political science and business economics major Melissa McCarthy.

"[I'm waiting] because a lot of people got rejected for the dorms next year, and so as a last alternative people will be signing up for the Santa Ynez, Westgate and El Dorado apartments," the sophomore said.

Since the contract sign-ups are given out on a first-come, first-serve

basis, students were advised by the housing administration to arrive early, according to Shirley Foley, contracts manager for Apartment Living and Residential Services. Although Foley encouraged promptness, she explained that the advice did not imply forming a line the night before on the UCen lawn.

"We told no one to camp out, and we didn't encourage it. It's a safety hazard," she said.

Even though all open spaces for Santa Ynez, Westgate and El Dorado apartments were filled yesterday afternoon, the ALRS is continuing to receive applicants, according to Foley.

"All of the contracts were given out by 1 p.m., and we have taken names for a waiting list that is currently at about 100 students [long]," she said.

Priority for the contracts was allocated according to the students' situations and did not include sophomores who were not able to apply for housing until today, according to Foley.

Barnes & Noble Charged With Child Porn



MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — An Alabama grand jury indicted the nation's largest bookseller, Barnes & Noble, on child pornography charges involving the sale of books by noted photographers whose work includes pictures of nude children.

State Attorney General Bill Pryor said Wednesday he started the grand jury investigation after receiving complaints about two books being sold at Barnes & Noble stores in Alabama: "The Age of Innocence" by French photographer David Hamilton and "Radiant Identities" by San Francisco photographer Jock Sturges.

The indictment accuses the New York-based com-

pany of disseminating "obscene material containing visual reproduction of persons under 17 years of age involved in obscene acts."

Barnes & Noble Vice President Lisa Herling said officials had not yet seen the indictment and could not comment.

The indictment was returned by the grand jury Feb. 6 but not made public

until Wednesday. It involves 15 counts over the sale of "The Age of Innocence" and 17 counts over the sale of "Radiant Identities."

If Barnes & Noble is convicted, the company could be fined up to \$10,000 on

each of the 32 counts.

A Tennessee grand jury returned an indictment against the bookstore chain over the same books in November. The charge of distributing obscene material harmful to minors has not

yet gone to trial.

Sturges, reached at his studio, said Pryor will waste a lot of taxpayers' money on the prosecution because the photographs "are not done flirtatiously" and have been displayed in major museums worldwide, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

Sturges said "Radiant Identities" has sold more than 60,000 copies in nearly 10 years on the market.

Pryor contends the work is pornography rather than art because the photographs are "designed to elicit a sexual response."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Robert Downey Jr. was escorted from jail to Paramount Studios for a recording session — at his own expense, the sheriff's department said.

The trip Tuesday was court-ordered, said Deputy Steve Sciacca, who offered no further explanation.

After a series of drug arrests and second chances, the actor was led off to jail Dec. 8 for six months for violating probation by failing to stay clean and sober.

On Friday, Downey's nose was cut in a fight with another inmate in a common area and he was placed in a cell away from the general population.

Also, deputies found drug paraphernalia in another area where Downey ate and watched television with about 100 other inmates.

Officials were trying to determine the source of the contraband.

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Five satellites for the Iridium global telecommunications system hurtled to polar orbit Wednesday aboard a Delta II rocket that lit up the predawn sky.

The rocket blasted off at 5:58 a.m. and its tail of flame could be seen as far away as Los Angeles.

It was the seventh Iridium launch from Vandenberg. The rocket carried a cluster of five Motorola Iridium satellites placed in orbit about 420 miles above Earth. Wednesday's launch of the Boeing Delta II was delayed seven times due to bad weather.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Gunmen posing as police officers broke down a duplex door and terrorized 13 residents during a home invasion robbery, police said.

The intruders burst into the suburban Pacoima home at 12:15 a.m. Wednesday, tied up six adults and ordered seven children into a bedroom. The gunmen, wearing black jackets with "police" on the back, fled with \$500, Sgt. Frank Reynoso said.

"I was trying to see their faces but we couldn't turn

around. We were on the ground with pistols to our heads," victim Jose Montes said.

Reynoso said the seven youngsters were asleep when the robbers entered the home, and some of them woke up during the commotion.

None of the kids was tied up.

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — New killings in western Algeria claimed 23 lives Wednesday, Algerian security forces said amid reports of a new government campaign to wipe out armed Islamic groups in the region.

The latest victims were killed at Sidi Djilali, near the border with Morocco, about 340 miles west of the capital Algiers, a military statement said. It gave no further details.

No one claimed responsibility for the attacks, but such incidents are usually blamed on the Armed Islamic Group, which is seeking to overthrow the military-backed government.

The killings came as the government intensified efforts to wipe out armed Islamic groups in western Algeria, according to reports in independent Algerian newspapers.

PRAGUE, Czech Republic (AP) — President Vaclav Havel underwent successful throat surgery Wednesday to close a small crack in his trachea.

Doctors said the crack, in a scar from a 1996 tracheotomy, may have been caused by a coughing fit.

Air and some phlegm had been penetrating the crack, causing inflammation and creating a source of possible infection, Dr. Oldrich Tobrman told a news conference.

"I feel good so far, as the anesthetics are still working," Havel told Czech radio shortly after the hourlong surgery. "I'll feel some pain later, I guess."

The 61-year-old president underwent surgery for lung cancer in December 1996. After the operation to remove one-third of his right lung and a half-inch malignant tumor, doctors had to perform a tracheotomy to help him breathe.

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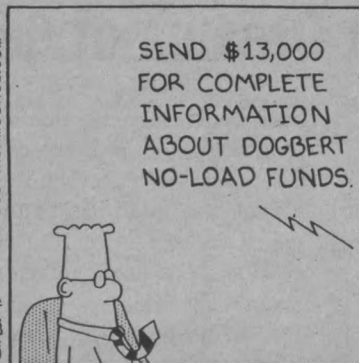

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SHS Offers Heartwarming Displays

Booths on Campus Are for American Heart Month

While the recent Valentine's Day might have been responsible for some broken hearts, health cupids are taking measures this week to make sure blood pressure and cholesterol do not kill our body's strongest muscle.

In recognition of American Heart Month, student health educators will be organizing information booths on campus for the rest of the week. Free blood pressure readings, information on heart care and a raffle of healthy snacks will be among the services and events offered to students, according to Student Health Services Health Educator Caroline Adams.

"Heart disease is still the number one cause of death in this country, and yet many people are kind of under the misconception that it's a disease of the elderly, but that's actually when we see the effects — the end result," she said. "The process begins as early as childhood, and that's why we want to educate UCSB students."

Adams pointed out that, despite their

youth, college students can be susceptible to heart disease.

"Basically, the things that put us at risk are ... tobacco use, lack of exercise, a poor diet, [and] chronic stress — these are all risk factors for heart disease, and UCSB students aren't immune," she said.

According to the National College Health Risks Behavior survey, in 1995 only 20 percent of college students exercised at the recommended levels. Students who are worried about their health or who consistently have measured blood pressures higher than 140/90 mm Hg can be referred to SHS for further consultation with the student health peers, Adams said.

An information table will be in front of the UCen today from 1-3 p.m. and at the campus bus loop on Friday from 1-3 p.m. In addition, SHS operates the Heart Care Clinic weekdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., on a drop-in basis.

informed of the situation and will be keeping a close watch while on its patrols.

"We have a fairly good description, and we've given it out to the patrol people," he said.

Messmore added that local residents should be careful all the time, but particularly when there is a possibly armed suspect at large.

"In the Isla Vista area, the women should walk around in groups of more than one or two, and they should also use the CSO service more

often," he said. "It would be in their best interest."

Peterson felt that the victim was lucky in her escape, but he would not usually advocate resisting an armed assailant.

"[The victim] felt that her chances were with fighting back, and she was able to wrestle the gun away," he said.

Peterson stressed the infrequency of these types of crimes in the local area.

"[Rape attempts are] rare up there," he said. "Especially anything involving a weapon."

Ellwood resident and ju-

nior communication major Jennifer Emmons doesn't usually worry about walking during the day, but she was concerned by the attack.

"During the day I'm more inclined to walk," she said. "I'll be more cautious, but I'm not going to ... have someone with me all the time. I'm not going to go out of my way."

Campus Forum Debates Probability of Peace in Future Global Societies

Students and faculty gathered together in the name of world peace yesterday afternoon to discuss issues of unity, toleration and diversity in the new millennium.

"World Peace in the New Millennium; Impossible or Inevitable?" featured a panel with Global and International Studies Chair Mark Juergensmeyer and Gloria Haithman, a professor of urban and interdisciplinary studies at USC. Inspired by Juergensmeyer's Global Studies 1 class, the event incorporated a discussion of world unity with a group of about 50 students and faculty.

Specific questions, ideas and interests were addressed in order to envision a world without violence or fear, according to Juergensmeyer.

"The phrase 'world peace' carries with it a lot of different kinds of thinking," he said. "But it basically means three things. One is the absence of strife or conflict between ethnic groups. Secondly, the absence of competition or control among nation states. And thirdly, it means some form of world order and culture that can moderate and mediate among tensions throughout the world."

Juergensmeyer stressed the importance of a unanimous effort to achieve world unity.

"[Peace will come] out of a real sense of collective responsibility, seeing that ultimately, only in a framework of moral and social order can these various concepts be mediated and a kind of collective security be

gained," he said.

According to Haithman, an alliance between all nations is the only feasible possibility for future survival.

"I think one of the most exciting phenomena in today's world is the cry for peace that's being heard," she said. "People are beginning to realize that the price of anything other than world peace is too costly to bear."

Haithman pointed to many indications of human progress in the past two decades, including the fall of the Berlin Wall and the ending of apartheid in South Africa.

Students in the audience directed several questions to the speakers concerning difficulties associated with racism, poverty and the widespread presence of war and personal conflict, according to senior history major Heather Hays.

"I liked how logic was brought into proving that world peace is possible, or inevitable. As humanity progresses, a global thinking is going to be necessary in order for us to coexist," she said.

Rob McClure, a self-proclaimed "unsatisfied" former UCSB student, felt that many obstacles remain on the road to peace.

"Both arguments were feasible, but there's still the problem of greed, destruction, war, unequal distribution of wealth — and all these things have roots in capitalism," he said. "We'll never achieve the ideal 'new world order' through capitalism."

A follow-up discussion for the "World Peace in the New Millennium" program will be held on Monday, Feb. 23, at 5:30 p.m. in the UCen Chumash Room.

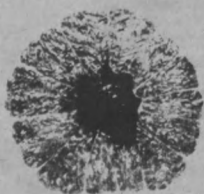
ber of complaints like this one. Once we have determined the violation on campus, we try to find out who did it, and sometimes it leads to involvement with the police," she said. "I would want the person to know the kind of feeling of pain and hurt that is caused by something like that. If you have a complaint, you should be honest and courageous enough to voice that complaint in person. I think this person is a coward to do something this cowardly and despicable."

Byrd insists that the message has had no bearing on his efforts as president, although the current act is by far the most severe. Nevertheless, Byrd believes that he can overcome such perceived obstacles within A.S., he said.

"I pledged to create a better environment in A.S.," he said. "There has been a boost in minority applicants; however, it was clear that we were outsiders."

Despite the tension of the incident, Byrd has offered to have a dialogue with the anonymous individual in order to reconcile any differences.

"I invite this individual or anyone else who shares his views to come to my office so that they can better express their feeling to me, face to face."

ceiving housing are slim to none, Foley said.

The tedious effort involved in acquiring a room was undeniably unpleasant, according to undeclared sophomore Erin McGrath.

"I came out here about 7:45 [Tuesday evening]," she said. "We were intending to come out here [at the] earliest midnight, maybe 6 a.m. — we never would have gotten contracts. I think it's ridiculous that UCSB can't provide enough housing, making some of us have to miss sleep, miss class and miss studying time. Last night I got no sleep, and at this point everything just seems surreal."

To be put on the waiting list students can go today to the State Street Room in the UCen from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

government agencies, especially during times of disaster.

"I will work in a bipartisan manner to ensure that [cooperation] happens," Duvall read. "I will pledge to you now that, if elected, I will make it my first order of business to ensure that FEMA ... and any other federal agencies with jurisdiction ... are responsible to our emergency needs."

Bakhaus was concerned with the government's focus on the environment.

"The government today is environmental in its premise of preserving the wilderness instead of the humans," Bakhaus said.

Duvall read Capps' statement regarding the surplus in the federal budget.

"I believe strongly that we should not spend any of the projected surpluses until we are sure that Social Security and Medicare are solid over the long term," she stated. "Consequently, I will not support increases in federal spending ... unless [it is] fully paid within the context of our current balanced budget."

According to Bakhaus, the federal government should revise its current Social Security program.

"Government budgeting is an oxymoron," he said. "Pensions should be set aside, like rocks, where the money is there."

According to Bordonaro, the budget surplus should not be earmarked for specific programs until the national debt is paid off.

"There is no surplus so long as the country's in a situation like this, where a child today is born with a \$150,000 debt around their neck," he said. "We are robbing future generations for instant gratification. That's wrong, it is immoral, and it should stop."

Duvall expressed Capps' support for spending on education and child care.

"I support measures to reduce class size and to modernize and rebuild our outdated schools," Capps said, according to the statement. "I believe we can offer help to our working families through the expansion of child care tax credit and by encouraging businesses, again through tax credits, to build and expand child care facilities."

Bordonaro responded to Capps' discussion of lowering class size.

"First of all, it's not the federal government's job — it's the state's job," he said. "Second of all, if you wanted to reduce class size for every child in America, you'd probably have to eliminate the whole federal budget to do that. So you've got to be careful when you hear these great things about reduced

class size."

While all three candidates agreed that the IRS is flawed, they differed in their specific plans for the agency.

"I believe the IRS is very effective," Bakhaus said. "They stomp and rape and kill with the best of them. ... The Internal Revenue Service obviously needs to be abolished and income tax with it."

Bordonaro also advocated the elimination of the IRS, although he did not condemn the concept of income taxes.

"You are guilty before proven innocent with the Internal Revenue Service. That is absolutely wrong," he said. "I would be in favor of abolishing the IRS somewhere down the road, and going to a flat tax, as long as we have certain deductions that are still there."

In Capps' statement, she called for reform rather than removal of the IRS.

"While it may be currently fashionable to call for the abolition of the IRS, it is hardly prudent or realistic," she stated. "What we need to do is drastically reform the IRS, and put into place guarantees of some common sense taxpayer rights, like switching the burden of proof from the taxpayer to the IRS."

The final question of the debate asked the candidates what they would do to benefit the district. Bordonaro responded with his stand on Social Security.

"I definitely won't be on the back bench," he said. "I think that Social Security is number one, that we have to make sure that we do something in a bipartisan way."

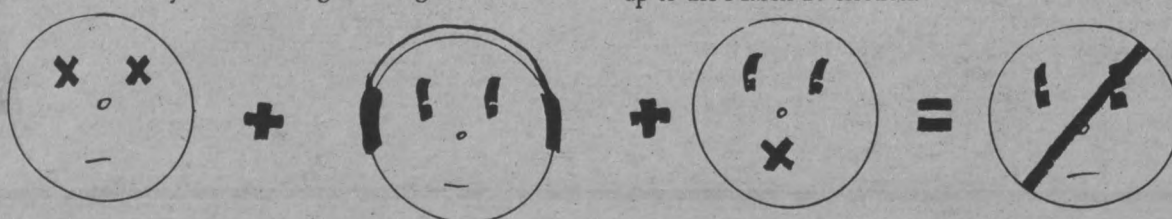
Capps' statement indicated that her primary focus is education.

"I know I have the bias of a mother and a former teacher, but I firmly believe that there is no greater duty for our society than to ensure its children have access to the best possible education," she stated. "[Education] is good for our local economy as well."

According to Bakhaus, the main problem facing the American public is the government itself.

"We've got to stop the racketeering of pork-barrel politics," he said. "Representation, or more precisely disrepresentation, is the single most important political issue."

Wednesday's debate was the first in a series of six leading up to the March 10 election.

UCSB Hoopsters Struggle To Start, Rebound To Sink Titanic Upset Bid

Cal State Fullerton's official mascot may be the Titan, but Wednesday night the school's women's basketball team looked more like the Titanic — the squad ran into an iceberg known as UCSB.

The Gauchos rallied from a sluggish first half start to put away CSUF in the final 20 minutes, 74-55.

However, Santa Barbara Head Coach Mark French was not entirely pleased with the team's ninth consecutive conference win and 14th victory in its last 15 tries.

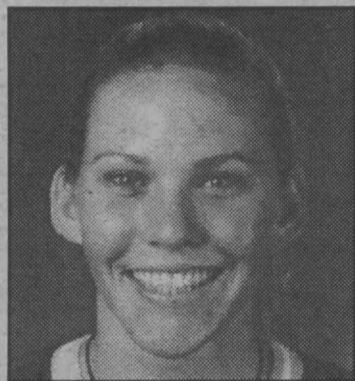
"We still need to work on playing a full 40 minutes," French said. "Playing one half of basketball may work now, but it's not going to win many games come tournament time."

The first half of Wednesday's game was a far cry from the two schools' first meeting Jan. 30 at the Thunderdome. In that game, UCSB (20-5, 11-1 in the Big West Conference) limited Fullerton to 29 percent shooting to take a commanding 47-19 lead into the locker room.

In Titan Gym, the Gauchos started hot again, building a nine point lead 6:37 in after a layup by

point guard Stacy Clinesmith. The sophomore, who leads the Big West in assists with a 5.1 average, also ignited the 13-4 run with a three-pointer to open the game.

But the Gauchos would find themselves in early foul trouble, putting the Titans in the bonus less than 10 minutes into the contest. Freshman center Nicole Greathouse and junior guard Stephanie

Shadwell both picked up two infractions apiece, relegating them to bench duty.

CSUF (8-15, 5-7) clawed back, eventually taking a four point lead at the 3:56 mark after a putback from forward Natascha Stokley. Santa Barbara's effort was not aided by an uncharacteristic technical-call foul on French,

which he received for excessive arguing with officials.

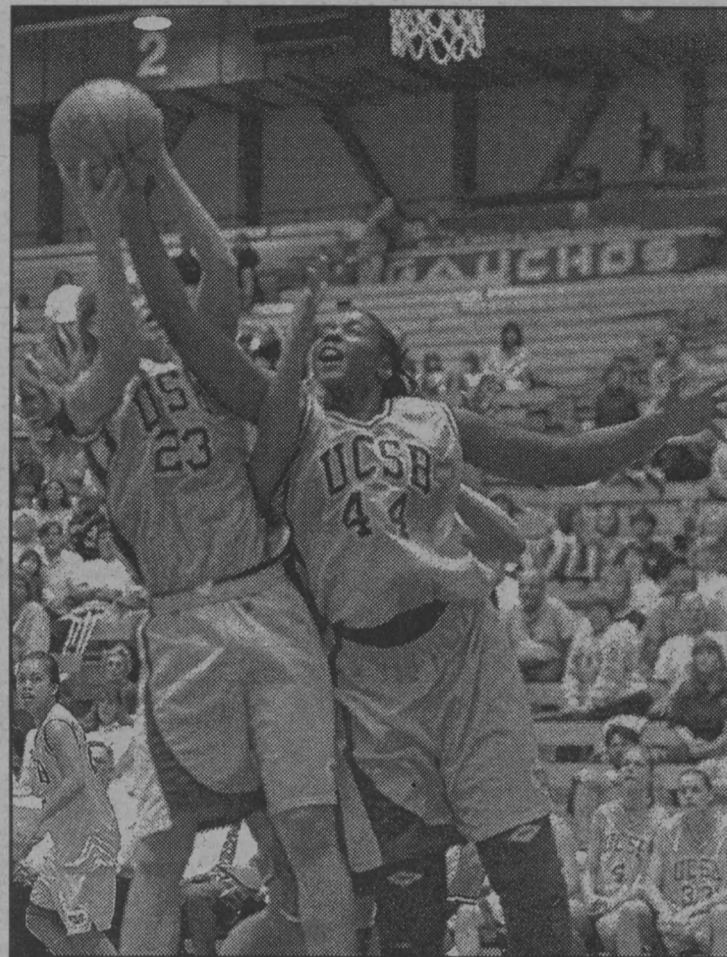
After settling down, the UCSB coach switched to a zone defense that helped his squad rally to reclaim the lead at halftime, 32-30.

"We played the last six minutes of the first half and all of the second in a zone because of the foul trouble our post players were in," he said. "I really hate playing the zone; you feel like you're playing at the mercy of the other team. But it definitely worked this time."

The Gauchos were also aided by an injury to Fullerton's starting center Erin Whiteside. Following a collision with Greathouse, the sophomore was knocked unconscious for a number of minutes midway through the opening frame.

With the home team down to two able-bodied starters, Santa Barbara capitalized in the second stanza. UCSB shot at a stellar 55 percent clip (18 of 33), limiting the Titans to a paltry 29 percent performance from the floor. A 53-36 overall rebounding advantage also contributed to the 19 point victory.

Freshman guard Erin Buescher once again came up big in the second half, tallying 13 of her 19 total points. The reigning conference player of the week also paced the

Gauchos with 15 boards and seven assists.

"It felt like we were asleep in the first half and didn't come out playing our game," said Buescher, who now has three straight double-double performances. "We woke

up in the second half and executed a little better."

Clinesmith topped all scorers with 22, while Stokley and sophomore guard Kris Sigg led Fullerton with 11 points apiece.

Santa Barbara Gets Dropped by UCLA in Volleyball Showdown at Pauley

This song is appropriate in regard to the UCSB men's volleyball team's performance last night at UCLA's Pauley Pavilion in more ways than one; as they got smashed by the Bruins and now find themselves in dire straits to achieve a respectable record in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation.

The Gauchos slipped to 2-5 in the MPSF, 3-5 overall, by losing to the undefeated

Bruins in three straight sets. UCLA wasted little time as it swept Santa Barbara 15-6, 15-9, 15-4, and improved its #1 record to 11-0 overall, 8-0 in the MPSF.

UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston found little to be pleased with in his team's performance.

"We just didn't have it tonight," Preston said of the Gauchos' second loss to the Bruins this season. "We couldn't find the court offensively, and that doesn't get it done against a team like UCLA. I mean, we had 28 hitting errors. You just can't do that and expect to win."

As bad as UCSB played, perhaps even their best performance would not have been

enough to knock off powerhouse UCLA, who hit .439 while only committing seven hitting errors. Further, the Bruins had nine service aces to the Gauchos' one.

"Their entire team played well," Preston said of the Bruins. "They passed really well and didn't make many errors. It's tough to stop them. They just keep the ball in play and wait for you to commit the errors."

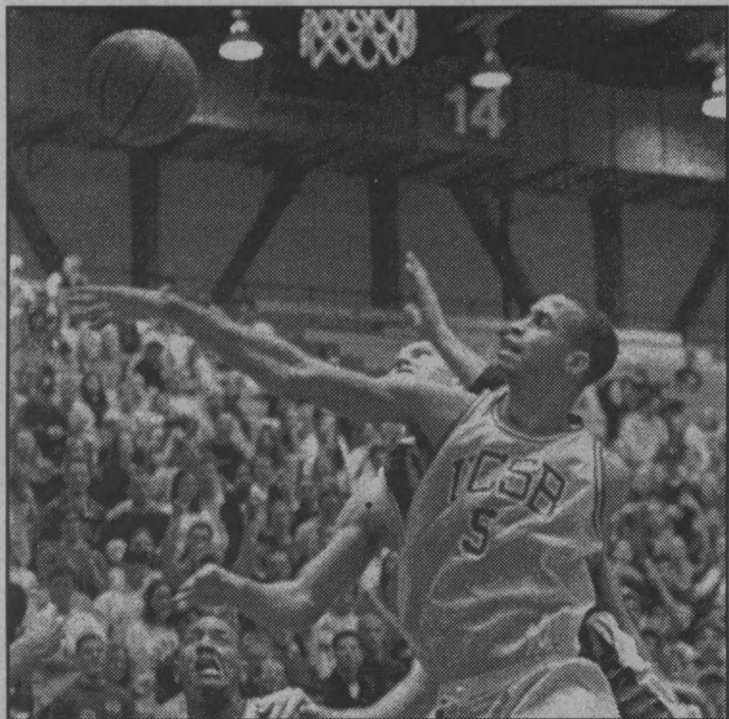
The Bruin charge was led by Adam Naeve, who gave the Gauchos fits the last time the teams met on Jan. 23. The 6'10" sophomore hit at a .500 average and posted 12 kills. Senior center Ben Moselle also recorded 12 kills while hitting .476.

Santa Barbara was at a lack for leadership

as it struggled with a season low .200 hitting percentage. The only bright spots for the Gauchos were provided by Seniors Bob Hefty and Alike Williams. Hefty, a middle blocker, hit .571 with eight kills while outside hitter Williams had nine kills and led the team with 14 digs.

Preston singled out Williams for his defensive game.

"Alike played really well," Preston said. "He hustled and came up with some good digs. He was blocked a couple of times toward the end of the last game, but other than that he had a good match."
