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


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
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slow dance on the killing ground

free the airplane glue that sticks my brain pieces to the backside of my head, suzanne passes the joint


to the basset hound sitting behind me, he draws in the joint rush of acid and acceptance his tail wags up a dust storm parting the finely meshed pieces



When Booker T. Brown wants a great steak...




He chooses The Timbers

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
Father

At 3 p.m. the jukebox stopped. Frank climbed on top of the nearest empty table and spoke loudly of the truths he held self-evident.



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

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
