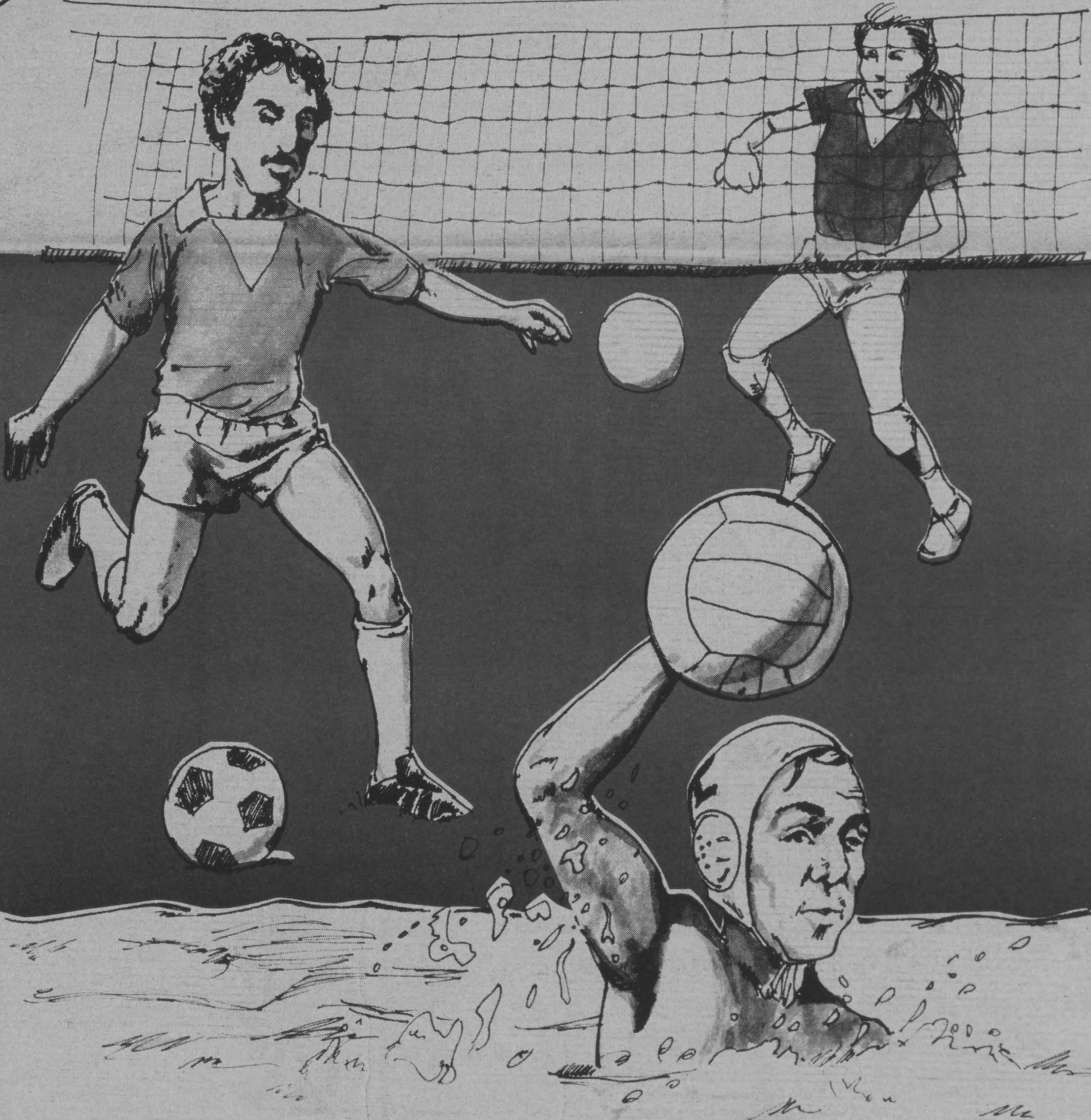

Gauchos Aiming For Stellar Season

Soccer Coach Predicts 18-4 Record

If you were to call UCSB soccer coach Andy Kuenzil optimistic, it might be an understatement.

The second-year coach from Switzerland has big plans for his Gauchos and nothing less than an 18-4 record would satisfy him. And who can argue with Kuenzil? The Gauchos return 15 players off last year's 10-7-1 squad and with the added experience Santa Barbara will have, the Gauchos may make some noise in the Western region.

"Based on our schedule, I would say an 18-4 record would be about right," Kuenzil said recently at a press conference. "I might bite my tongue later, but we think we can make the playoffs and an 18-4 record would put us there."

Kuenzil quietly predicts the 1982 Gauchos to be the best in the school's history. UCSB went 16-3 in 1979 and broke many school records. But if Kuenzil has his way, this year could see Santa Barbara at the forefront of collegiate soccer on the West Coast.

The Gauchos return their top four scorers and one of the finest goalies in the west in junior Steve Tipping. Kuenzil predicts Tipping will surpass his eight shutouts of a year ago.

"We are hopeful that Tipping will be an All-American," Kuenzil said.

Perhaps the biggest factor in Kuenzil being so optimistic about this team is the experience they return, which helps will boost their confidence at critical points.

"We had trouble in away games last year," Kuenzil said. "We lost crucial games because we were not able to keep our composure. We panicked."

"This year I think we have the experience to take our time and wait for our turn. It will definitely help us against the more experienced teams," he said.

Along with experience in goal, UCSB returns a midfield crew that Kuenzil

calls the strongest part of the team.

The Price brothers, Eric and Steve, bring with them the scoring punch Santa Barbara will need. Eric was the Gauchos' top point man last year with nine goals and 11 assists. His 24 career goals is just one shy of the school record set by Steve Pollock.

Also playing the midfield line will be Graham Witherall and Mark Packard, who redshirted last year.

Along the front line UCSB will be led by Scott Grasinger, who led the Gauchos with 10 goals in 1981. He will team with Marty Olsen and Jay Moeller.

The fullbacks will be another strongarm for the Gauchos. Chris Wentzien, who Kuenzil credits with shutting down every opponent's top threat a year ago, Steve Daluz, a redshirt

last year, Thom Wentzel and Dan Lindenman will occupy that position.

The Gauchos will be strong off the bench, Kuenzil said, and substitutions should not hurt UCSB as they did a year ago. A good recruiting year added to the Gauchos' bench strength.

"If we sub we will not lose any quality," Kuenzil said. "The game won't fall apart. Last year we did fall apart when we made substitutions. This year everybody is capable of starting."

The top recruits include John Marciano, Jeff Kindseth, Claudio Federico and Steve Sachrison. Also adding to the Gauchos' bench strength will be Dave Zabolki, Bruce Gibson, Scott Derrickson and backup goalies Mario Morales and Chris Newcomb.

Kuenzil says his team is four to five weeks ahead of schedule and more ready to (Please turn to p.7, col.1)

Tipping's Talk Low-Key But Results Top-Flight

While his coach is predicting an 18-4 soccer season and All-American honors, not to mention more than eight shutouts, Gaucho goalie Steve Tipping is predicting nothing except to say that Santa Barbara will be good enough to compete with anyone in the country.

For the Gaucho's 6-1, 180 lb. goalkeeper from Claremont, 1982 could be a record breaking season for himself as well as the team.

Last year, Tipping fell one game short of tying the school record with nine shutouts in a season. This year, UCSB coach Andy Kuenzil is simply saying Tipping is one of the best goalkeepers in the country.

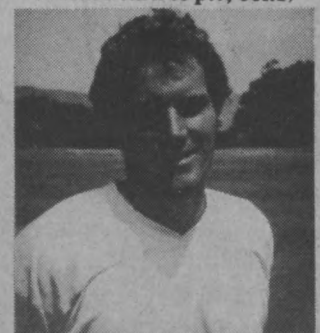
But Tipping refuses to take all the credit for his success of a year ago. There were games, he said, where he was never tested. He gives his defense all the praise, saying he could not have recorded eight shutouts without the support he had.

"The goalkeeper has a certain amount to do with shutting the opponents down," Tipping said. "But it's the defense completely."

Kuenzil is counting on Tipping to provide the ex-

cellent goalkeeping UCSB will need if they are to challenge for the league title. The second year coach says Tipping's composure and experience from last year will help him to improve this year.

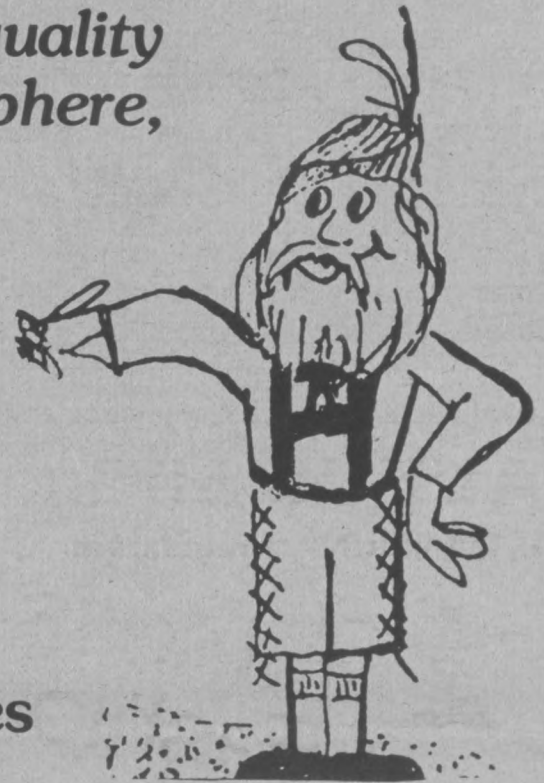





Four-Time PCAA Champs

Poloists Hope To Uphold Tradition

By talking to Gauchos water polo coach Pete Snyder, you would never know UCSB has one of the best teams in the country.

Snyder is very careful not to sound too overconfident, but when it comes down to naming the top teams in the nation, Snyder nevertheless includes his Gauchos as possible NCAA champions.

Along with U.C. Irvine, UCLA, Stanford and U.C. Berkeley, Snyder rates UCSB as one of the teams to beat in 1982.

"We are one of the top teams in the nation, but that is a preliminary judgement. We will have a good assessment of our team after we play Stanford," said a cautious Snyder.

The Gauchos are coming off a year which saw UCSB gain its fourth PCAA championship and tenth NCAA appearance in the 23 years Santa Barbara has had a water polo team.

Snyder, beginning his sixth season at the helm, has compiled an impressive 105-46-4 record at UCSB. He sees this year as a wide-open race for the national championship.

As for Santa Barbara, Snyder said the Gauchos will rely on six top players and an assortment of freshman and sophomores.

Larry Mouchawar returns as the Gauchos' leading scorer a year ago. Mouchawar scored 59 goals

while being named a second team All-American and first team All-PCAA performer. His two-year total of 99 goals ranks him sixth on the all-time Gauchos list.

Scott Porter, a fifth year senior from Mountain View, was the team's third leading scorer last year with 35 goals and 41 assists. His 41 assists broke a school record.

Snyder said the Gauchos will rely heavily on Chris Verga, Richard Tanner, Paul Merkle and Greg

Chambers.

The Gauchos, who travel to U.C. Irvine today for the UCI tournament, will have to get good play out of a host of freshmen and sophomores.

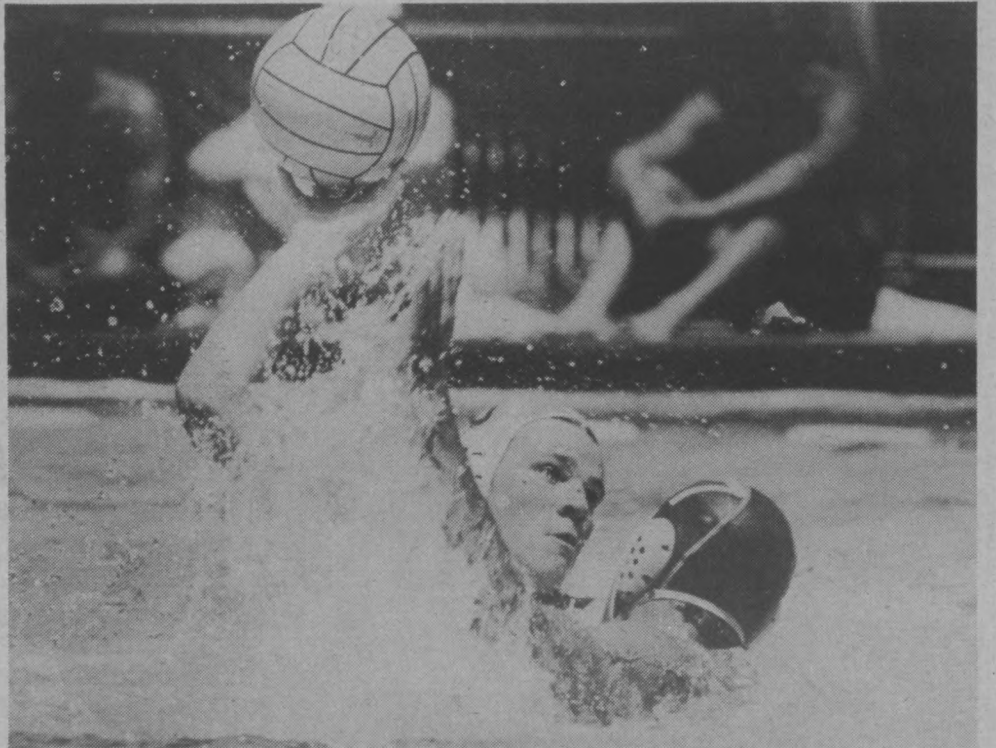
Snyder said the lack of experience may hurt UCSB, but that remains to be seen.

"Our weakness is our lack of experience and depth," said Snyder. "I don't know how much our experience will hurt us. Our depth is hard to tell at this point. The players need to play NCAA

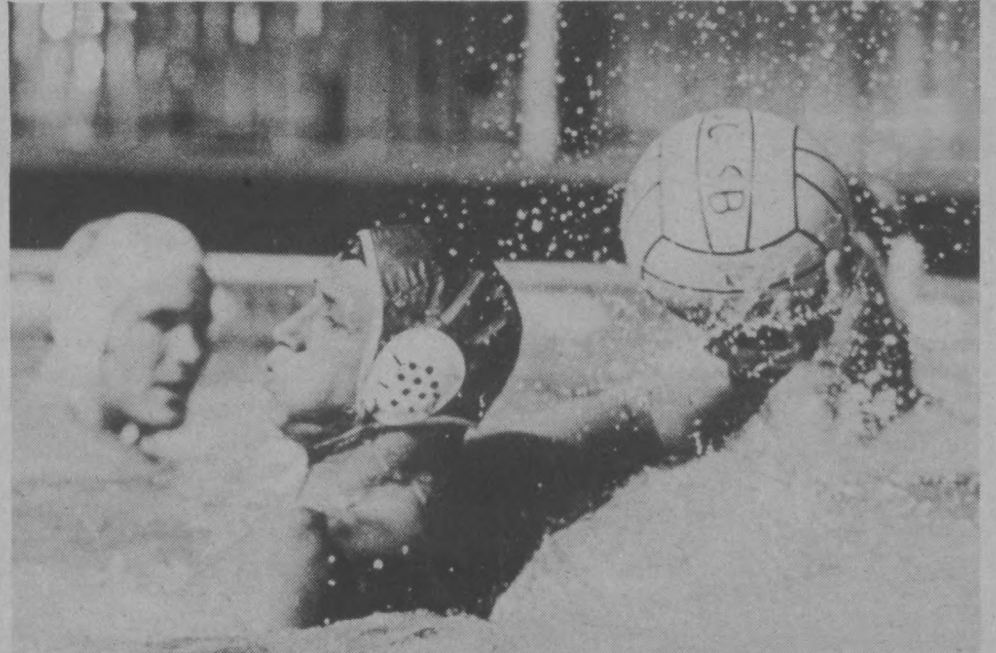
matches. They have the background and the confidence to play, but it is still unknown how effective they will be."

Among others, Snyder named Bruce Gordon, Dan Hoffman, Russell Tanner, Sean Robertson, Joel Gilbert, Steve Neuschul and Scott Purves as players who must contribute for UCSB to win consistently.

In goal, the Gauchos' have senior Keith Munsch, who (Please turn to p.10, col.1)

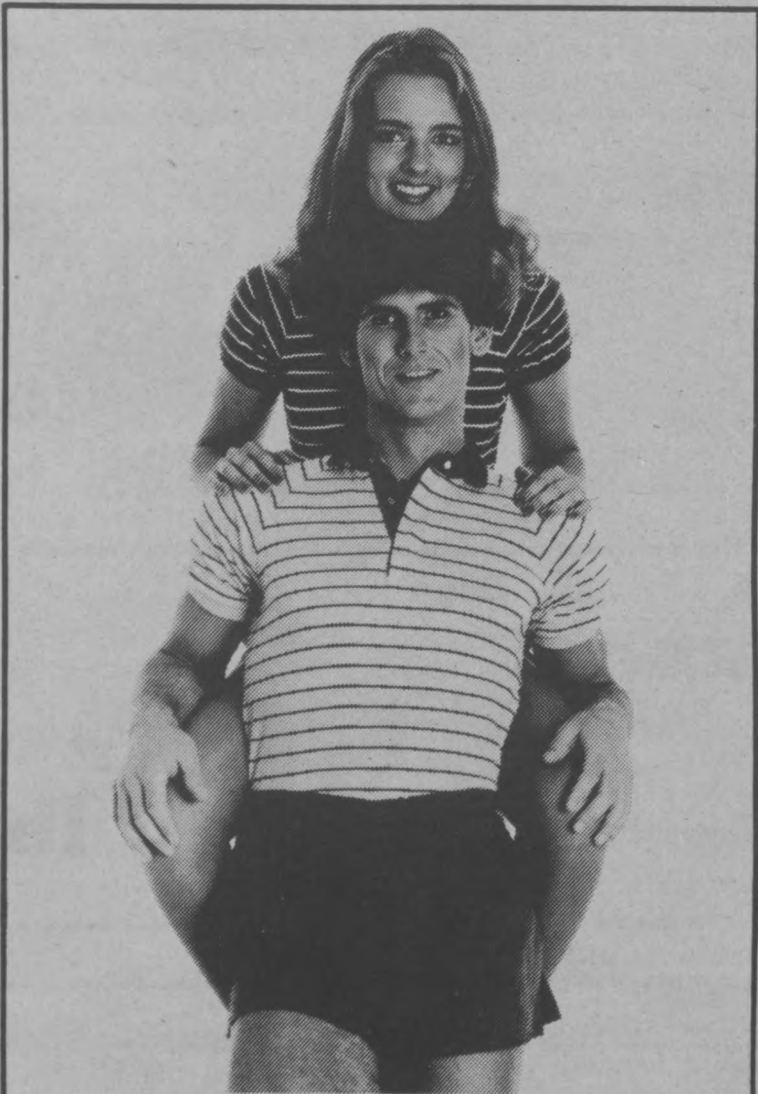

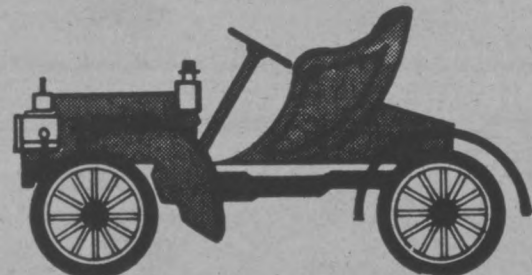

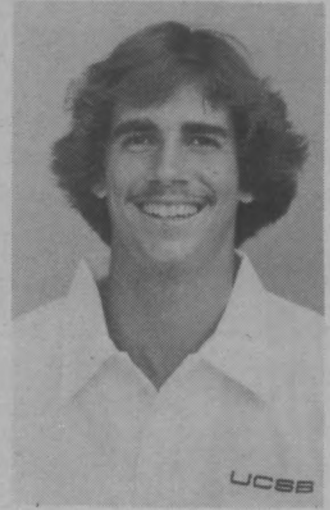
Anderson Still Unsigned; Waiting for Suitable Offer

Richard Anderson, UCSB's all time leading basketball scorer, is still in limbo about his future professional plans. He is not too excited about going to Italy and playing there. He had earlier agreed to sign with an Italian club, but got cold feet at the last moment, hoping to get a firm offer from the San Diego Clippers, the team that drafted the 6-10 center in the second round last June.

"I still don't feel like going to Italy," said Anderson. "I thought something was going to happen with the Clippers. Now I have to convince myself that the best thing to do is go to Italy. No reason to stay here. But it is going to be tough. If I'd made the choice sooner, I could have made a better deal. But I couldn't. I didn't want to go."

Anderson's agent, Don DeJardin says, "We're in a very, very non-projectible type situation. Because of the lateness, there are only so many jobs (in Europe). Some will be left open until October, when the NBA camps start to cut people. France is closed, but Spain and Italy and the Philippines are still possible."

"Maybe someone will pick me up," Anderson said. "My agent figures getting \$80,000, \$85,000 (overseas) is \$130,000 over here because they take care of all your taxes over there."

Less All-Stars Might Mean More Victories For Gaucho V-Ball Team

After being the pre-season favorite to win the NCAA championship in 1981, the UCSB women's volleyball team seemed to be affected by the pressure that traditionally follows the number one-ranked team.

The Gauchos finished fifth in the nation for the second consecutive year under six-year coach Kathy Gregory. Their 24-13 record reflected the troubles Gregory had with the talent-ridden Gauchos.

Gregory likes the way her Gauchos are rated this year. "The lower you are, the better," she said. UCSB is rated ninth by *Volleyball News*, and seventh in a coaches' poll. "Last year the pressure of being number one was too much," she commented.

Although Santa Barbara lost four starters from last year's squad, Gregory nevertheless feels the Gauchos are fairly rated and capable of beating anyone in the nation.

Gone from last year are Lisa Pinker, Patti Webb, Ann Hansen, Sherry Corwin and Melissa Fisher. No matter — Gregory has a fresh core to replace the departed, and UCSB should be high up in the ratings all year.

Kelly Strand returns with outstanding quickness for her size, and the powerful hitting UCSB needs. "She is the best all-around player we have," Gregory commented.

Iris Macdonald will team with Strand in the power hitting department, and will also carry the burden of outside hitting for the Gauchos.

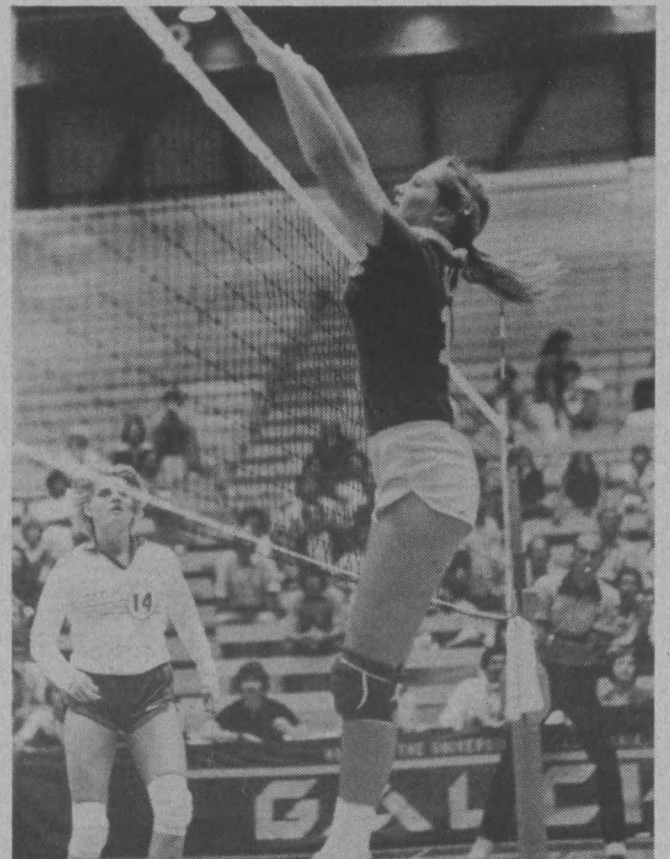
Gina DeQuattro, a 6-1 middle blocker, is the strongest hitter on the team, according to her coach, and she will be counted on to block the opponents.

Freshman Liane Sato will be the Gauchos' setter. "There is no girl quicker in volleyball," Gregory exclaimed.

"We will need these four on the court most of the time," she added.

Mary Allison will start for the Gauchos on the right side. Gregory credits Allison with a good all-around court game.

"Best All-Around Player"

Strand Nabs Starting Spot

UCSB Women's Volleyball Coach Kathy Gregory calls Kelly Strand her best all-around player.

Strand's certainly had practice at it. She spent her freshman year at various positions subbing for injured players. No longer, though.

"I'll be an outside hitter," Strand said. She'll also be one of the oldest players on a team ranked seventh nationally by the NCAA coaches' poll.

Actually, this rating is a comedown, considering UCSB was tabbed number one last pre-season. That's fine by Strand, though.

"I like being the underdog," Strand said. "I hope we'll be the Cinderella team and shock everybody. If we play like we did last

weekend (in the All-Cal tournament), I think we can do it."

If the Gauchos are underdogs, Strand herself certainly isn't. Underdog volleyball players don't run in her family.

Both she and her twin sister, Lisa, started playing the sport in ninth grade. They were co-captains and All-CIF players during their senior years at Santa Barbara High.

They both planned to attend the University of Hawaii, but Kelly changed her mind and opted for UCSB. "I liked the program, and the school is close to home," she said.

Strand was initially surprised that she could hold her own and even excel on the collegiate level. But on-court wasn't the only place

she had to make adjustments.

She fit in her academics by taking 12 units during the fall quarter, and no classes later than noon. Even so, practices and roadtrips made study time scarce.

She also had to adjust to dorm life, which is often too loud for an athlete who has to rest before a big game. Fortunately, Strand was able to escape periodically.

"I went home a lot," Strand said. "It was great to kick back there."

Being a Santa Barbara resident also means that Strand often has her own rooting section of family and friends. She said that this pushes her to do better.

"I get nervous sometimes, but I like the support," Strand said. "I can always (Please turn to p.13, col.1)

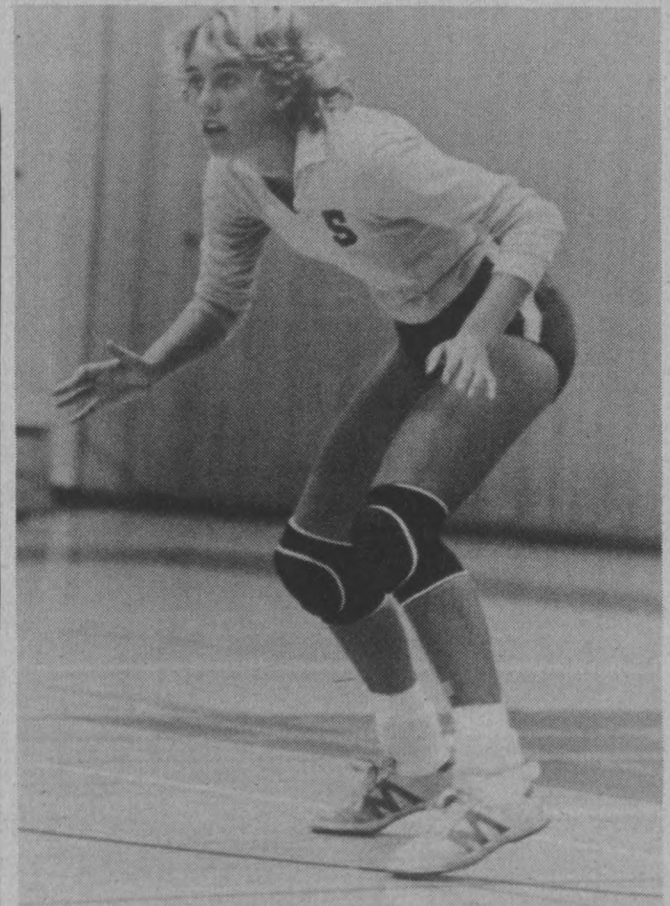

is confident he can do the kind of job that is expected of him. But he will be the first to tell you that he cannot keep making big saves. He needs his defense.

"Our style is to play strong defense," he said. "The saves I never have to make is because of the defense. We have basically the same defense as last year. We should be as strong or stronger than last year."

The Gauchos, who return 15 players off last year's 10-7-1 team, are talking about making a serious bid for the league championship. And Tipping can only agree that UCSB will be heard from in

1982.
"We have the talent. Last year we had to learn about each other and how each one played," Tipping said. "Now we know the players and the system. Instead of breaking everybody in, we can work on the technical aspects of the game."

"We know we're good. Other teams know we're good. We just have to maintain our mental outlook and be ready for each game."

As for himself and the lonely position he holds, Tipping said that he has to stay in each game mentally, even though he may have to stop only a few shots on goal.

"When I'm in a game, I can't think about anything else. I must maintain my mental concentration."

"It (goalkeeping) is a different position," he said. "I'm the last defender and the first offender. I'm singled out. I get all the notoriety."

Tipping explained what he must do in games where he does not see much action.

"Every good keeper is involved in the whole game," he said. "I'm always moving, yelling encouragement. I never fall asleep mentally. It's a psych position."

With all the expectations placed upon him, Tipping

says he does not feel any added pressure. "I feel I must do well for us to win," he said.

As for Kuenzil's prediction for an 18-4 season, Tipping says it is not overrated.

"We can go 18-4 or .500. It's a matter of breaks. We can win 18, though. It is very probable."

Tipping will be under the gun this weekend at the Sunbird Classic in Fresno today and tomorrow.

If the Gauchos are to make a run for the league title, Tipping will certainly have a say in the matter. And if his coach is correct in predicting All-American honors for Tipping, UCSB may make Kuenzil a prophet.



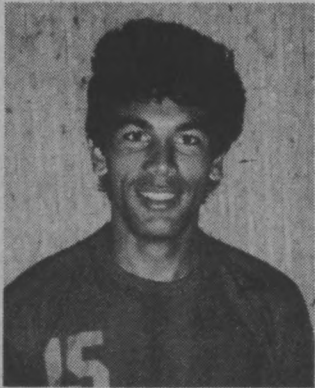

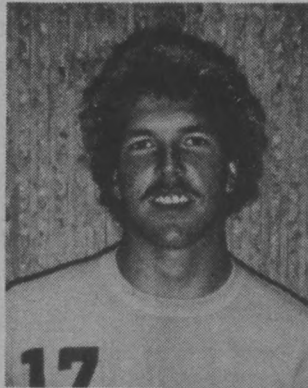

Triplett, Gauchos Debut Tomorrow

Former Gaucho Now Coach

The running career of former UCSB distance standout Jim Triplett went full circle recently, when the 24-year old graduate was named head coach of the UCSB Cross Country team.

If Triplett's coaching tenure is anywhere near as successful as his collegiate competitive days, the Gaucho harriers are sure to improve over their sixth place PCAA finish last year.

Triplett currently owns the school record in the lagoon course, a 4.9 mile jaunt which he completed in 23:54. That 1980 feat, combined with his third place finish in the conference final and two fourth places in the PCAA track final (3,000 steeple,

5,000 meters), established him as the premier Gaucho distance runner.

During his senior campaign, most of his success came on the track, where he captured the school mark in the 5,000 (14:18.80) and a third place in the PCAA in that event.

Triplett's new assignment comes as no surprise. Last track season many runners, dissatisfied with former track coach Tom Lionvale's training methods, turned to Triplett for workout advice. Triplett obliged them, and word of his rapport with the athletes reached the athletic department, resulting in his immediate hiring.

The young coach doesn't exactly inherit a team of destiny, but of course he remains optimistic.

"We're looking to be in the top three of the conference," he said, mentioning Fresno State, U.C. Irvine, and San Jose State vying for the PCAA crown.

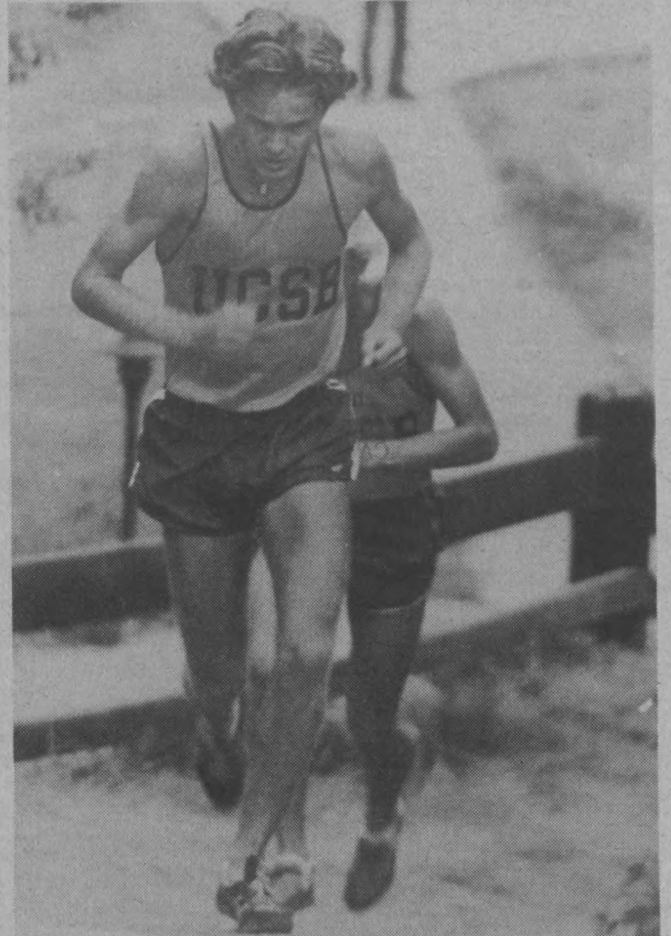
Triplett and his athletes will receive an early appraisal from his critics at the lagoon course where they host Westmont and Occidental. The Gauchos figure to win, but more importantly, Triplett will get a look at newcomers under meet conditions.

The four new recruits to the Gauchos are: J.C. transfer Tim Silva from Valley College (San Fernando Valley), freshman Steve Bates (Fort Bragg), Dave Lawer (Walnut Creek), and Dave Currier (Carlsbad).

Returnees include: Steve Binos, Stuart Rasmussen, Dave Short, Joe Naughton, John McGeehee and Dave Shea. Short, Naughton, and McGeehee were particularly impressive during their freshman track season.

"We have a good mixture of veterans and new talents," Triplett commented.

What Triplett and team will find out tomorrow is that a good mix brings results.

Young Gauchos Will Be Tested

With the season opener tomorrow at 10 a.m. at the Campus Lagoon course, rookie coach Jim Triplett will not be the only one making his Gaucho debut on the men's cross country circuit.

Triplett will be accompanied by a host of new runners, including three freshmen and several junior college transfers. Two freshman runners are injured and will be unable to compete in the meet.

So, the young coach, who inherited the head coaching job last spring following the dismissal of Tom Lionvale, takes over a team with five freshman athletes.

Triplett, who holds the school record in the lagoon course, expressed the problems freshmen face in coming out of high school and competing against a tougher runner.

"The biggest problem they face is adjusting to a different lifestyle," he said. "The work load can get to be too much."

"In high school they always ran near the top and here they are running against older, more experienced runners and they sometimes can't keep pace. Now they may be running at the back of the pack while a few months ago they were in the front," Triplett said.

He explained that much of running is a mental sport and the young athlete must not get impatient.

"It's hard to adjust to not always running in the front of the pack," he said. "It is a major obstacle and freshmen tend to get impatient."

"Because they can't always keep pace, they might work too hard at the beginning of the season and break down too fast. This is one of my major concerns. I have to bring them along slowly," he said.

The three freshmen to run against Occidental and Westmont tomorrow are Dave Currier, Bob Efram and Steve Bates. Injuries to Eric Jackson and Brad Kerns will keep them on the sidelines for at least the first two meets.

Triplett stressed the importance of running the lagoon course intelligently, something he says freshman runners are not yet aware of.

"I must stress patience in this race," he said. "Some freshmen have never run over 5000 meters and this race is 10,000 meters."

"Our strategy is to run as evenly as possible throughout the race and be careful not to start too fast. You have to distribute your energy evenly and run at an even pace. The tendency for freshmen is to start too fast and burn out at the end," Triplett said.

Because of the coaching change late last year, Triplett did not have a chance to recruit his team. The new coach is not sure how these freshmen will develop, but after tomorrow's meet Triplett said he will have a better idea of how well the Gauchos will compare to league favorites Fresno State, San Jose State and U.C. Irvine.

Kinane Enthusiastic Harriers Strong, But So Are Foes

With the women's cross country season quickly approaching, Kathy Kinane, head coach of the UCSB squad, is greatly enthusiastic about the womens' potential. The team should achieve "far and above what it did last year," according to Kinane. Although District 8 has three of the top four teams in the nation, UCSB has a good chance to fare well in the regional championships in November.

However, this is foresight. Kinane, refusing to be overly optimistic, constantly mentions that, until she sees the women compete at the Fresno Invitational on Sept. 25, she will not be able to assess the situation completely.

The three most impressive schools in the region are Stanford, UCLA and Oregon. Stanford's strength was showcased last spring at the NCAA track championships, where Cardinal runners finished first in the 3,000 and 10,000 meter races. Besides garnering a second place finish in the 5,000 meter race, Stanford also picked up at least 20 more points in the distance races. While Oregon has no great standouts, UCLA has four such runners, including freshmen Polly Plumer and Vicky Cook, the top high-school distance runners in the nation last year.

Oregon, Kinane implies, is virtually assured of third place in the region. Although three teams are chosen from each district to compete at the national championships, an at-large berth is usually awarded to a team in the District 8 division, due to the disproportionate strength in the region. This at-large berth may contain the Gauchos on Nov. 20 at the NCAA championships.

When competing in a meet, a cross country team consists of seven runners, five of which score for the team. The first five women of each team to finish the race score according to their order of finish. The varsity team of the Gauchos will change in accordance with the weekly results of each woman. When the season starts, the top seven runners will probably be Mary Mason, Julie Thrupp, Jayne Balsinger, Melissa Martel, Helen Lehman, Lisa Nelson and Deanna Haley.

Mason, the strongest runner on the team, is capable of a 16:50 clocking under the right conditions on a 5,000 meter course. On a track, this would be a very good time. Last year, Mason finished 16th in the 10,000 meters at the NCAA track championships. Kinane wants to work on Mason's speed this year in order to get her competitive at the 5,000 meter level. She is expected to be the strong point of the team.

A pleasant surprise for the team is the return of Julie Thrupp, who, after two outstanding seasons, didn't compete last year. Julie "brings a lot of leadership and confidence to the team," and is an extremely dedicated runner, according to Kinane. Kinane also mentioned that Thrupp

would be a great boost to the team due to her great enthusiasm.

Jayne Balsinger, after a lackluster cross country season, dropped 20 seconds off of her 1500 meter time in the 1982 track season. Although her eyes are set on the 1983 track season, she should provide valuable points to the team in the cross country invitational. Helen Lehman is a freshman from El Cerrito, who ran a 2:13 800 meter in the state high school championships.

Deanna Haley, a sophomore, is very versatile. Not only can she run a 62-second quarter-mile, but she can also run a 3:05 marathon. Melissa Martel, a strong runner in the past, is expected to contribute some points as well.

There are two local products on the team, Lisa Nelson and Laura Handy. Nelson, a preseason pick to be a starter, ran at Santa Barbara City College for the last two years under the tutelage of Steve Bushey (Kinane had high praise for Bushey's program). Nelson, like all of Bushey's runners, is strong and injury-free. She has improved tremendously over the course of the summer. Handy, a product of Santa Barbara High School, has much talent, but she needs Division I experience.

Robin Scrivner and Linette Calvo did well in the time trials and are expected to compete for a spot on the varsity.

The women run this Saturday, Sept. 18, on the UCSB lagoon course, which has a course record of 16:59 by Eileen Kramer of Cal Poly SLO.

Locals Cross City For X-Country

While the Gaucho women's cross country team returns only one runner from the 1981 squad, coach Kathy Kinane will have her hands full in trying to assemble a winning season.

The second year coach has a virtually new assortment of runners for the upcoming season, which opens tomorrow at the Lagoon course against Occidental College.

Among the new faces at UCSB are two local products. Lisa Nelson, a junior transfer from Santa Barbara City College, and Laura Handy, a freshman from Santa Barbara High School, will bring the local flavor to UCSB.

"I came to UCSB because this is where I live," she said. "I first came to Santa Barbara to visit friends. They persuaded me to stay here. This is where I always want to live."

UCSB will be a team to contend with in 1982. The only question is to what extent. And if you ask

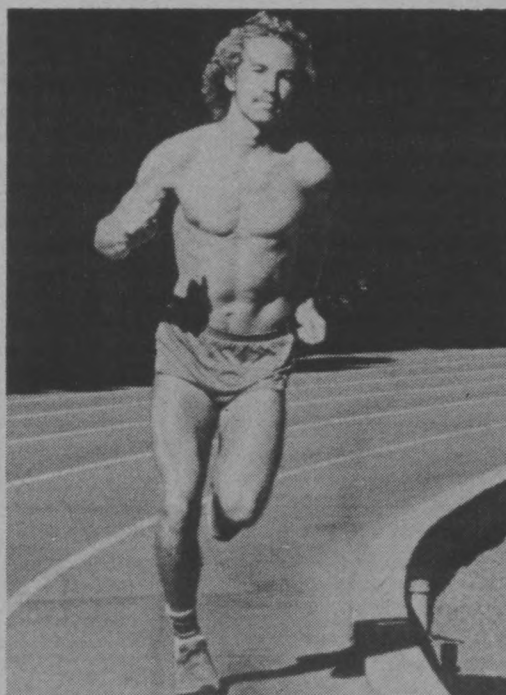
Snyder, he'll tell you it remains to be seen.

Sports Shorts

BASKETBALL—Calvin Cooper, a 6-6, 195 lb. forward, has transferred to Missouri Western after playing his first three years at UCSB. Cooper, a little used small forward, played in only five games for the Gauchos in 1981 and averaged 0.8 points and 1.0 rebound a game. He gave no reason for his departure.

BASKETBALL—Ben Howland was named to replace the departed Reggie Morris as the Gauchos' assistant coach under Ed De Lacy. Howland will take over the job vacated by Morris, who took the head coaching job at Compton Junior College earlier this summer.

Howland was an assistant coach at Gonzaga University in Spokane this past season. He grew up in Santa Barbara, but attended Cerritos High School in Los Angeles. He then went to Santa Barbara City College before finishing up at Weber State. He played semi-pro ball and coached in Uruguay for one season and holds a B.S. degree in physical education.

BASEBALL—Centerfielder Steve Clark became the fifth Gaucho to sign a professional contract. Clark, who hit .349 and stole 36 bases for UCSB last year, was signed as a free agent by the Detroit Tigers. He reported to the Florida State League in Lakeland, Fla. Clark was named to the first team All-SCBA a year ago.

Also signing pro contracts over the summer were George Page and Bob Perna. Page was signed by the Baltimore Orioles and assigned to Bluefield of the Appalachian League. He led the Gauchos in hitting (.404), home runs (10), doubles (12) and total bases (125). Perna was signed by the San Francisco Giants and assigned to Clinton, Iowa in the Midwest League.

Previously, Joe Redfield and Dave Walsh were selected in the June draft and both signed contracts, Redfield with the Mets and Walsh with the Blue Jays.

WOMEN'S SPORTS—Inge Renner, the Gauchos' women's swimming coach, feels especially at home these days. She was recently sworn in as a new United States citizen in ceremonies held at the Santa Barbara courthouse. Meanwhile, women's sports information director Sharon Latour, a native Canadian, recently passed her examination for citizenship and will be going through swearing-in ceremonies in March.

BASEBALL—Former Gaucho standout Stefan Wever has recently been brought up to the major leagues by the New York Yankees. Wever pitched for UCSB from 1977-1979. This past season he pitched for Nashville in a Class AA league and was voted the league's top pitcher. He compiled an impressive 15-5 record with a 2.50 earned run average. The 6-7 righthander becomes the third former Gaucho to be in the big leagues. The other two are Brian Kingman of the A's and Chris Speier of the Expos.

Eighth All-Time Leading Scorer

Mouchawar Heads Gaucho Attack

Before he graduates (after the 1983 season) Larry Mouchawar might well establish himself as the Gauchos' all-time leading scorer in water polo.

The 6-5 junior from Long Beach Poly High School already has 99 goals in his first two seasons as a Gaucho, and is ranked eighth on the all-time list. His 59 goals last year were a team high, leading UCSB to a 27-9-1 mark.

Mouchawar was a second team All-American a year ago, and a first team PCAA member. As a freshman he was named a third team All-American.

Mouchawar will be responsible for the bulk of the Gauchos' scoring this season, a job he thoroughly enjoys even though he draws a crowd whenever he touches the ball.

"The other teams try not to give me any shots," he said. "They double-team me, press me on the outside and try not to let me have a shot. It does get frustrating after a while, but it just makes me angry and I become more physical."

"When they (the opponents) shut off my outside shot, I rely on the counter-attack. About half of my goals come on the counter-attack. If I'm free on the counter, it's hard to stop me. But if the team gets back fast on defense, it's hard to score," he said.

Mouchawar gets the same treatment as a Wayne Gretzy does in hockey. Opponents know he is the offensive threat, and he is the man the other teams concentrate on. But Mouchawar has his own ways of combatting the

aggressiveness used on him.

"You give them a shot at the beginning of the match and they get scared they'll get hurt," he explained. "Other teams try to intimidate me, but it doesn't work. If they try to push me around, it usually will not work because I get mad."

"If they do get too aggressive, I'll give them a cheap shot under the water," Mouchawar said.

Mouchawar comes from a family of water polo players. His two older brothers played at Stanford, Mouchawar's first choice after being named MVP of his league in high school. But he wound up in Santa Barbara where he may become the most prolific scorer in UCSB history.

"Scoring sort of came easy to me," he said. "When I first came here I did not know how I'd do. It was a rebuilding year and there were a lot of new people. That made it easier to break in."

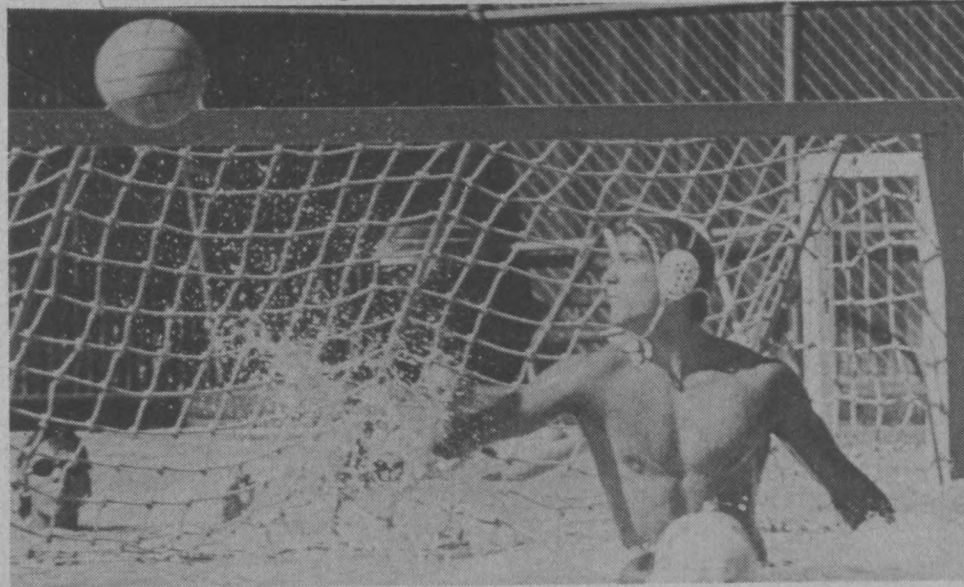
After averaging over eight goals a game in high school, Mouchawar has never been shy to take a shot on goal. Water polo coach Pete Snyder will tell you Mouchawar is not afraid to shoot, then he'll grin and laugh to himself.

"If I have a shot, I'll take it. I look for the shot," said Mouchawar. "I enjoy scoring, especially at home games and in crucial situations late in the game."

The Gauchos will be counting on the junior goal-scorer to provide the offensive punch. Mouchawar favors UCSB to win the PCAA, a feat that will only follow a productive season by himself.

Gregory Crowned "Queen" Again

At 36, Kathy Gregory is once again Queen of the Beach.

But don't tell the Gauchos women's volleyball coach she is "Queen" because "that sounds like a bathing beauty contest," she said.

Instead, just call her the top women's player on the beach, a label she richly deserves after winning nine of ten beach volleyball tournaments this past summer on beaches up and down the coast.

Gregory, a self-proclaimed entertainer on the beach, is not at a loss for words as she describes herself and her love for the game. With a grin from ear to ear, Gregory will let you know that she is not only the

best player, but the most entertaining to watch.

"If there are two games going on at the same time, there will be more people watching my game," she said. "I'm pretty entertaining. Everybody lines up to watch me play. I talk to the crowd, to my opponents and to my teammate. I am the most vocal player."

Gregory is certainly no stranger to beach volleyball. She has been playing in these tournaments since she was 15. Her victories total over 60, with the next closest woman winning only 15. She was named Queen of the Beach in 1979 when she won all ten tournaments.

For her efforts, Gregory won \$1200, a year's membership to Nautilus, and various dinners and other gifts. But it is her love for the game that is so obvious, and her enthusiasm that puts her above the rest.

"I love the game and I love to compete," she said. "And it's still fun for me. It's a challenge to compete with younger girls. I have the stamina and the experience and as long as I can play, I try to win."

Gregory also has the stamina to talk, and talk, and talk. She carries this over to her play, something she does better than anyone

else on the tour. "It's hard to play against me," she said. "I try to psych out my opponent. I'm always talking. I have a running dialogue with the crowd. It's not sickening. I'm half-funny. I have a lot of charisma when I play. Some girls don't say anything, but I always have a comment."

Ask her for an example and she'll jump out of her seat and perform one for you.

"If the crowd talks to me, I'll talk back. I don't antagonize. I play the game with a smile," she said.

Gregory said she will continue to play beach volleyball until she cannot walk. And one tends to doubt that her age will ever make a difference.

"These young girls are not willing to pay the price to beat me," she said. "I only hope they can still play like me when they're 36."

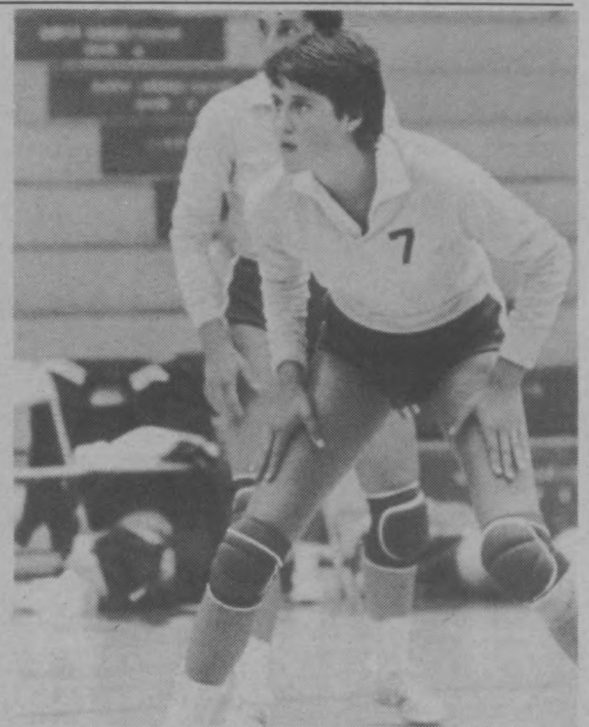
The Gauchos go south today and tomorrow as they play in the Fullerton Tournament in Orange County.

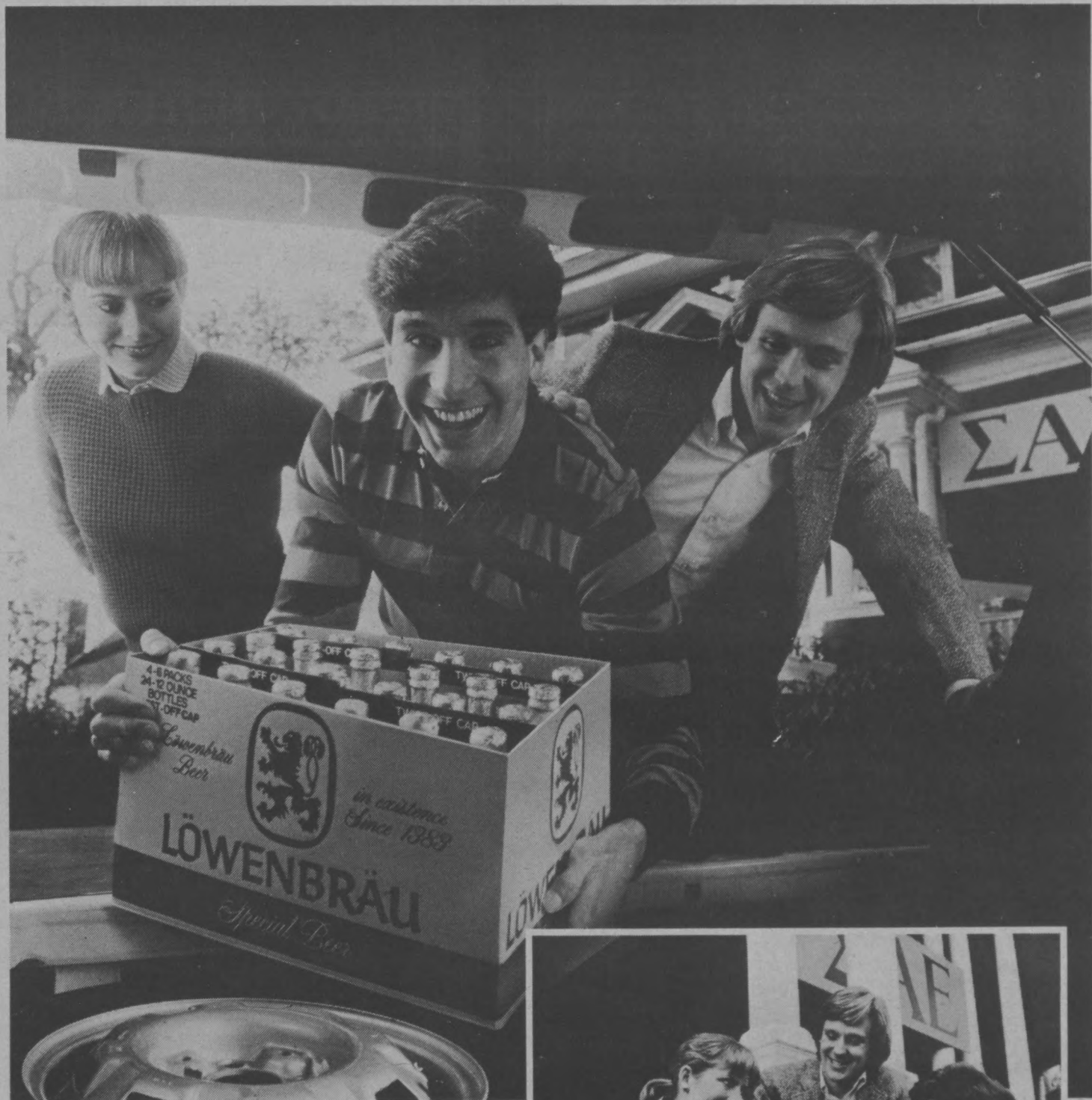
Both Handy and Nelson had trouble explaining why they go through so much training to run cross country.
