SONATA RECITAL TONIGHT -- KRAYK AND BROWNING TO BE FEATURED

Stefan Krayk and Lloyd Browning of the music department faculty will present a sonata recital tonight at 8:15 in the Music Hall.

The program will consist of three movements of Schubert's Sonatina in D Major, opus 137, the Elwell variations for violin and piano, a contemporary work which has never before been given in Santa Barbara, and Sonata Opus No. 13 by G. Faure, which is in four movements.

Krayk, who is a native of Poland, served for seven years in the Polish Air Force and later in the U.S. forces. He has been an American citizen since 1946. He has served as violinist in the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra and was assistant professor of violin at Oberlin College before coming to Santa Barbara. Recently he was elected president of the California unit of the American String Teachers Association.

Browning, a member of the College faculty since 1938, recently received his Master's Degree in which he wrote a thesis on contemporary piano composers and compositions. He has studied at Claremont, Chicago Musical College, University of Chicago, Colorado, and University of Southern California.

The recital is sponsored by the Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music and the College Music Department. The concert is free to the public.

ALL-COLLEGE LECTURE AT 3 P.M. TODAY

Provisions of the pending Japanese and American (with allies) peace treaty which will be signed in September will be the topic of discussion by Dr. James T.Watkins in the final All-College lecture taking place at 3 pm in Pine Hall 100 today.

The lecture is titled "Old Scores or a New Japan". In it Dr. Watkins will point out the great changes which have occurred in American and Japanese viewpoints in the five years since V-J Day. He will also discuss whether a Carthaginian peace or a "peace of reconciliation" will do more to encourage democracy.

Dr. Watkins is associate professor of political science at Stanford and is serving as a guest professor at UCSBC this Summer. He has taught on nine campuses of the world, including those of the Orient.
