Youthful Gauchos Set to Compete

Los Angeles— Many teams have used youth as an excuse for mediocrity. This year's UCSB women's volleyball team will use it as a motivation for success.

Fielding the youngest team in school history, the Gauchos look to improve on a 26-9 finish last season and a disappointing second round exit in the NCAA tournament.

With a lineup featuring no se-niors, one junior, six sophomores and six freshmen, this year's squad will make up what they lack in experience with raw talent and tight teamwork.

"We are a young team with some depth and good size," UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory said. "We have great ball control, and good team chemistry has helped a lot early in the season. We'll have to see how we really operate when we begin

According to Gregory, the key to this year's success will depend on the ability of the players to gel in a short period of time without a clear leader on the team.

"What I can do for this team is to be more vocal on the court," she said. "I want to lead the



Men's Soccer Starts on Wrong Foot

■ Tough Competition and Nagging Injuries Have Left UCSB Playing catch-up

What a difference a year

The UCSB men's soccer team knows that better than most, opening its season with a 1-3-1 record — far shy of the dominating 7-0-1 mark that it took out of the starting gates

But the Gauchos do have time on their side, with just one-fifth of the season completed. And Santa Barbara is not planning to continue down its current path.


"We will make it through our 1-3 start," sophomore forward Aron Wellman said. "It's tough to say what our strengths are when we're 1-3-1, but the morale of the team is still high and we still have good aspirations of the season to come."

UCSB's struggle can be blamed in part on a plethora of injuries and the strength of its opposition so far this season.

The Gauchos lost starting sophomore goalkeeper Stew-art Sanders for the year when he was kicked in the face while trying to block a goal in the second game of the season. Both cheekbones were fractured and his nose broken in the accident.

Last year's leading goal scorer, junior Danny Mann, has already suffered a pulled hamstring. He and senior Ryan Schomberg have continued to play despite nagging injuries.

Santa Barbara's three losses were all against tough teams — Fresno State, UC Berkeley and the University of San Diego.

Both Fresno and San Diego are top-15 schools this season, and Berkeley has raced out to a commanding 6-0 start on the

But UCSB coaches are not looking any farther than their own team in search of the reasons behind the slow start.

"We haven't found our scoring punch," Assistant Coach Kent Edwards said. "Right now we don't have the ability to combine and finish scoring opportunities. As a team we haven't found that rhythm."

Wellman agrees, noting that Santa Barbara has not been

playing its brand of soccer on the field as of vet.

"We're not possessing the ball enough," Wellman said. "We're looking to play long and over the top and we're not

physical enough for that. We need to relax once we gain possession."

The Gauchos have a chance at bouncing back to .500 in the next week when they take on Loyola Marymount today and Westmont on Tuesday. Both games are at home and expectations are high.

Women's Soccer Season Preview

With a team comprised of 18 underclassmen and only five juniors and seniors, Head Coach John Cossaboon knew before the season began that he would have a difficult time preparing his players for game situations. Cossaboon elected to start the non-conference season against the best teams possible, such as #2 Santa Clara and #17 University of Massachusetts, in order to provide his young team with valuable experience.

In 1979, in only his third year as head coach and amid doubts of his leadership, UCSB's water polo Coach Pete Snyder led his top-ranked Gaucho squad to a 9-1-1 start with victories over collegiate

powerhouses UC Berkeley and UCLA.

The talented '79 squad, which consisted of future Olympians
Craig Wilson and Greg Boyer and future All-American Peter
Neushul, finished with a 28-2-1 overall record en route to a national championship - UCSB's first and only national championship in

In his third season as skipper, current Santa Barbara Head Coach Joe O'Brien has found his squad starting the season with an 0-5 record, after surprising losses to Claremont College and UC Davis. This season's team has currently earned a national ranking of 11, one of the lowest in the program's history.

One reason for Santa Barbara's sluggish start could be attributed to its inexperience and lack of senior leadership. The young Gauchos have only two players on the roster with Division I experience, while the remainder of the team has had relatively no playing time at the

Despite having a young team, O'Brien feels that this will be a great opportunity for the younger players to gain valuable Division I ex-



The proposed project involves the relocation of six tennis courts, a shed and bleachers. The tennis courts will be relocated from their current location, between Parking Lot 16 and University Road, to a site south of Mesa Road, between the Environmental Health and Safety Facility, and the Recreation Center. The relocated tennis courts will be landscaped, lit, fenced, and connected to the campus pedestrian circulation system. The light fixtures will have glare shields and concentric louvers to concentrate light onto the tennis courts and minimize glare. The capacity of the bleachers will not be expanded by the Relocation Project. The purpose of this Project is to

consolidate recreational facilities consistent with the 1990 LRDP. The LRDP land use designation for the site is Recreation



Gauchos Pick Up Pace

With both the men's and women's cross country teams coming off of strong performances last year, UCSB Head Coach Pete Dolan's crew of runners are hoping to maintain speed as the fall season gets under way.

Men

With the loss of their top three runners to graduation, the men's team is in need of strong leadership if they hope to repeat as conference champs. Junior captain Ben Flamm has risen to the occasion, leading the squad as its top runner.

After a summer of training together, the men's team - led by Flamm, Liam Jones and Nate Jobe won their first meet and finished second in the second race of the season.

"I thought we did surprisingly well in our first two meets," Dolan said. "We've already taken

down a lot of strong teams so far."

On Sept. 28 the Gauchos will host the Big West Challenge Cup. "We are expecting to dominate the field ... because we're racing on our own course and should be able to per-form well," top-six runner David Blum said.

Women

After winning the title two years in a row before finishing second last year, the women's team is looking to recapture the coveted Big West crown. Despite a lackluster performance at their first meet, the team stepped up its intensity and ran well at the UC Irvine Invitational on Sept. 14.

"Talentwise, this is as good a team as I've ever had," Dolan said. "Although we had a rough start, the women turned it around and really impressed me at UC Irvine."

The women's squad is led by senior captain Eliza Alexander and junior Gabriela Rodriguez.

weakness has been on offense, scoring an average of only .95 goals per game. Sophomore forward Darcie Frounfelter has been involved with four of UCSB's six goals, leading the team with two goals and two assists. Senior Kenna Bertell also has two goals on only four shot attempts.

Cossaboon thinks the

team will score more goals once they are comfortable on defense. "Our earlyseason emphasis has been on team defense, and getting all 11 players to defend as a group of one. Just in recent days have we grown confident with our defense, and we are starting to expand and concentrate on things offensively. We haven't been scoring a large number of goals yet, but I do think that is going to come right around the

Continued from p.1B her performance at the Santa Clara Volleyball Classic and for her play against #2 Stanford, becoming only the second player in Gaucho history to receive that honor.

Last year, Crawford was named to the Big West All-Freshman team with 1.43 kills per game and .78 blocks per game in conference play.

Perhaps the most pleasant surprise of the season has been the play of

"Roberta Gehlke is by far the best freshman ever to start at UCSB," Gregory said. "She has an allaround game. She's very aggressive and competitive. We look for great things from her."

Coming out of Mater Dei High School in Orange County, Gehlke was considered by many to be one of the three best outside hitters in the country.

However, Gehlke maintained that the high expectations will not hamper her progress and that her contribution to the team is the most important thing this season.

"On this team, it's not

about who's a freshman or sophomore, it's about coming together and playing to win," she said. "There is no pressure on me at all. I don't look at it that way."

Other key players are sophomores Erin McCown, Tanya Ya-mashita and freshman Heather Bown.

The 5'11" McCown was also a Big West All-Freshman selection last year with 1.7 kpg and 2.67 digs per game.

The 6'3" Bown is currently third on the team

with 3.03 kpg. Former walk-on Yamashita is a defensive specialist who is returning from playing a key role last year as a freshman.

The Gauchos lost three outstanding starters from last year's team. Middle blockers Tammy Stiner and Jennifer Kaylor both had career years, and star outside hitter Kim Keys became the first Gaucho to rank in the top 10 in career kills, digs and blocks.

So far in the preseason, the #15 Gauchos have posted an impressive 7-3 mark with one of the more challenging preseason schedules. Gregory maintains that there is a lot of work to be done.

"We've played very well,

considering our youth," she said. "But we have some weaknesses."

After a tough 4-set loss to #16 Loyola Marymount University Wednesday, Gregory was first to point out the defense as being one of the weaker areas of the game.

"Our passing wasn't good enough and our rhythm was too slow," Gregory said. "It's always been a tradition here at UCSB that we have good defense. Ours will get better. We're just a little soft right now."

The Gauchos have played six of the top 20 teams in the country.

The team posted victories over then-#10 San Diego State and #23 Oral Roberts University. However, they suffered two tough defeats against #13 USC and #2 Stanford.
The USC game was es-

pecially tough for Gregory. "The one disappoint-

ment has been a tough five-set loss to USC," she said. "We served the ball into the net twice on match point after taking a two-set lead. We ended up losing in five sets."

The Gauchos will close out their preseason with a home game against Pepperdine on Saturday.







