

## RUSSIAN COURSE TO BE TAUGHT HERE IN RESPONSE TO POPULAR DEMAND

A course in Russian will be offered here this semester in response to a petition by students, it was announced recently by Dr. Lewis F. Walton, acting Registrar.

The four-unit course, known as Russian I, will be taught by Dr. Edmond E. Masson. Dr. Masson was born in Russia of French parentage; he has taught Russian at other colleges and served with the "Voice of America" in the last war.

### Aid for Military

The petition for such a course was signed by students who expect to be called into military service and who expressed the opinion that it would be of value for their college records to show that they had studied Russian.

According to Dr. Masson, the study of Russian is being widely encouraged. There is a great need for translators, he continued. In the scientific fields, he pointed out, where at one time principal new works were being published in German and French, now Russian holds a primary position. More than 100 United States Colleges are now offering Russian courses, he said.

### Other Language Courses

Two other new courses are being started in the Spring semester in the Foreign Languages Department, according to Dr. Pablo Avila, acting chairman. They are French and Spanish 8-A, for conversational use of these languages for students who have two years' work in high school or two semesters in college and who desire practice in day-by-day conversational studies on the elementary level.

### Astronomy

Also offered this semester will be a three-unit math course in Astronomy. At first the course was not being offered, but the Mathematics Department changed its mind. Dr. Donald Wall is instructor.

Of special interest to those participating in the civilian defense program is a new course in standard first aid, which is being offered Monday and Wednesday at 10 am and Tuesday and Thursday at 2 pm. Instructors for the course are Track Coach Nick Carter and Football Coach "Doc" Kelliher.

Housing was provided by Kappa Sigma fraternity house and Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity house for the men and Mrs. Jennie J. Schallis's boarding house for the girls. Dinner was served at Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity house with the local chapter of the United Nations supplying the food.

Events planned for the students included an informal welcome at the Court House Sunken Gardens, a party with dancing to help the students get acquainted, and a tour of the city.

Included on the 1200-mile trip were two students from Santa Barbara, Elsa Christensson and Waldemar Besson, and others from Loyola, Pomona, UCLA, San Diego State, Occidental, USC, and Cal Tech.

## Is Our Registration Procedure Obsolete?

Each time Registration Week rolls around we at UCSBC ask ourselves if the long process connected with paying registration fees and signing up for classes cannot be alleviated in some way. However, we soon forget about it after the semester begins and the tiring registration process in present use continues semester after semester.

After investigation for a solution of this problem, which has in the past been common to all the Cal campuses, the powers-that-be at UCLA have developed a system of registration by mail, which has proved to be very successful. By this system the student pays his fees, fills out his cards, and signs up for his classes through the channels of the U. S. Mails.

If such a system of registration can work at UCLA, with an enrollment of close to 20,000 students, it stands to reason that it should work at Santa Barbara College, with an enrollment of less than 2,000 students.

The advantages of such an enrollment process are numerous. In the first place it would mean a lot less wear and tear on students and University employees alike. In the second place it would give students and faculty an extra week of vacation, disturbed only by certain days set aside for counseling. In the third place it would give the student body more time for social activities to welcome new students, and in the fourth place it would give organizations an opportunity to carry on the necessary rushing activities without bothersome interference.

Since the advantages of registration by mail are many, while the disadvantages are small, we would like to encourage the adoption of such a procedure by this school at the earliest possible time.



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**EASTER RELAYS SET FOR MARCH 24 MEET**

Co-sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Santa Barbara College, the Santa Barbara Easter Relays has been scheduled for La Playa Stadium March 24.

Competition will be held in open collegiate, junior colleges and three high school divisions. One division of the relays will be limited to Los Angeles City schools, another to CIF schools of over 1000 students, and the other to CIF schools under that number.

The Easter Relays were rained out last year after 1100 athletes from throughout Southern California had been entered, and a like amount is expected by the officials of this annual event.

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**Track Season Opens With Frosh Eligible**

Announcing the most ambitious track schedule in Santa Barbara's history, Nick Carter, coach of the Gaucho thinclads, is now running his charges through their paces daily from 3 to 5 pm on La Playa's cinder circle preparing for the grind.

Carter stresses the fact that all who wish to participate in the sport must start training immediately. Another important fact concerns a new ruling of the CCAA which allows freshmen to enter all varsity sports due to impending manpower shortage.

Undismayed by the tough schedule, listed below, Carter is optimistic and points out the presence of some consistent point-makers and lettermen in most events. Heading the list of medal winners is Otey Scruggs, holder of the school quarter-mile record and decathlon ace. Then there is Willie Dancer, who high jumped to CCAA top honors last year, and Del Pickerts, who was the league's best in the javelin last season. Other lettermen include Ted Vick in the lows and Dick Barry in the high sticks.

Other worthies are Don Crie in the long distances; Bob Mathews in the pole vault along with Howard Cook; and Leo Jennings in the broad jump. Some good JC transfers will probably add the needed depth, which is absent especially in the discus and shot events.

Carter expects to fill up dates in February with more meets prior to the already established schedule. There to lend him a helping hand will be Mayville S. Kelliher who adds depth to the coaching staff.

**GAUCHOS SPEND SO-SO VACATION; TRIP LA, OXY**

Pursuing a murderous schedule over the semesters' interim, the Gaucho basketballers continue to show improvements as the season progresses, but a lack of depth is the cause of second half defeats which have been plaguing the Santa Barbarans from early in the season.

**HARDER REVEALS '51 GRID MENU**

With an eye on bigger and better things athletically, the Santa Barbara Gauchos have expanded their football schedule for next season to a full ten games, which will include six home fracas at La Playa Stadium while dropping the perennially weak Cal Tech, according to Athletic Director Spud Harder.

The Santa Barbarans will open the season with an intersectional against New Mexico A & M here and close out with a CCAA clash against Pepperdine at La Playa also.

Los Angeles State, new member of the CCAA, and New Mexico are the only newcomers to the 1951 schedule. LA State fields its first football team in its history, while the Gauchos will be re-newing hostilities with the Aggies of New Mexico, dating back to the years of 1937-38. The home-towners coped the first tilt 25-14 but were edged the following year 9-7 by the dry-land boys, who have been scheduling tougher opponents lately themselves.

In addition to LA State and Pepperdine, Santa Barbara will meet Fresno State, Cal Poly and San Diego State of the CCAA and also has scheduled games with Pomona, Occidental and Whittier of the Southern California Intercollegiate Conference.

The annual Cal Day game with the Cal Aggies will be played at Los Angeles as the customary prelude to the California-UCLA game.

Last year's seven-win and three-loss record stems from victories over Pomona, Fresno State, Cal Aggies, Cal Tech, Cal Poly and Pepperdine, and losses to Occidental, Whittier and the CCAA Champion San Diego State.

The Gauchos, under Head Coach Roy Engle and Line Coach Stan Williamson, will open football practice early on or about September 1. The 1951 schedule is as follows:

Liked by the southland scribes, but losing to the UCLA Bruins, the Gauchos went down 76-55, out-manned by Johnny Wooden's race horses despite Wilton's liberal use of the bench. The locals also bowed to CCAA foes Pepperdine 66-48, and Cal Poly 67-49, but knocked over LA State 52-50, and revenged a previous loss to Occidental by ruining the Tigers 59-46 on the Armory hardwood. The AAU quintet of Fibber McGee and Molly duplicated an early season win over the Gauchos to bring the season's record to eight wins and 12 losses.

According to conference scoring records, Forward Allan Jacobs is sixth in individual scoring with an average of 12.4 points per game in the five league encounters which he has played, there being an additional five CCAA tilts remaining on the Gaucho schedule.

**University of California Is Largest in Nation**

Using full time enrollment as a basis for ranking, the University of California has been reported by far the largest institution of higher learning in the United States with an enrollment of 34,492 men and women on the eight campuses. This includes the 6,000 Extension enrollment, however. Columbia University ranks second with a considerably smaller enrollment of 21,938.

Although the enrollment is such in number in the University, it is reducing considerably due to the drawing to a close of the rights of the G. I. Bill. Greatly reduced are the veteran men and women who fluctuated enrollment figures all over the United States after the World War II.
