# Speaker Elects **Europe Strife** For Subject

Talk Necessitates Change in Original Assembly Schedule

First in a series of lectures to be presented by Emil Ludwig, world- Eckles, A. M. S. prexy. renowned historian and biographer, will be delivered Tuesday during assembly hour in the State college auditorium, according to President Clarence L. Phelps.

Because of the overflow attendance expected, arrangemnts have been made to install a public address system in the library so that students unable to be seated in the auditorium will be enabled to hear the speaker although they will be unable to see him in person.

REVOLUTION TOPIC

Ludwig will speak on the "Revolution in Europe," a subject upon which he is especially well-informed due to his recent residence in Europe. Before coming to the United States Ludwig lived at Moscia, Italy, near the Swiss border.

Jack Richards, associated students president, stresses the fact that doors of the auditorium will be closed early and no one will be admitted after that time. Those students unable to gain admittance to the audi torium are asked to listen from the library.

"What do we in California think of the War? And of Conscription? . . . You could not have asked a harder question. Like you, we do not know what to think or what to believe. We know that we are in the midst of political campaign and the leaders of both parties are so anxious to throw mud into each others eyes that they have failed to give us any help in analyzing the situation. So we can only use our wits and hope for the best.

Of the war, we only think that it is terrible. Like you, most of us are openly, or unconsciously, sitting on the Great Britain side of the stadium. We find it hard to reconcile ourselves to a German victory, for we have long been taught that dictatorships are mere transitory objects and that only democratic truth could long be tolerated by men.

Ours is a represenative form of government. It demands confidence and respect of the people from those that are placed in office, whoever is elected."
