Additions Completed in Summer

Construction Improvements Include Classrooms and Laboratories

Construction improvement projects recently begun on the State college campus have been completed during summer.

Pine Hall, new classroom building was finished last June, and is ready for class use. Tables and desks to be used by the professors have been made during the summer in the industrial education department. This new building consists of three classrooms, a large lecture room, and five faculty offices. It will accommodate approximately three hundred students.

New Coop Store

Other changes made in the campus are the cooperative store, which has been moved to a new location next to the original site. Improvements have been made in the chemistry laboratory, and it will be ready for classes at the beginning of next week.

A field house has been erected on Phelps field, and with the addition of showers will be ready for use.

Cars may be driven in a complete circle around the administration building, due to the leveling of the road during the summer.

Remodeling and repairing of the pipeline completed during the past three months, will better the heating facilities in classrooms.

"No legislation can be taken on a possible site of a new college for two years," states President Phelps, "and we are endeavoring to improve the conditions of the campus as much as possible."

State Students Advertise Game With Car Rally

Organizing in front of the administration building at 12:25, State college students will participate in a car rally, parading from the campus to the corner of State and Sola, and continuing on down to the beach.

This rally will advertise the first football game of the season, with the Santa Barbara Athletic Club. The rally committee requests that all persons able enter a car. Participants will line up in front of the administration building behind the yell leaders.

"Despite the short notice of this rally, a large number of cars are expected to participate," announced Ronald McDonald, yell leader.

Nearly 100 Percent Placed in Positions

During a two year period, the kindergarten primary department has increased in number from 13 members to 53.

Twenty-two graduates out of 26 were placed in positions this year from the department. Four grads, Janet Hilton, Ruth Hilty, Miriam Alexander and Lucille Ellis will teach in Ventura. The remainder will teach in nearby towns and communities.

Old members of the department entertained the new members with a picnic supper given last Tuesday evening in Alameda Padre Serra park. Department meetings will be held on the first of the month.

Eighty-Two Enroll for Work in Production and Other Play Activities

By an unanimous vote, Lyman "Goldy" Goldsmith was elected president of the Players Club, Wednesday evening, September 18, at a meeting held in the women's club room. The executive staff of the club will appoint committee chairmen who will be in charge of the various phases of production, namely business management, make-up, publicity and advertisement, casting, properties, set designs and construction, and acting. These committees for production are appointed by the executive staff with the approval of the advisory board, which is made up of Dean William Ashworth, Mrs. Hal Davis and Harry "Buppy" Moore.

Short talks were given by members of the advisory board, welcoming the new members and presenting ideas and plans for the current year. Eighty-two members signed up for entrance into the club Wednesday night.

Before an enthusiastic audience, Ronald McDonald, yell leader, opened the football season at the annual pep rally held Thursday night in the State college auditorium.

Coach "Spud" Harder addressed the group, urging them to support the team, and to do their part in making this football season a success for Santa Barbara State.

"You were all given voices, so use them," spoke Coach Harder. "Yeager and Morelli, mainstays of the backfield, need encouragement, and it's up to every student to give it to them!"

The yell leader and his assistant, Harry Sloan, introduced several new yells to the assembly. School songs, under the leadership of Petie McKinney, song leader, and Dorothy Darrow, assistant, also featured the meeting.

Federal Help Given Students in New Program

In accordance with a new policy formulated by President Roosevelt, F.E.R.A. positions which were held on the campus last semester, have been placed under the heading of National Youth Administration.

Ninety-two students are employed at present on the campus, fifty-five women and thirty-seven men have been given positions.

Types of work on the campus consist of clerical, library, laboratory, research, readers, campus improvement, poster publicity, and health cottage assistance. Off-campus work consists of playground supervision, and secretarial work at the Chamber of Commerce and Museum of Natural History.

Dean Bennink will supervise the women, and Dean Ashworth, the men.

It took several days before the name Roger was decided upon, and then friends and associates promptly nick-named Way's son, "Philbert."

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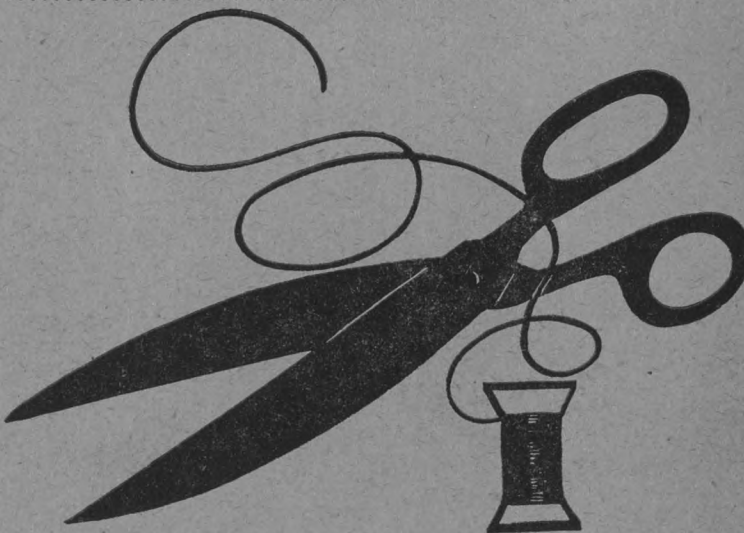
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Gaicho Gab

Tangling with the potent Los Prietos C.C.C. eleven the Santa Barbara State Gauchos will officially open probably the toughest schedule in Frosh history tonight on Pershing park field at 6:30 p.m.

Last year Coach "Bud" Cummings protege's came out on the long end of a 20 to 0 encounter. The tables are expected to be turned tonight, however, for last week the strong Ventura J. C. squad took a neat 28 to 0 trimming from the Los Prietos gridsters. How Cummings and his pigskin toters will fare during the coming months may fairly well be determined following tonight's encounter.

Every frosh candidate in uniform for the C.C.C. game will see action, according to Coach Cummings who in this manner expects to get a line on each of the 40 first year prospects. It is difficult this early in the campaign to select any outstanding players but several men have made noticeable impressions during the past two weeks. Gardonire, all-state fullback from Lind-say; Busbe and Hackaman of Tulare, all-league center and quarterback; Roy Voorhees, captain Livingston High eleven; Louie Trigaro, Bakersfield flash; James, former C.C.C. camp halfback; and Nicoletti, Campbell, and Riparetti, Don stars of last season are a few of many likely prospects. Several candidates from Huntington Park, the complete backfield of last year's Lompoc High eleven, and Martin, Carpinteria High backfield ace, have all enrolled and turned out for football.

Cummings reports that every man out for the squad looks good and will have an equal chance of making the first string. Plenty of hard work is in store for the freshmen tonight if they expect to come out on top. Los Prietos boast of a 220 pound negro backfield star who performed last week against Ventura like a midseason veteran.

With due regard for all reports on the strength of the C.C.C. team the Gaicho Babes have been installed slight favorites. The first year men expect to enter one of their toughest games of the season next week against Bakersfield Junior College with one victory stored away.

Stunts for the games will be eliminated this year in order that the music itself may be concentrated on to a better advantage.

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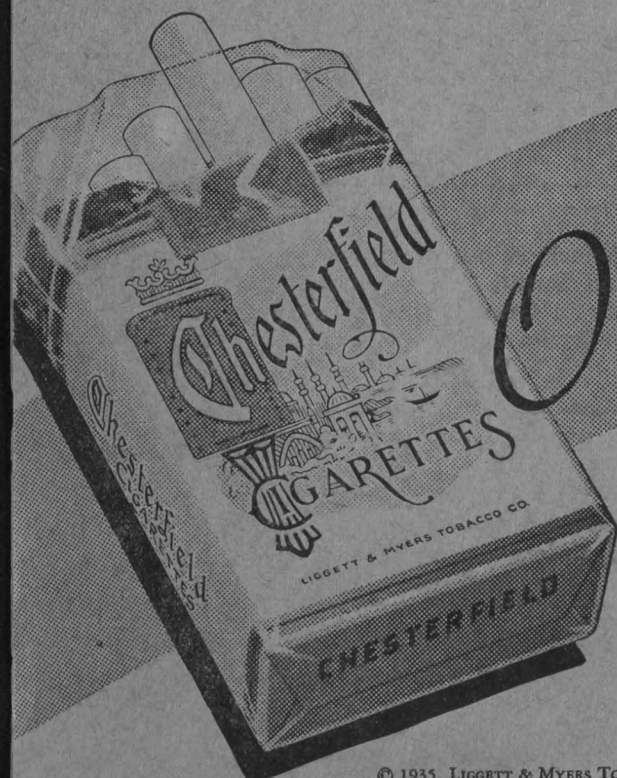
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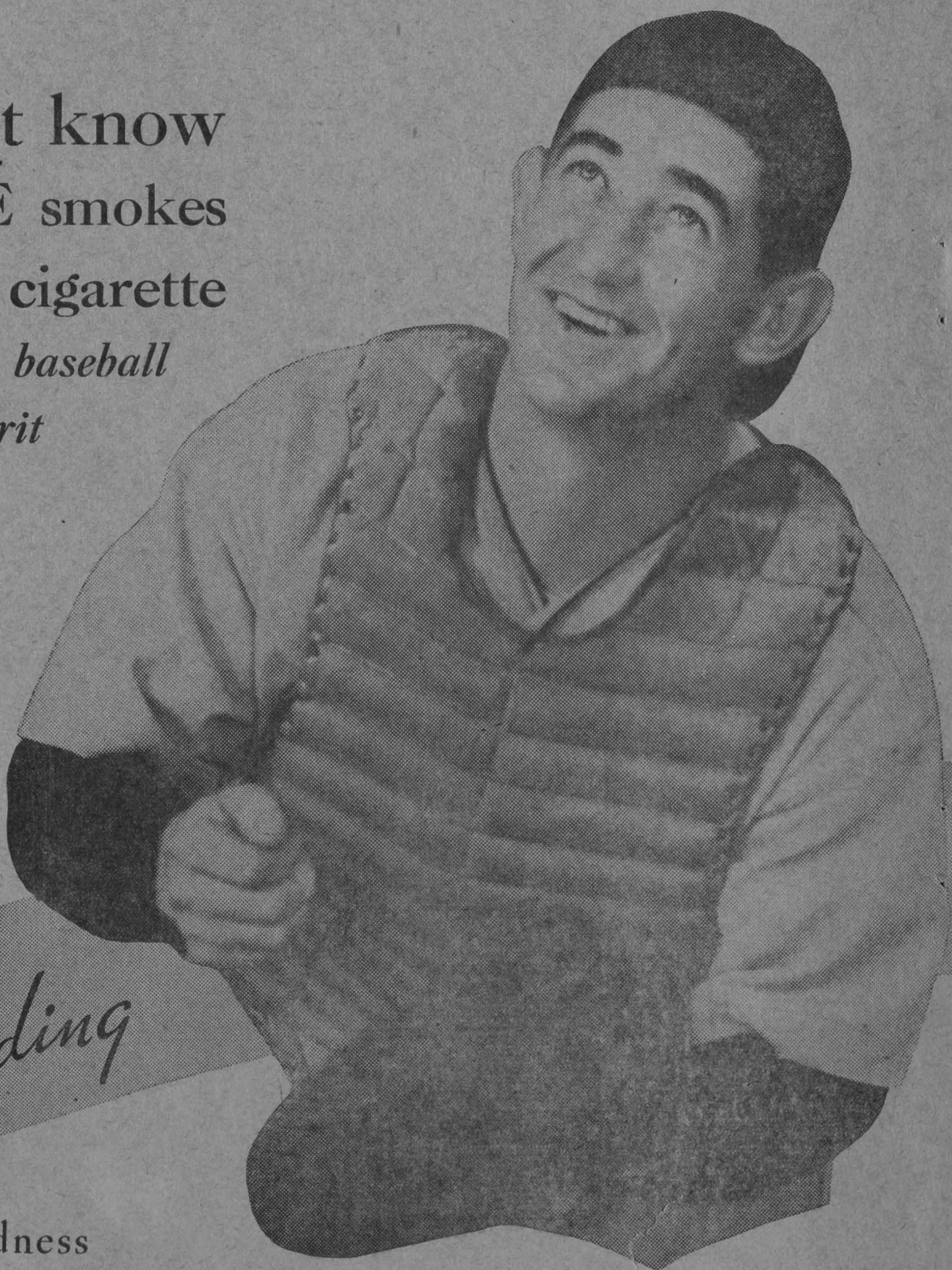
