ASB ELECTION TODAY

Jack Directs Stage Show; Review Original Script, Music Next Thursday Night

Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, what promises to be one of the best Roadrunner Revues in SBC history will be presented on the stage of the Riviera Auditorium. Sparked by laughs, skits, fresh talent and new music, this show will provide a good evening's entertainment, according to Phil Jacks, Jr., director of the Revue.

Heading the roster of talent is Dean Mills, who has been given the lead role. Supporting him will be a bevy of beauties from the Alpha Thete, Tau Gam, and Delta Gamma sororities, and a group of men from the Delta Sig fraternity, of whom have been assigned prominent spots in the show.

Musical numbers in the show will feature the voice of Irma Tami, Claire Maher, Dolores Dahl, Evelyn Steiner, Helen Hatch, Russanata, Joel Andrews, and the Blue glee club quartet.

Original music for the show has been written by Cauchos Bill Hardison and Dick Church. Also included in the musical agenda will be several all-time all-timers. Dud Thompson will lead the ten-piece orchestra of college men, with arrangements and orchestrations by Perkins.

Scripts for the show have been written by Walter Arndt, an SBC graduate last February, was pressed into service because of his extensive experience with college shows.

Sets for the show have been designed by Bob Anderson. Organizing the dance groups was Jody Wyden. Phil Jacks, Jr., is director and producer of the show.

A ticket sales contest began last Friday and will continue till this evening weekend. Three trophies have been offered as first, second, and third prizes for organizations selling the most tickets. All organizations who wish to enter the competition and who have not yet picked up their tickets are urged to do so immediately. Tickets can be obtained at the Graduate Manager's office. Admission to the Revue will be sixty cents for general admission and ninety cents for reserved seats. Reservations may be made by calling 3116.

Jack stressed the point that curtain time for the show will be 8:00 pm, not 8:30 as has been the case in the past. This new starting time has been set in order to make possible to present a good show of reasonable length without keeping the audience too late.

Candidates Pass Investigation Of Election Board for Revote

Thursday, May 12th, the Election Board voided the election of May 11th and postponed the Student Body election until Tuesday, May 17th, and Wednesday, May 18th. Facilities for voting on the Riviera campus will be limited to one polling station. The poll will be equipped with five individual voting booths to insure a secret ballot. Polls will be open from nine to four on Tuesday and nine to one on Wednesday in the event a two-third vote is not cast on Tuesday.

Committee Lists Tests, Judicial Regulations

The approach of Spring final exams and the continued flood of reports concerning student cheating has just prompted a clarifying report from Harry Brumbaugh, Chairman of the Santa Barbara College Judicial Committee. In the following letter, addressed to the editors of El Gaucho, Mr. Brumbaugh has set forth plans of the Judicial Committee to offset future cheating:

"I wish to restate two of the purposes of the Student Judicial Committee before finals so that students will be aware of what the Committee does.

"If any student has a complaint about the way tests have been given in a particular class and the complaint is a valid one, the Judicial Committee will be glad to hear about it, and we will attempt to do something about it before finals. The Committee has been fairly successful in alleviating such conditions in the past. A box, marked Judicial Committee, has been placed with the mailboxes in the Quad to receive such complaints. The Committee hopes that students will feel free to use the Committee to improve testing conditions so that everyone will have equal opportunity on the finals.

"With the thought in mind that it might help students as a study guide for tests, the Judicial Committee suggested to the Faculty that old tests be placed in the library. Many faculty members have placed old copies of tests in the library, and a list of the tests available is published in this issue of El Gaucho.

"Another purpose of the Committee is to hear cases with regard to cheating by students and to make recommendations to the Faculty Discipline Committee on what kind of penalty should be given to the offender. The Committee has acted on two cases during the past year, and its recommendations have been approved by the Faculty Discipline Committee with few changes."

Against what we hope was the spirited resistance of Donald Bear, the Upjohn Pharmaceutical Supply Company recently invaded the sacrosanct McCormick gallery with their collection of thirty-one, count them thirty-one, contemporary American paintings hung so they spell capitals UPJOHN.

With a little advance preparation, we might have appreciated the hilarity of a rather well-executed oil raucously labeled *Have you learned to live with a stomach ulcer?* but stumbling blindly onto the work from the Charles Laughton collection as we did, gave us a shock we won't soon forget. Instead of scurrying off to the nearest drug store to refill our medicine chest as the exhibit was clearly designed to make us do, we paid frenzied visits to the many dilettantes among our associates to try to dissuade them from becoming a part of what we're certain the Upjohn executives refer to as their 'gate'.

The less the 'gate' to the traveling exhibit, we explained, the less would other advertisers be encouraged to purchase and display good art, and the less would be our chances of someday seeing *The Blue Boy* relabeled *Cyanosis plus!*; the *Venus de Milo* relabeled *If you must cut underarm odor in half . . .*; and almost any Picasso recaptioned *Never results like this with Sherwin-Williams*.

As our friends paid us no heed whatsoever, we can only look to the future with foreboding.

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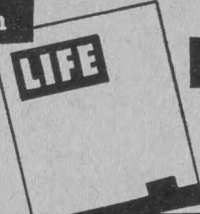
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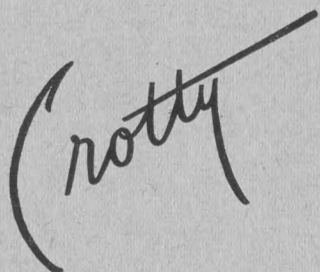

Cigarette Survey

Do you smoke cigarettes? Why? How many? These and other questions were asked of 1555 Santa Barbara College students in a recent smoking poll held on the campus. The poll was instigated by Fred Swehla who wished to discover the smoking habits of the men and women at the college. The 1555 students represented 67% of the entire student body of 2306, and therefore the poll must be considered both valid and conclusive. In order to insure the validity even to a higher degree, every 250 cases were compared, and the results of each of the six pollsters were compared. In both cases a very high correlation was noted.

The poll got a good cross-section of the student body, for contacts were made of the Riviera campus, fraternity and sorority houses, class rooms athletic field, etc. A great deal of the time and work have gone into getting and compiling the figures that will answer these and other questions:

1. Do more men or women smoke on the campus?
2. What percentage of students at Santa Barbara College smoke?
3. How many cigarettes per day does the average smoker smoke?

Of course, it must be pointed out that this poll could never have been made without the excellent

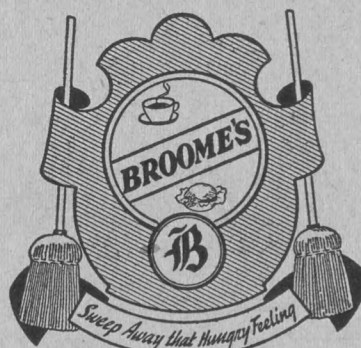

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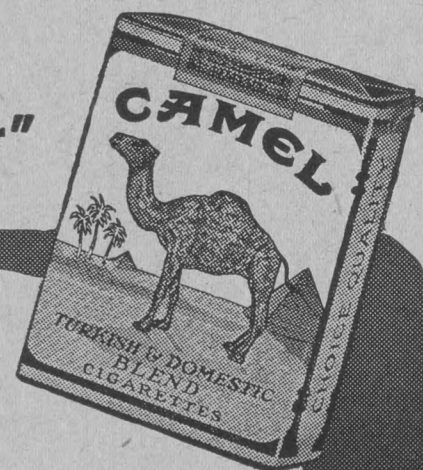
