FALL SEMESTER OPENS SEPT. 14

The regular session will open Sept. 14 and the first week will be devoted to registration activities -- examinations, tests, assemblies, counseling, and finally registration and payment of fees.

The complete academic calendar may be found in the new Schedule of Classes, now available. High points on the schedule include a required assembly for all new students on Tuesday morning, Sept. 15, at 9 a.m. Tuesday and Wednesday will be devoted to various tests and counseling. Actual registration and payment of fees will be on Thursday of that week. Check the schedule for details.

Students who plan to attend UCSBC in the fall and were not previously registered in a regular session, are urged to submit an application and other necessary credentials as soon as possible. The registrar's office has all the details.
