CONFERENCES ON CAMPUS

During your six weeks here, you will find several educational and professional groups coming and going. The campus is an active summer conference center and these various groups are using Santa Rosa Hall as their headquarters.

Beginning Monday morning there will be nearly 1,000 Agricultural engineers on campus for the 51st annual national convention of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

On June 30, a conference on the Optimum Design of Structures will open for two weeks to discuss design principles of space vehicles and missiles, sponsored by UC Extension.

Several other conferences will follow including a football clinic, adult education, librarians, vocational homemakers, accountants, folk dance, and others.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS LECTURE

A series of six public lectures will be given by visiting staff members of the Industrial Arts Department each Wednesday at 11 a.m. in the Mesa Campus Auditorium. The first lecture will be given June 25 by Robert L. Woodward, State Consultant in Industrial Arts Education for the State Department of Education.

FOUR ALL-COLLEGE LECTURES

Four of our distinguished visiting professors will give public lectures during July on Tuesday afternoons at 3 p.m. for both the campus community and campus visitors. The series will be given in the lecture hall of the New Classroom Bldg.

The summer lectures will open July 1 with the distinguished Canadian critic and author, Marshall McLuhan, professor of English Literature, University of Toronto, speaking on "The Electronic Revolution and the Undeveloped Countries of the Mind." A brilliant wit as well as an intellectual leader, Prof. McLuhan is the founder of the Canadian journal, "Exploration", and is interested in the problems of communication in this century.
