TOPIC FOR ALL-COLLEGE LECTURE

Hawaiian Island race relations will be the topic of discussion by Dr. Aubrey Haan, guest professor at Santa Barbara College, in the All-College Lecture to be given at 3 p.m. today.

Dr. Haan is assistant professor at the University of Hawaii, and has traveled extensively in the islands the past three years while teaching there.

Included in the talk will be a discussion of the adjustment of the population to resources and the protection of civil rights in a period of hysteria based on ideological differences.

The lecture, which is free to the public, is sponsored by University Extension and the Committee on drama, lectures and music, and will be given in Pine Hall 100.
