## GAUCHOS SEEK CCAA BASEBALL CROWN

### Christofferson and Troy Plan Sunday Night Cabrillo Pavilion Party for Frosh, Sophomores

Gaiety, laughter, and entertainment will be in store for all freshmen and sophomores at a joint class party to be held at Cabrillo Pavilion Sunday evening, May 21, from 7:30 to 11 pm.

This event is open and free to any and all bearers of either a freshman or sophomore Spring semester class card. However, members of other classes are cordially invited to attend. Tickets are fifty cents and are being sold today in the snack area.

Featured attractions of the evening will be dancing, television, pool, millions of card games, ping pong, and refreshments. Informal sport clothes will be in order for the event, which is being subsidized by the freshman class.

All members of both classes are urged to attend this last "fling" of the semester, according to Ted Troy and Bob Christofferson, student chairmen of the event.

"Inasmuch as this is the only open date of the whole Spring semester for an event for the freshman class, it really ought to be the greatest. Everybody will be there," added Troy.

### McRary, Goodspeed Go South to UCLA For Summer Session

Willard McRary, Associate Professor of Chemistry and Chairman of the Department of Physical Sciences, will join the faculty of UCLA this summer to teach two courses in introductory general chemistry.

He will also carry on research on the synthesis of isocitric acid and make use of the library facilities on the Los Angeles campus of the University.

Dr. Stephen S. Goodspeed, Assistant Professor of Political Science, will be on the Summer Session faculty of UCLA for the eight-week session.

He will teach "Foundations of National Power" and "Government and Politics of Latin America." In addition he will continue his research in Mexican governmental institutions and a study on the personal leadership of the Mexican chief executive for a monograph to be published.

Malcolm H. Neal seeks the Judicial Committee.

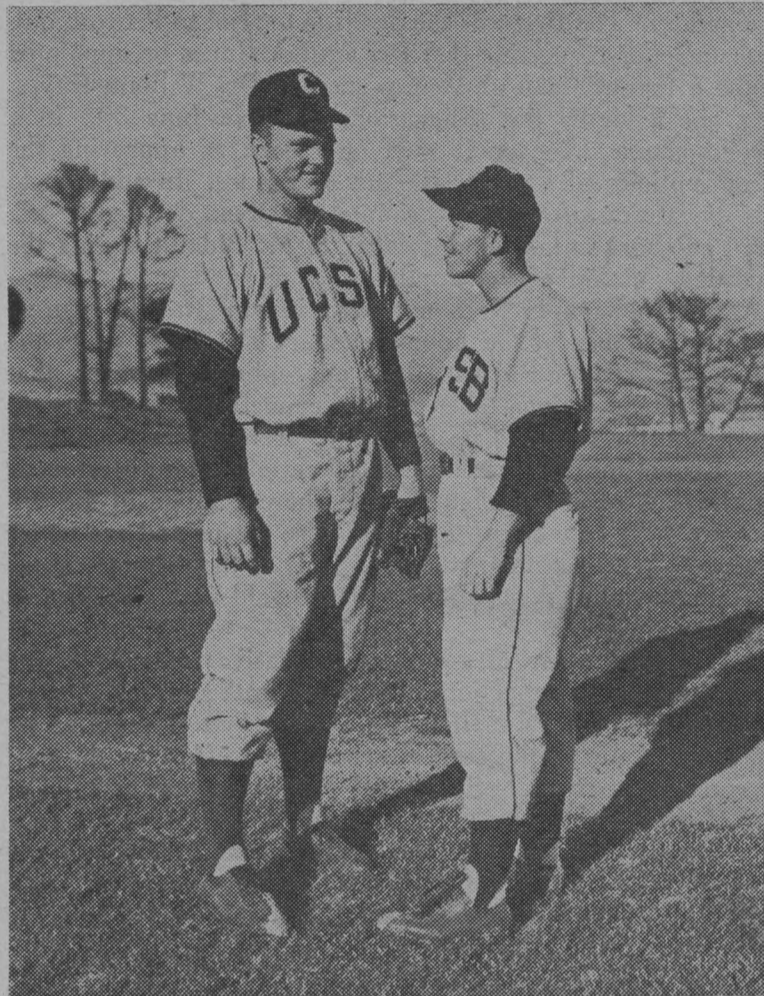
Speech Control Board chairmanship is being sought by Marie Willett, Twila Berkeley and Earl Owens.

### Actor Shank Directs 'Beyond the Horizon' Coming Production

Ted Shank, Santa Barbara College senior and director of "Beyond the Horizon," to be presented by the Associated Students on May 26 and 27, is an experienced actor, known both to college and city audiences in Santa Barbara.

Among the 27 major dramatic productions in which Shank has appeared are the student productions of "Hamlet," "Dr. Knock," "Of Thee I Sing," and "Green Grow the Lilacs," all of which were eminently successful.

His varied dramatic experience also includes such off-campus plays as "Our Town," in which he appeared shortly after coming to Santa Barbara, "The Far Off Hills," "The Barretts of Wimpole Street," and the very popular "Hit and Run" revue, which was given both on and off campus and which climaxed its run with a tour of nearby communities.

#### Problems Solved

In addition to his work as a director, Shank has rewritten a number of the scenes in the play to provide for greater ease in the student production by eliminating such difficulties as the necessity for finding a very small child required in the cast by the original script. To overcome the problem introduced by this requirement, he has reset part of the play off stage so that the dialogue may be heard but the action cannot be seen.

Hardison, a junior, is a member of Cal Club, was a member of the Squires, and has held the offices of Knights vice-president and AMS secretary.

Schaefer, a junior, is a member of Block C, the Knights, and is AMS treasurer.

Smith, also a junior, was Tennis Club president. No information on Davidson was available.

Candidates for AMS vice-president are Frank Dominguez, Arnold Funai and Allen Jacobs. Running for treasurer are Charles Hanawalt, Frank Smith and Frank Thornburgh.

The three candidates for secretary are Fillmore Condit, Howard Gorton and Hilbert Lee. Running unopposed for historian and sergeant-at-arms are Barry Hoelscher and Augie Ramirez respectively.

A run-off election will be held shortly following the general election in case no candidate for an office receives the required majority of ballots cast.

Coach Spud Harder's free-wheeling club will need no prodding to go all out in the championship series. In the history of the school, Santa Barbara has yet to win the Conference pennant. However, despite their underdog role, the Gauchos have the hitting to upset the odds.

#### Johnston to Start

A sure starter in the important first game next Monday night is Bob Johnston, a tiny southpaw who put his teammates in the playoffs almost singlehandedly. In five days, Johnston set down San Diego State twice and the Pepperdine Waves twice to give Santa Barbara a clear title to the southern crown. A cool, heady pitcher, Johnston has won 10, lost five this season. In the last 23 2/3 innings he has pitched, he has allowed only one earned run, a homer by Pepperdine's Ray Johnson.

Slated to start in the second game Tuesday afternoon, according to Harder, is Paddy Hill (0-2). On deck as firemen or alternate starters are Corkey Johnson, a big right hander with a 4-3 record, and Jack Pickett, a 3-0 portsider.

The Gauchos, who have won 18 and lost 10, rank at least even with the Bulldogs in the hitting department.

Shortstop Bill Davis leads the regulars with .365, second baseman Danny Kutch has .311, and outfielder Gil Rayburn is currently hitting .297.

Bill Davis, ace Gaucho shortstop, was lost for the playoffs with Fresno in Monday's game with Cal. Bill sustained a serious spike wound as a Cal player attempted to block Davis' completion of a double play.

## EDITORIAL

### NOT COUNCIL JURISDICTION . . .

Last Tuesday night the Student Legislative Council took two actions. The first was the decision to send to Provost Williams a letter requesting that Dr. Paul A. Jones be appointed to the office of Dean of Men to succeed Dr. William Hayes, who has tendered his resignation, effective June 30. In a second action the council went on record as approving the recent policies of Premier Bidault of France. In addition to this expression of approval, council members decided to ask Dr. Paul Perigord to send a letter to M. Bidault stating the recorded opinion of the group.

This newspaper does not wish in any way to express opposition either to the appointment of Dr. Jones or to the efforts of Premier Bidault. It is our opinion, however, that neither of the actions taken by the council are necessary or are within the realm of its legislative prerogatives.

Requesting the appointment of certain administrators is not the duty of any student group. The executives of the college are fully capable of making a wise choice and are better equipped to do so than students. Only if they choose to ask the opinions of students on the matter would such a request be appropriate.

The uselessness of a college legislative council's giving commendation to the actions of a figure in the sphere of international relations is sufficiently evident that it requires no comment. Only in the case of a concerted effort on the part of councils of several educational institutions would it be of any avail.

The jurisdiction of the Legislative Council includes many immediate and important problems. Its time would be better spent in solving them than in entering fields in which it can accomplish nothing concrete.

Irwin Perlis, senior, has received an appointment as Teaching Assistant in Botany from the University of Illinois, it was announced by Dr. Elmer Noble.

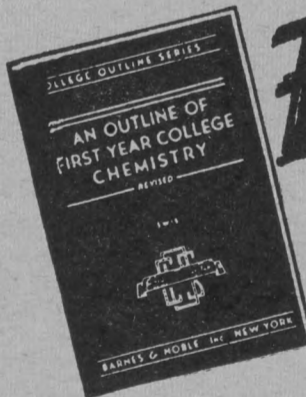

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# ALUMS RETURN TO LA PLAYA TODAY

## PICKARTS, DANCER GET INVITATIONS TO COMPETE IN COLISEUM RELAYS

Santa Barbara College's two ace field event performers, javelin artist Delfs Pickarts and high jumper Willie Dancer, have announced they have accepted invitations to compete in the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays tonight.

Pickarts, a serious-minded 22-year-old from Riverside, hit his stride last year abroad with an AAU team. He tossed his spear 228 feet, 9 1/4 inches at Goteborg, Sweden, a throw that was ranked as the world's ninth best in 1949. This year he has thrown 227 feet, 4 1/2 inches, third best in the nation.

At the Coliseum Relays, Pick-

arts will meet three other collegians who help make up the top five in national javelin circles. Stanford's Bud Held, California's George Roseme and UCLA's Cy Young form, with Pickarts, a quartet that could stimulate some record-breaking marks. Latest national statistics had Held's top mark at 233 feet, 4 1/2 inches, Roseme at 229 feet 11 1/4 inches, and Young at 221 feet 3 3/4 inches.

Dancer's big competition should come from Jack Razzeto of San Diego, Mel Martin of San Jose State, USC's Manuel Ronquillo, and a flock of other top notchers. Razzeto's top leap of 6 feet 8 1/4 inches is as good as any jump in the country this year.

## Varsity Faces Tough Alumni Today; Oldsters Rugged for Annual Fray; Will Face 1950 Football Hopefuls

The student body of Santa Barbara College and all loyal Gauchos supporters are invited to get a look see at the 1950 Gauchos football team this afternoon as they

knock heads with a star-studded alumni eleven in a classical contest slated to get under way at three o'clock at La Playa Field.

## Cal Wins 4-1

The Berkeley Campus of the University of California defeated the Santa Barbara campus in a baseball game here Monday night. The Gauchos defeat broke Pitcher Bob Johnston's win streak of four games.

The Golden Bears won the game in the seventh inning when they overcame a one-run Santa Barbara lead. Cal scored three unearned runs in this inning.

Leadoff man Al Davies started Cal's big inning with a single and went to second on Bob Talley's error. Alan Cox dropped a long fly to center with the Bears going to first and third. Next act in the comedy of errors featured Dan Kutch who missed a hard hit ball.

With the bases loaded Third Baseman Karl Anaclerio lofted a fly to center with Davies scoring after the catch. A one-base hit again loaded the bases. At this point Johnston was hit by a hard line drive but was able to continue after a few minutes.

Jim Howe, big Cal rightfielder, was the next man. He banged out a long single to score two men. The Gauchos got out of the inning with a fast double play.

A long triple in the eighth by Shortstop George Peekema was followed by Pitcher Leo Sullivan's third scratch hit of the day to complete the scoring.

The Santa Barbara team scored their only run of the game in the fifth inning. Tom Dailey hit a long ball and slid safely into third for a triple. After Vern Wrightson walked John Bassler struck out. Bobby Johnston then batted in the run with a neat bunt. The squeeze play worked nicely as the Cal pitcher fell attempting to field the ball.

Coach Roy Engle will field a team composed of eleven of his twenty returning lettermen and a host of promising newcomers. Eight veterans may get the starting call against the alums, giving the varsity an experienced outfit with which to do battle against a big rugged alumni team headed by '49 QB Glen Mullaney.

Dick Gorrie is the likely choice to start at the signal calling spot, with Lettermen Ron Ternquist and Russ Bertell, two of the leading Gauchos runners last fall, tabbed to fill in as halves. At fullback Roy may be forced to start Mike Noonan, a defensive guard last year, as Letterman Rollie Brice and Gibbie Dear are out because of injuries.

In front of this quartet is a big fast varsity line. Gene Bynum and Dick Bowdey, last year's starters, will be at the guard posts, big Mike Moropoulos will handle the centering, with two newcomers, Minor Roots of the '49 frosh team and Grant Gaunce, a transfer from Pasadena CC, filling out the middle of the line at tackles. The starting flankmen will be Adran Adams, the finest looking boy during the Spring drills, and UCLA's gift to Gauchoville, John Juday.

Behind this starting eleven will be a host of fine reserves headed by Tackles John Cravens and Corky Johnson who have been playing on Spud Harder's baseball team this Spring and have missed most of Spring grid practice. Frank Dominguez is another fine lineman and will start on the defense as he did last fall when he made the all 2C2A squad.

Other varsity standouts who will see much action are Warren Vinton, who will play at either end or center, John Richards, a veteran guard who has come along nicely this Spring, Speedburner Larry Seals (this boy is going to surprise some one) and a host of others.

"Keener's Cutups" smothered their opponents and will meet the "Idiots" in the Men's Gym next Thursday night at 7:30 to settle the championship.

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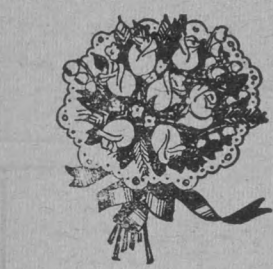
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# BIGGER, BETTER COAST CARNIVAL STARTS OFF EVENTFUL WEEK-END
