

# Editorial--Election Campaigns Can Be Better . . .

Now that elections are over and the dust stirred up by the campaigns has settled, we propose to raise it up again by criticizing the campaign and offering suggestions for future improvement.

In our opinion the quality of the recent campaign hit a new low in comparison with past campaigns. Some of the most important faults brought to light by observation and research were: falsification of signatures on petitions, electioneering at the polls, theft of ballots, attempted ballot box stuffing, poorly planned ballots, too many publicity restrictions, too few worthwhile platforms, and too short a campaign held too early in the year.

## Petition Procedure Poor

The procedure of circulating petitions as it now stands is virtually useless. By the present system students may sign as many petitions for one office as they may desire; this is in opposition to the theory that a signature on a petition indicates a certain amount from the signer. Also, the validity of signatures on such petitions is not checked, encouraging falsification and duplication of signatures. Some people argue that petitions are useful for emphasizing to the students that an election is coming soon; however, posters and announcements

would undoubtedly do just as good a job. To solve this problem of petitions we would suggest either that they be done away with or that they be handled correctly.

## Electioneering at Polls

During this election flagrant violation of the rule prohibiting electioneering at the polls was evident. Even some of the people in charge of the polls were caught in the act of showing students which way to vote. In one case experimenting students were able to steal one hundred ballots from the polls without being caught, but luckily enough they returned them. However, the story goes that when they returned them to the person in charge they were told they might put them in the ballot box if they marked the ballots a certain way! This indicates a need for more responsible people and greater numbers of people to handle the polls.

## Inefficient Ballots

In the run-off election the ballots for Associated Students secretary, Junior Class secretary, and Senior Class secretary were printed on one piece of paper which was handed to all voters. This was very poor because there was no way of checking on who was voting for class officers.

The Publicity Committee was a little harsh in its restric-

tion of the number of posters and banners and in its prohibition of Stunt Day this year. The main reason campaign publicity is restricted is to prevent people who can spend a lot of money on a campaign from having unfair advantage over those who can not. Past experience has shown that a good rousing campaign, including a Stunt Day, stirs up student interest in the election and helps bring out the vote.

## Few Good Platforms

Many of the platforms presented by the candidates this year were time-worn and tiresome. Everyone seemed to have seized a few main issues and to have ridden them to death. Important issues, such as registration by mail, etcetera, were completely overlooked because many candidates simply grabbed things out of thin air instead of doing a little research for a platform.

To improve elections we suggest that they be held later in the year, preferable after Spring Vacation, and that at least one month be devoted to campaigns, both to give the candidates time to find platforms and to give the students time to make voting decisions wisely. Well-run elections are important because experience in school elections often determines whether or not students make good citizens in later life.

## Christofferson New President; ASB, Class Officers Announced

Bob Christofferson has been elected president of the Associated Student Body over Ed McCann by a margin of 138 votes. Marie Allen led the vice-president race against Eleanor Conte, and Pat McCarty won the run-off secretary election against Marian Sabiron.

Bill Grannis is the new head yell leader with 572 votes to Spud Morrow's 376.

In the men's representative-at-large race, Ken Brittingham, Ted Troy, and Desmond Kincaid came out ahead. Sally Carter, Pat Welsh, and Claire Maher are the new women's representatives-at-large.

The Senior Class election results show Bill Kindel as president over Adran Adams, Bill Cunningham as Veep, and Louise Futtere winning the run-off for secretary against Beverly Looper.

Junior Class results name Dave Gorrie president over Marc Wallace, Marilu Anderson vice-president over Pat Huglin, Pat Benko secretary in the run-off with June Murphy.

Sophomores elected Don Noble president of their class over Wendel Niles and Bert Pierce, George Nelson veep, and Melisse Straszer was elected secretary.

Elaine Strobel commented, "The elections went off smoothly. There was a good turn-out for the elections but very few voted in the run-offs."

## Booths Readied

In a meeting of booth chairmen yesterday, final instructions were given to the representatives of 36 organizations in matters of construction, financial arrangement, and procedure.

Ideas for use in booths range from A to Z, including Burlesque, Saloons with and without gambling, Wrestling, Food, Grog, Old Time Movies, and assorted destruction and bodily injury entertainment. Booths will appeal to every age, and with a flurry in downtown publicity, all the future college students, aged three to ten, should be on hand.

## Carnival Spirit

An old-time barker will announce times and facts on booths to the entire carnival area over the course of the evening, and carnival music will blend into the noise of the carnival area itself.

Four ticket booths will supply the crowds with plenty of fast "bucks" for collection by the entertainers. Plenty of hot dogs, peanuts and popcorn, snow cones, and punch should fill everyone's stomach with butterflies, and the four avenues of booths will supply ample diversion for everyone.

## Public Invited

All the townspeople from the Tri-Counties area are encouraged to come to this carnival, in order to increase the turnover to the charities and to show the town the kind of spirit which the Gauchos can produce—a genuine evening of fun of all types.

**Dislikes** — Traveling back and

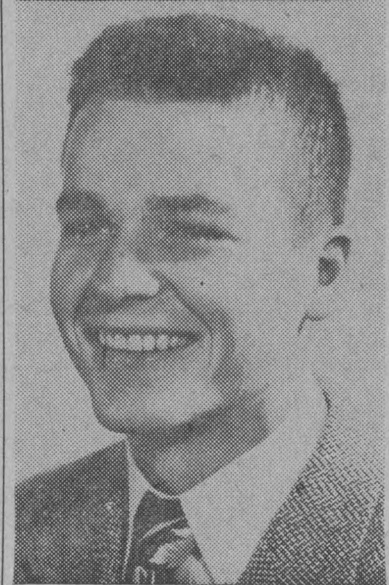
forth between the Mesa and Riviera campuses. The lack of school spirit shown at football games. A good team is even better when cheered on to a glorious victory.

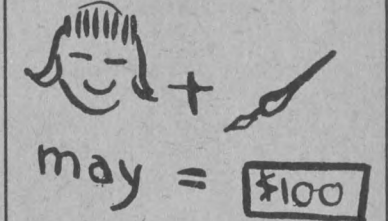

# Gauchos to End Successful Track Season at 2C2A Meet

## Winless Golf Team Takes on Cal Poly

Santa Barbara College's winless golf team takes on a favored Cal Poly squad at Morro Bay Golf Course Friday, May 4, and the record doesn't show much hope for the Gauchos.

Cal Poly's fine aggregation, which finished fifth in last week's Southern California Intercollegiate Golf Tournament, is loaded with talent. Ray Ruegg, Bill Richelt, Frank Bernardi and Harry Root—the Mustang's best foursome—are way above average for college ranks.

Coach Bill Irvine will probably start the same quartet as last week. That will be Don Frederickson, Bob Laskin, Al Allega and Laird Stabler.

## Pickarts, Triulzi Rank Nationally

Two Gaucho track men, javelin flinger Del Pickarts and hurdler Alberto Triulzi, were given high national rankings recently by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Triulzi is in a three-way tie for second in the 120 yard high hurdles. The Argentine star has done 14.3 as have Don Hildreth of Arizona State and Jack Demodocis of Auburn. Fastest colleg man over the sticks this year is USC's Art Barnard with a 14.1 to his credit.

Pickarts, although severely hampered by a sore elbow, snared fifth place among the nation's collegiate stick throwers on the basis of his 212 ft. 8 in. throw two weeks ago at Fresno. Top man in the nation is Chuck Missfeldt of Oregon with 225 ft. 11 3/4 in. Pickarts' all-time best is 227 ft. 4 1/2 in.

### Capable Three

Fresno State, San Diego and Los Angeles State are all capable of taking over the top honors. Cal Poly and Pepperdine occupy the important spot of spoilers in the events they dominate.

## POLICE PROTECTION PROCEDURES OUTLINED FOR STUDENT EVENTS

For the clarification of all student activity groups the Business Manager announced that the following procedure and policy applies in regard to required police protection for all on-campus and off-campus events.

### On-Campus Activities

All on-campus events requiring police protection, as determined by the Captain of the College Police Department, must be requested through the Graduate Manager's Office. The Captain of the College Police will determine the number of officers that must be assigned to each such event held on University property.

The Captain of Police is responsible to the administration to insure adequate police coverage of

University properties and facilities, and therefore he is solely responsible in determining the number of officers needed for each such occasion.

### Off-Campus Activities

When student groups have scheduled an off-campus event and the need for police protection is desired by the group, they may request the assistance of off-duty campus police. Such requests should be submitted to the Graduate Manager, who in turn will confirm such need to the Captain of Police. Determination as to the number of officers required for such events will rest entirely with the organization sponsoring the event.

## REGISTRAR GIVES TRANSFER TESTS

All students who will have completed 55 to 70 units by the end of the spring semester must report to the Riviera Auditorium at 8:30 am on Saturday, May 19, to take the College Transfer Tests, according to Dr. L. F. Walton, registrar.

These tests are a part of a national testing program sponsored by the College Entrance Examination Board to assist in the guidance and placement of junior and senior college students.

The tests will be administered by Dr. Walton. Postcards have been mailed to students who are required to take the tests, and lists have been posted in the Administration Building, at the student mail boxes, and on the Mesa Campus. A prospectus describing the nature and purpose of the tests and presenting sample questions is available at the Registrar's Office.

These tests are not to be confused with the Selective Service College Qualification Test, nor with the subject proficiency tests re-

quired of students planning to teach.
