# Phelps Attends U.C. Meeting

Many new developments are taking place today in Berkeley, regarding the proposed change in the Santa Barbara College system. President Phelps is in Berkeley attending the three meetings from Friday until Sunday. The first two of the three meetings will discuss the relationship of Santa Barbara to the junior colleges of the state. The third, on Sunday, will determine how the education of teachers will be handled. A tentative plan is to have two schools of education and one teachers college, but this has not been decdied on as yet.

In the past few weeks, two additional steps have been taken in the proposed changeover. One is the defining of all property rights owned by the College and the second is an inventory of all the College's equipment. This information must be in the hands of the U. of C. for their use when drawing up the new unit.

"This unification of colleges is a forward step of education initiated here in California. The announcement of the intentions of U. of C. has evoked interest in many colleges and universities throughout the nation. If successfully completed, this radical change will become a new and important precedent in educational fields," stated President Phelps.

## Yearbook Plans Are Discussed

Under the leadership of George Bradvica, plans are being developed to publish an annual this semester.

A special meeting of the Press Control Board was held Sunday to discuss the proposed yearbook. Bradvica explained that a 48-page book with a lightweight cover has been planned. Offset printing will be used

The tentative layout includes 20 pages for sororities, clubs and organiations, eight for seniors, and the remaining 20 pages for various college activities and events.

The proposed yearbook was approved by the Press Board as well as the Pre-audit and Finance Committees. The Student Council discussed the plans at a meeting last night, but the El Gaucho had gone to press before their decision was announced.
