Acting Dean of Men Resigns To Resume Teaching, Research

Dr. William Hayes, Acting Dean of Men, has resigned the deanship as of June 30, the close of this college year according to the Santa Barbara News-Press. His successor has not been appointed.

In a statement to *El Gauchito* Dean Hayes revealed that he has decided to return to teaching, research work and writing in the field of education. "Prior to assuming the deanship I was an Assistant Professor of Education. I asked Dr. Sproul to return me to this position, which he has very graciously done," stated the Dean.

Appointed in 1948

Dr. Hayes became dean in 1948 when he returned from serving the US Government in Korea as a consultant on education to the Department of the Army. He has worked to develop an atmosphere of personal relations between the men and the college by discussion of problems with each man in the student body. He wrote and published a simple and direct booklet on "Some Tipe for Scholastic Success in Santa Barbara College."

Rutgers Graduate

Dr. Hayes did undergraduate work at Rutgers University. He taught in eastern schools and was for several years a school administrator in New Jersey. He received his Master of Arts Degree at Columbia University and his Master of Education from Ouke University. After war service he returned to Columbia for his doctorate. He also earned a professional diploma in the field of School Administration.

In addition to his duties as Dean of Men he has remained active in the Education Department, teaching several courses. He also acted as sponsor of Interfraternity Council.

Tragic Production 'Beyond the Horizon' Hits Riviera Boards

The stirring O'Neill tragedy, *Beyond the Horizon*, Pulitzer Prize winner, goes into production May 26 for a two night run on the Riviera Auditorium stage.

"Beyond the Horizon" is the story of two brothers, Andrew and Robert, who are both in love with the same girl, Ruth. Andrew is a natural farmer and Robert a natural poet. When Ruth becomes infatuated with the poetry of Robert and marries him, Andrew leaves the farm and goes to sea. Even though she has had a child by Robert, Ruth soon finds that she no longer loves Robert but that she loves Andrew. Her love is frustrated, however when Andrew returns from his voyage and tells her that he has lost his love for her.

The future seems bleak for Ruth when the play closes, for her husband Robert is on his death bed and she has no place to turn.

The students playing the lead parts are Tom Keen as Robert, Gordon Stafford as Andrew, and Ellie Denholm as Ruth.

Director of the production is Ted Shank. Curtain time will be 8:15. Tickets will soon be available, or can be obtained at the ticket booth before the production.

DR. CLARENCE A. DYKSTRA 1883 - 1950

With the untimely passing of Dr. Clarence A. Dykstra, provost of the University of California at Los Angeles, the world lost a distinguished scholar, educator and public servant.

During his long and rewarding career, Dr. Dykstra became a prominent figure in American education and national affairs. He won nation-wide prominence as city manager of Cincinnati, Ohio, President of the University of Wisconsin, Director of Selective Service and Chairman of the National Mediation Board.

In the years that he was provost of UCLA, he became respected and beloved by all those who worked with him. To students particularly, he was a genial and trusted friend.

It was a little over a month ago that Dr. Dykstra spoke to us here at Santa Barbara College in observance of Charter Day, the anniversary of the founding of the University of California which he served so well. In the address, he made a plea for "loyalty to the idea of the University."

It is this "idea of the University," a great public institution dedicated to the advancement of human knowledge and betterment of mankind, which has brought so many fine scholars into the service of the University.

The University of California which Clarence A. Dykstra served so faithfully must mourn the loss of a great man, but may take inspiration from his example of loyalty and service to an idea.

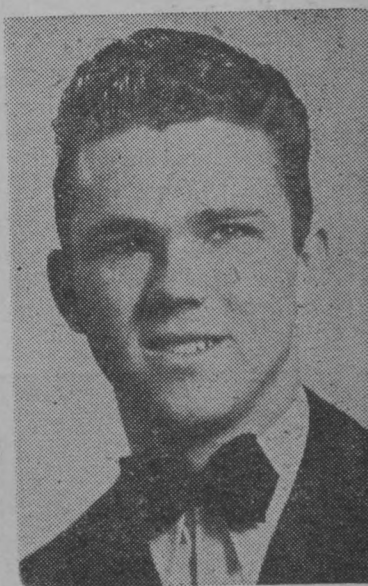

SBC Trackmen Win CCAA Third Place

Santa Barbara college track men came back from a poor dual meet showing to grab off third place in the 2C2A track meet. The Saturday meet at Cal Poly found individual Gauchos stars in top form.

San Jose, competing for the last time in 2C2A competition, won their fourth straight championship. San Diego nosed out the Gauchos for second place.

The Spartans took 59 14-15 points for their first place. San Diego's 25 1-30 points nosed out Santa Barbara with 23 1-2. Cal Poly received 21 1-5 for fourth.

Fresno and Pepperdine trailed with 20 1-3 and 15 points respectively.

Willie Dancer came through with a new meet record of 6'4" in the high jump. The eight year old record was also broken by Mel Martin of San Jose who shared Dancer's win.

Throwing 2 feet further than his nearest competitor, Del Pickarts took the javelin throw. The 215'7" mark was good enough to break the track record of 190'7". Dick Johnson was the only Gau-

cho to take more than two of the Gauchos eight places. The Santa Barbara sprinter won the 100 yard dash with a 9.9 effort and then Johnson came back to get a third in the 220. Davis of San Jose won the event with a fast 21.6.

Otey Scruggs placed second in the quarter mile, Spartan Moore ran the grueling race in 49.2 to break another track record. The smooth striding Moore had too much for the Gaucho 440 man, although Otey left the field in the home stretch with his usual tremendous kick.

Ted Vick received a tie for fourth in the 220 yard low hurdles. Brick Reed added to the Santa Barbara scoring with a four place in the discus. Reed threw the disc 125'7" for the place.

Don Crie came through with his best effort of the year to round out the Gaucho scoring. Crie won a second place in the mile as he defeated several men who had beaten him earlier in the year. The unofficial time on Crie was 4:29.9 for his first time under 4:40 this year.

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Gauchos Lead 2C2A Baseball As Johnston Pitches Two Wins

Lefty Bob Johnston cast himself in a hero's role on Saturday as he won both games of a double header from the San Diego State Aztecs to put the Gauchos in first place in the Southern division of the 2C2A conference.

Johnston's very rare feat gave the Gauchos a 4-2 record in the conference. The opening contest saw Johnston allow only two hits as he scored a 1-0 shut-out, and his fine relief pitching gave the Gauchos a 4-3 win in the nightcap.

The outcome of the first game was decided on the first pitch of the third inning as center fielder Alan Cox tagged Aztec pitcher Dick Barnes' first offering for home run over the right field score board. This was the games only run, though the Gauchos had several toher scoring opportunities, but were unable to hit in the clutch as they left 11 men stranded on the basepaths.

The Gauchos will strive to maintain their first place position tomorrow afternoon when they meet the Pepperdine Waves in a double-header at Laguna Park starting at

1:30 pm. The Waves are now in second place in the conference.

Johnston retired the first 12 men to face him and was never in serious trouble as he allowed only four San Diego batters to get on base. Al Fodor, Aztec shortstop, was the first man to reach first base and he got their by reason of an error by Gaucho shortstop Bill aDvis. Johnston then got rid of the next two men to face him, but gave up one of his two allowed singles to eGeorge Haley to put men on first and second. The threat was ended however as the next man flied out to end the inning.

Thad Pickett, another left hander, took the mound for the Gauchos in the seven inning nightcap, as Coach Theo (Spud) Harder hoped that the left handed pitching would continue to baffle the Aztec batters, but Pickett ran into control trouble and walked the first three batters to face him. Paddy Hill was hen sent in to relieve Pickett. Hill forced Fodor to hit into a double play but a run scored on the play. Hill then walked another Aztec batter and another run scored on a double steal.

The Gauchos then came back in the bottom of the first to tie it up on a walk to Bud Gmur, a single by Jack Huntsinger and a base cleaning triple by Bill Davis. The Gauchos then moved into a brief lead in the fourth inning on a triple by Tom Dailey who scored on an error.

The Aztecs got a rally going in the top of the fifth and tied up the score. Hill then lost his control and once again Bob Johnston took the mound and shut out the Aztecs in the remaining innings.

Santa Barbara scored the winning run when Huntsinger and Davis singled and Alan Cox who came in to bat for Gil Rayburn, hit a slow roller toward second base which he beat out for a hit and Huntsinger scored on a wild throw to first.

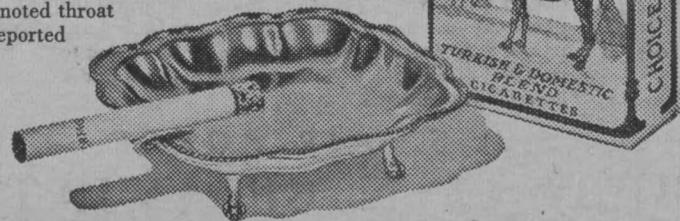
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STUDIO, COLLEGE ARTISTS PLAY COMPOSITIONS BY SB STUDENTS

Officers for the past year besides Schafer have included Ken Trevey, Don Mills, Helen Heitfeld, Ken Terry, and Marie Cornthwaite.

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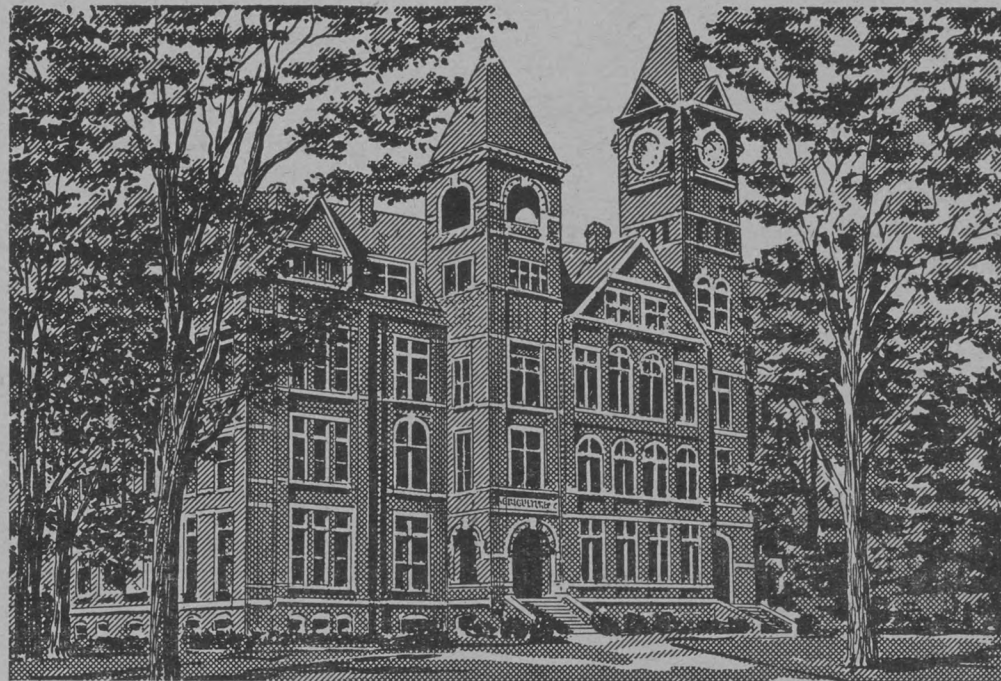
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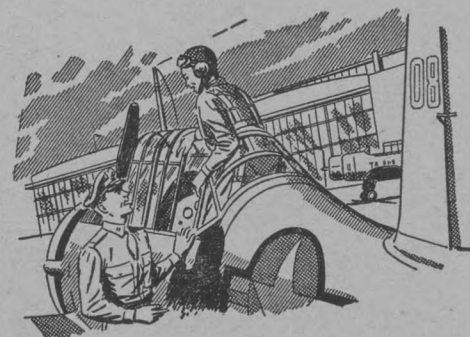
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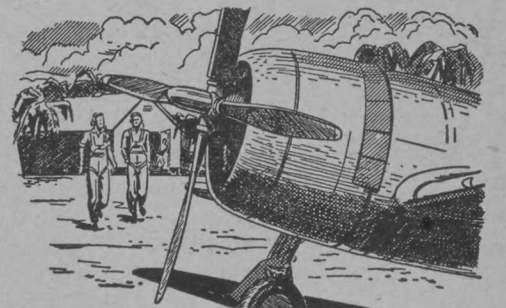
Major Nathan Adams, Auburn '40 Personnel Manager, U.S. Air Force



A top scholar and ROTC Honor Graduate, Cadet Lt. Col. Nathan Adams enjoyed his final military ball in 1940, soon left for Fort Sill's Field Artillery School.



Following a three month course, Lt. Adams decided the Air Force was the place for him. He applied for pilot training, was accepted, proceeded to Maxwell Field.



He won his wings and reported to the 36th Fighter Group in Puerto Rico. The group soon returned to the States, giving Adams a chance to marry his college sweetheart.



Within months Adams was overseas, flying "rhubarbs" (missions against enemy transport). He flew 63 P-47 missions within seven months, returned to the States late in 1944 for rest and recuperation.
