"Oh no!," you say, "not still more obligatory seasonal, election bashing." But hey, it was necessary. And besides, we couldn't think of any other themes for this issue.

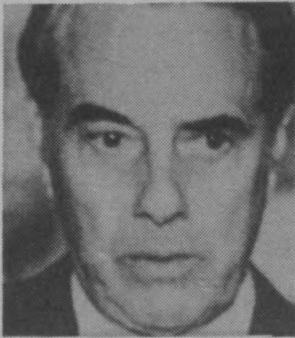
