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Gauchos Go Down Fighting in OT

UCSB Falls 72-70 at LBSU in Brawl-Marred Contest

LONG BEACH — From the outset, it was hot in Long Beach State's tiny, cramped University Gymnasium. But as the temperature rose, so too did the tempers. And when the dust had settled from two ugly second-half brawls, much had been lost — composure of the players, control of the fans, and, for the UCSB men's basketball team, the game.

A bench-clearing brawl midway through the second half and a fight shortly thereafter that spilled from the stands into the Gauchos bench during a timeout marred a tight Big West battle between the Gauchos and 49ers. The disruption seemed to take an emotional toll on UCSB, which failed to hold a seven-point lead in regulation before falling in overtime to LBSU, 72-70, before a standing-room-only crowd of 1,983.

LBSU Head Coach Seth Greenberg seemed torn afterwards, hardly able to enjoy his team's decidedly ugly win. "I apologize. I apologize to (UCSB Head Coach) Jerry (Pimm). I



apologize to the people of Santa Barbara. And as badly as I wanted to win that game, I didn't want something like that to happen. The incident honestly just gives me a very shallow feeling. It's a very shallow win for me."

With the Gauchos holding a 44-41 lead, LBSU's Jeff Rogers accidentally hit UCSB's Kason Jackson in

Under Those Conditions, Game Should Have Been Postponed

... to ensure that the game progresses smoothly within the rules ...

That is supposedly a guide that an official in any sport should use when officiating a game. If at any time it appears that a contest can not progress smoothly and fairly, then the official must do whatever it takes to make sure that the actual game remains the players' only concern — the athletes' safety must be secure and one team should not be put at an unfair disadvantage.

One team was put at an unfair disadvantage Saturday night at Long Beach's University Gymnasium, and that was the UCSB men's basketball team, who lost an 72-70 overtime decision to Long Beach State.

However, the game should never have seen overtime. In fact, the game should never have seen the final 11:27.

The game should have been postponed. It doesn't seem possible that UCSB had a fair, equal shot at winning Saturday's game after the brutal fight that occurred between the two teams and the confrontation that Gauchos guard Idris Jones found himself in with the fans a few minutes later.

The safety of Santa Barbara's players was in jeopardy, and University Gymnasium had become a time bomb waiting to explode. The fact that UCSB played so competitively the rest of the way is indeed surprising as well as commendable and should be considered a victory in

itself for the Gauchos.

It actually appeared that things were controlled enough for the game to continue after the 20-minute delay that followed the brawl when the officials reviewed the instant replay in order to dish out the ejections. But when fans begin to get unruly in such a way that involves players, safety becomes a concern. In that case the game should have been postponed and resumed at a later date so that emotions could settle down and a fair contest could have been played in satisfactory conditions.

There is a problem with the less than desirable geography of University Gym. It is an ex-

Sluggers' Bats Explode in Victories Over APU



The UCSB baseball team's starting pitching continued to hold its own this weekend against Azusa Pacific, but the real test for the Gauchos hurlers begins now.

Junior right-hander Armando Delsi threw seven strong innings Friday afternoon en route to a 9-7 Santa Barbara victory, while ace right-hander Travis Rodgers battled his way to a complete-game victory Saturday in an 8-4 UCSB triumph. The Gauchos' season mark now stands at 13-4 while APU, a NAIA school, is now 7-5.

But despite the two victories, UCSB Head Coach Al Ferrer remains concerned. The Gauchos' bullpen allowed five runs in the final two innings on Friday while Rodgers may have simply been fortunate to have had Azusa Pacific as his opponent on a day when he might not have had his best stuff. UCSB has a tough week ahead as it faces Cal State

Ladies Win 103-94, Inch Closer to Title

When the UCSB women's basketball team was preparing to face New Mexico State in January, Head Coach Mark French predicted a high-scoring affair between the two fast break-oriented squads.

"It would not surprise me at all if one of these teams scored over a hundred points," French said before the game. However, the Lady Gauchos that night came out on the winning end of a defensive struggle, with both squads scoring in the low 70s.

This weekend's rematch was no such defensive struggle, as UCSB outgunned the Roadrunners in a 103-94 scorefest Saturday night at Las Cruces.

With the win, first-place UCSB (20-4 overall, 13-2 conference) reaches the 20-win mark for the first time since joining Division I in 1982. The loss drops New Mexico

Beating UCLA

SB Spikers Silence the Critics in Upset Win

After waiting all season to prove that it is legitimate, the UCSB men's volleyball team silenced the critics last Saturday by upsetting #4 UCLA, 15-12, 12-15, 15-9, 15-10.

While the Gauchos have come close to defeating some of the top teams in the nation, including a narrow five-game loss to #1 Long Beach State earlier in the season, the big victories have just slipped out of their grasp.

But all of that changed Saturday night, when nearly 900 UCSB fans packed Rob Gym to watch the Gauchos take sweet revenge on the Bruins, after suffering a convincing loss only three days earlier at UCLA.

"It's just one that we really needed," UCSB Head Coach Ken Preston said about the win. "For our confidence, for our team, for our program — we just needed a 'W.'"

Santa Barbara started the match like it did last Wednesday, with phenomenal play in the first game. Totalling 30 team kills at an impressive .480 hitting percentage, the Gauchos outplayed the Bruins to take the game, 15-12.

But after dropping a close second game, 12-15, Santa Barbara refused to tighten up like it did in their previous meeting with UCLA.

"There was a lot of tension on the court in our last match against them," UCSB hitter Stace Lougeay explained. "We wanted to win so bad we became perfectionists, and if something bad happened, everyone was yelling at each other. But up here we said that we

Lady Netters Roll Over Fullerton, 9-0

Approximately 100 fans came to UCSB's West Courts Friday to watch what could be called the "Smash of the Titans." It was the UCSB women's tennis team's first home match of the season, as it treated onlookers to a 9-0 rout over Cal State Fullerton.

The Gauchos (3-6 overall, 2-0 in conference play) went into their second Big West match after 11 consecutive road matches before Friday's victory over the Titans (0-6, 0-3). The Gauchos, who will host Long Beach State today at 2 p.m., impressively won each match by straight sets.


Singles were dominated by Santa Barbara as #1 seed Debbie Goldberger defeated Fullerton's Roseann Alva (to whom Goldberger had lost as a sophomore), 7-5, 6-3. Goldberger was broken

early in the first set and was down 4-1, but she quickly gained confidence and adapted to Alva's fast pace that had given her trouble.

"I knew it was going to be a tough match and I was a little nervous. I was late on everything at first because she hits so hard," Goldberger said. "These teams are always good on top."

UCSB's #2 seed Laura Rutledge made quick work of Fullerton's Natalie Hastings, 6-1, 6-0. Her teammate Lynn Coakley had equal success over the Titan's Wendy Seltzer, 6-1, 6-0. In the #4 seed, Gaucho Kathy Peterson beat Mami Matsumoto of Fullerton, 6-3, 6-2. UCSB's Courtney Strauss defeated the Titan's Danelle Chheng, 6-2, 6-2, while UCSB's #6 seed Susie Drage only lost two games in downing Robin Szidak of Fullerton, 6-1, 6-1.

Doubles play was also dominated by UCSB, as

the Gauchos won 36 games to the Titans' five. Goldberger had another win over her singles opponent as she and Peterson enjoyed a 6-1, 6-2 victory over CSUF's Alva and Hastings. The #2 doubles team for UCSB, Rutledge and Coakley, was in total

control as the pair swept Szidak and Seltzer, 6-0, 6-0. Santa Barbara's #3 doubles team, Drage and Strauss, rounded out the domination by defeating Fullerton's Chheng and Matsumoto, 6-1, 6-1.

"Winning all our

matches in straight sets is indicative of the level and standard we set at #4 UCLA," UCSB Head Coach Chris Russell said. "We played commanding tennis and our opponents were reacting to us. The girls are starting to see the picture."

Road not Kind to Netters After 'Heartbreaking' 5-4 Loss

The UCSB men's tennis team discovered firsthand just how rough four conference matches in one week can be.

After travelling over 1,600 miles to three road matches, punctuated by a home match at the UCSB East Courts, the Gauchos (3-4, 3-1) came away with three straight victories, but failed in their attempt to make it four in a row as they fell, 5-4, in a heartbreaker at UNLV Saturday. A win would have improved the Gauchos' Big West Conference record to 4-0 and put them in good position going into a series of tough matches later this week.

UCSB Head Coach Don Lowry cited the ele-

vation, a faster playing surface, general fatigue and a little bad luck as reasons for the team's week-ending loss at Las Vegas.

"We played real tough, hard until the end," Lowry said. "It was one of those matches where if a couple of the breaks had gone our way we could have come away with the win. We were tired, and they had the local crowd behind them and were accustomed to playing at the higher elevation."

Though such factors surely affected some of the Gauchos, one player who seemed immune was UCSB's #2 singles player, Laszlo Markovits. The sophomore continued to play as if on a mission, beating Erik Aanes 6-1, 6-1 in singles and, along with doubles partner David Decret, defeated Pat Boice and Michael Jevtic 7-6, 6-7, 7-6.

"Laszlo's been playing on another level of late," Lowry said. "He's really just destroying his opponents, and these are good players."

Markovits' good play has not been mirrored by UCSB #1 singles player, senior Decret. Decret lost his second match in a row in singles, 6-4, 6-1 to Pat Boice, after losing to Brandon Coupe of SJSU 6-2, 6-4 on Wednesday.

In other singles competition, UCSB's #3 Bill Pham won for the fourth time in a row, beating Michael Jevtic 7-5, 6-3, while Mark Ellison won 6-2, 5-7, 6-4. On the losing side for the Gauchos were sophomore Henrik Rosvall, who fell 6-4, 6-4, and junior Ilkyung Chey, who lost his first match since recovering from a foot injury, 6-4, 5-7, 7-6.

the face with his elbow, an encounter that was continued moments later when Jackson and Rogers pushed each other after Rogers' shot attempt. Some reports had Jackson throwing a punch at Rogers, but television replays were inconclusive. UCSB senior forward Lucius Davis pulled Jackson away from the shoving, and the teams were lining up for free throw attempts when Sonny Alvarado bolted from the bench and floored an unsuspecting Jackson with a sucker-punch to the side of the head.

Santa Barbara's Doug Muse then grabbed Alvarado and body-slammed him to the floor, touching off a bench-clearing brawl that spilled into the stands behind the 49er basket. Muse

was then held by a LBSU assistant coach and 49er guard Bobby Sears while Alvarado and 49er guard Rod Hannibal simultaneously hit him in the face. The group fell into the stands, injuring a young boy sitting in the front row.

Play was halted for 20 minutes while the officials consulted television replays, after which they ejected four players—Long Beach's Alvarado, Hannibal and Carlos Dew, and UCSB's Duane Carter, who had left the bench to join the melee. Santa Barbara was then given four free throws for the technical fouls, which Davis proceeded to convert to give the Gauchos a 48-41 lead. But it turned out to be UCSB's last stand.

LBSU's Byron Russell followed a breakaway layup

by Rogers with five points of his own to pull the 49ers to within 50-48 when, at the 11:27 mark, a second fight interrupted play. As the Gauchos sat for a timeout, a fight in the stands spilled into the UCSB huddle. Pimm was noticeably upset after the loss, which drops UCSB to 18-7 overall, 11-5 in the Big West.

"It wasn't a good play by (Alvarado)," Pimm said. "It wasn't very smart. But kids are kids—they're going to do stupid things sometimes and, well, that was sure a stupid play."

"We as coaches need to control our own bench. I didn't do it either. Duane doesn't belong on the floor—he belongs on the bench," he added.

The Gauchos were never the same after, as LBSU's

Lucious Harris, who led the 49ers with 24 points, rebounded Russell's missed free throw and scored to give the 49ers a 52-50 lead. Davis scored six of his game-high 29 points in regulation's final 7:27, as the teams traded buckets down the stretch. A three-pointer by Idris Jones gave the Gauchos a 64-61 lead with just 1:10 left, but 49er Chris Tower got free for a three-pointer of his own with 0:52 remaining to tie the game. Neither team could convert scoring opportunities, and the game went into OT.

"I don't think we played very smart tonight," Pimm said. "We lost our poise at times, we lost our rhythm—we didn't execute our offense well. We didn't execute our plays well enough at the end there, not at all."

Pimm referred to Kelly's rushed three-point attempt out of a timeout with 1:26 left in the extra period and LBSU up, 70-68. Sam Robson had already fouled out, and Muse and Davis followed in the next 1:04. A Ray Kelly drive cut the lead to 71-70, but, after Rogers converted one of two free throws after Davis' foul for the final 72-70 margin, Kelly rushed a desperation 35-footer as time expired.

Jones had 16 points for the Gauchos, while Kelly had 14 points and four assists, but 38-percent second-half shooting (after shooting 56 percent in the first) contributed heavily to the loss. Russell had 14 points and 10 rebounds for the 49ers, who now improve to 16-9 and 10-6, good for third place in the Big West.

tremely small facility that holds around 2,000 fans, all of which are seated close together and crammed very close to the court. When confrontations begin to develop in the crowd, the place has the potential to set off a chain reaction of increased tempers. That chain reaction made its way all the way down to the Gaucho

bench Saturday night. At that point it seemed the averse conditions had escalated to a threshold point that couldn't tolerate the continuation of the game. The brutality of the brawl, combined with the riotous atmosphere that ensued, resulted in a concern for the safety of UCSB's players. That, in turn, dictated that the Gauchos did not have an equal and fair shot of winning the basket-

ball game. What makes the whole incident so unfortunate is that things had seemed to calm down after the initial confrontation between UCSB's Kason Jackson and the 49ers' Jeff Rogers. The two players had been separated and it appeared all was in hand when Long Beach's Sonny Alvarado came out of nowhere from the 49ers' bench to hit Jackson in the back of the head with a

punch that Jackson never saw. Gaucho center Doug Muse retaliated by throwing Alvarado to the ground, and after a few moments of pushing and shoving by several players, Muse eventually became the victim of an inhumane act that saw LBSU's Rod Hannibal hit Muse in the face while Alvarado held Muse back. A young child was injured in the melee, which just en-

hanced the negative nature of the atmosphere that eventually reached a point unsatisfactory for play. This is not a criticism of the officials' inability to prevent the fight. Nor is it a complaint about the officials' role in the incident between the fans and Jones. This is a criticism regarding the decision to continue the contest after emotions on the floor and in the crowd had reached a dangerous

point. The less-than-ideal conditions had jeopardized the prospects for having a smooth, fair game. It's not the point that the game resumed without another incident. The previous incidents had already taken their toll on the outcome of the contest.

Continued from p.1A Northridge this Tuesday and then opens up its Big West season this Friday at home in a three-game series with Fresno State.

"I'm real concerned about where we are right now," Ferrer said. "We've really got to pick it up if we want to be competitive in Big West play. I don't think we're prepared (for conference) — we're going to have to work very hard to get there."

The Gauchos didn't waste too much time Friday providing run support for Delsi (4-0). Leadoff man Doug Smaldino began the first inning with a walk and third baseman Rich Haar followed that with his third home run of the season to give UCSB an early 2-0 lead. Santa Barbara added another run in the inning on a double by shortstop Danny Lane, who advanced home on a pair of groundouts.

UCSB added another run in the second on a solo homer by freshman Mike Wolger, who was making just his fourth plate appearance of the year. The Gauchos scored two more in the third, one in the sixth and another pair in the seventh on a two-run homer by first baseman Jeff Antoon, his third in two games.

Santa Barbara appeared to be on its way to an easy win, but the Cougars made things interesting in the eighth. Freshman left-hander Ryan O'Coynne relieved Delsi to begin the in-

ning and after striking out designated hitter Travis Crowell, allowed a solo home run to left fielder David Richards and then two walks, a single and a hit batsman that forced in another run. Ferrer then summoned senior right-hander Greg Connolly onto the scene who allowed two more of O'Coynne's runs to score before getting out of the inning. Connolly allowed one run in the ninth

before preserving the win. Saturday, Rodgers dealt with runners on base for most of the afternoon and when he allowed two runs in the top of the sixth on a double by Azusa third baseman Pedro Carranza, a dropped third strike and a single by shortstop Sergio Flores, the Cougars had a 2-0 lead.

But Santa Barbara struck right back in the bottom of the sixth, exploding for se-

ven runs, with the big blow coming from usual starting designated hitter Chris Johnson, who had a pinch-hit bases-clearing triple to break a 2-2 tie.

The victory was the front end of a two-game road trip for UCSB, with the finale coming tonight in Las Vegas against second-place UNLV. With a win tonight, the Lady Gauchos would wrap up their first-ever Big West title and secure the top seed in this month's conference tournament.

Saturday's game was a shootout from the opening tip, with the Lady Gauchos commanding a 60-43 lead at halftime. However, the Roadrunners, among the top scoring teams in the nation, came back to tie the score at 82-82 with five minutes remaining.

"It was a real up-and-down-the-court kind of game," French said of Saturday's victory. "For people who like fast-break basketball, it was their kind of game."

Five Lady Gauchos played with four fouls apiece for much of the second half, but none fouled out as UCSB pulled ahead in the game's final minutes. Lisa Crosskey, playing despite a leg injury, hit a late three-pointer to seal the victory and add to her team-high 25 points. Barbara Beainy scored 22 for the Lady Gauchos, with Becky Brown and Erika Kienast each adding 17 points. Kienast also set a UCSB record by pulling down 18 rebounds on the evening, and Cori Close dished out 11 assists.

Winners of 18 of their last 20 games, the Lady Gauchos need only one win in their three remaining conference games to take the Big West regular season title. Second-place UNLV carries a 13-4 conference mark into tonight's game, its last Big West game of the season.

UCSB and UNLV played earlier this season, as the Lady Gauchos soundly defeated the Lady Rebels 78-61 Feb. 1 at the UCSB Events Center. Despite the ease with which his team beat the reigning conference champs last month, French indicated that tomorrow night's rematch with UNLV will be a difficult one.

"We need to be ready for (Las) Vegas to be a whole lot better team than they were over at our place, because they certainly have talent," he said.

The Lady Gauchos slipped in the latest AP poll to 36th.



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
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
