

#### **Issues of Student Concern**

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS BOARD (CAB): To get the most out of your time here at UCSB you need to reach out in your specific areas of interest. If you are interested in getting in touch with the community then this is the board for you! CAB will provide you with possible career directions as you pursue your extracurricular activities. You will participate in various community outreach programs in your particular field of service interest. Come be a part of a strong public service tradition with CAB.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE COMMITTEE: If the university you wish to participate with in an exchange program does not currently correspond with UCSB through the Education Abroad Program IEC compensates.

ISLA VISTA COMMUNITY RELATIONS: Students are impacted by things that transpire in Santa Barbara County and Isla Vista. Funding for programs and services in I.V., along with parking, police relations and education on community issues are things addressed by this committee. Owing to the complex nature of life here in Isla Vista and UCSB there are an infinite number of areas this committee must look into.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN: This is actually a group of sub committees funded by UCSB undergrads for the purpose of keeping Leg Council updated on key issues concerning women. Affirmative Action, Violence Against Women, Rape Prevention and Education, Women's Health, Lesbian Issues and Cultural Awareness; some of the major issues to be addressed by this committee.

RECYCLING COMMITTEE: Constantly keeping students aware of the need for recycling, this committee's projects will address new ways to re use Isla Vista/campus clutter. Members of this committee will work with members of the community and outside organizations to keep recycling a major campus issue.

STUDENT COMMISSION ON RACIAL EQUAL-ITY: (SCORE) is funded by UCSB undergrads to provide students from diverse ethnic backgrounds with the resources they need to feel comfortable at UCSB. This group also involves themselves with the implementation and support of related rules and regulations. By networking with outside organizations and other campus groups SCORE attempts to deal with the pervasive problem of racism and other related issues.

STUDENT LOBBY: This group helps students to confront political and social interest issues in a variety of forms. In opposition to the military build up in Saudi Arabia during the Persian Gulf conflict the Lobby helped in the funding and organization of rallies and a teach-in. Student participation helped to make a crucial stand in the face of world politics.

UC ACTION NETWORK LOBBY: UCAN organizes campus and outside women's groups in the hopes of raising participation and awareness levels among women. One of the most important aspects of this group is the lobbying impact it propels. Whether on campus or in state legislature UCAN makes its voice heard. In the capacity of liaison to the "Women Students' Project" desk in the UC Student Association office in Sacramento, UCAN keeps up with all current UC women's issues.

## The Money

FINANCE BOARD: All student organizations wishing to transfer funds from one account to another or have travel requests approved must go to the Finance Board with their case. In addition to issuing funds designated for specific things, Finance Board must also distribute unallocated funds with Legislative Council approval. Any group who wants some of these funds to be distributed their way must attend a weekly Finance Board meeting and present a proposal.

A.S. INVESTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE: ASIAC is an advisory body which serves the Legislative Council and the A.S. with financial information for the purpose of investing A.S. funds. The Legislative Council will have the final say on all investments.

A.S. UNDERWRITE BOARD: This board is comprised of people who want to see campus groups thrive financially and are willing to help. In order to assist groups with their fund raising efforts Underwrite gives interest free loans based on specific criteria. All groups serviced by this board get a chance to hold their event with an interest free loan and thereby have a shot at making a profit.

CONTROLLER: This officer provides financial advise to the Legislative Council for their accounts and capital expenditures. In addition to that the Controller also advises boards and committees on making their budgets and keeping their overhead down.

#### **Academics**

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS BOARD; To insure the continued improvement of undergrad educational opportunities, this board keeps students in touch with issues. Maintaining communications between faculty, students and administration is a key concern of Academic Affairs.

FACULTY AND COURSE EVALUATION SURVEY: FACES helps students to choose the courses and instructors that will best aid them in their studies at UCSB. General education courses are evaluated and the evaluations are published for student information. Coordinators, editors and runners are paid on this board!


#### **Student Disputes**

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING COMMITTEE: Collective bargaining is always a complex issue. Here at UCSB the CBC makes the process a little easier. In the areas of law and communication involved in collective bargaining the CBC acts as an overseer. If a student has a conflict with the faculty or administration of UCSB or the UC system as a whole, the CBC will represent them and provide mediation.

STUDENT ADVOCATE: This officer provides students who have conflicts with crucial University policy information as well as acting as a CBC advisor.

#### A.S. Law

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS: This committee makes recommendations on matters having to do with the A.S. Legal Code. Committee members become well versed in the complexities of the code and learn how to apply it to legislative decisions.

JUDICIAL COUNCIL: Functioning much as the Supreme Court functions as the judicial branch for the country, Judicial Council in A.S. resolves Constitutional conflicts. As outlined in Article V of the A.S. Constitution the Council makes decisions on cases between two parties in which a conflict of Constitution or By-Law has arisen. After a closed session the Council will resolve the matter with a final judgement.

ATTORNEY GENERAL: The person occupying this position must act as an investigator and prosecutor in cases brought before the Judicial Council. This officer must have a working knowledge of the A.S. Constitution and By-Laws in order to fulfill both the role of prosecutor and advisor to those bringing cases before the Council as individuals.

#### Communication

LA CUMBRE EXCELLENCE COMMITTEE: This committee helps to improve the quality of the UCSB yearbook. By keeping informed on the progress of other collegiate yearbooks and providing the yearbook staff with this information this committee dedicates itself to improvement. La Cumbre Excellence also keeps informed of national agencies in the print media forum and lets the yearbook staff here know what advances their making.

PRESS COUNCIL: Student funded papers at UCSB rely on the Press Council to oversee all editorial functions, approve and amend budgets, and choose editorsin-chief. Although Press Council is the publisher of student funded papers it does not seek to control the content of the publications. By acting to preserve the first amendment rights of the press this council creates a balance of power in UCSB media.

RADIO COUNCIL: As the governing board of KCSB this council is a policy setter. Goals of the station, codes of conduct and budget issues are some of the many areas this council has an opportunity to address.



#### **Areas of Campus Interest**

BUSINESS SERVICES: A.S. Business Services is formation network which attempts to keep all undergrad comprised of many different businesses already with more to come in the future. A.S. Bike Shop, A.S. Cashiers, A.S. Publications, A.S. Word Processing, A.S. Notetaking and Legal Services are the major businesses. This committee makes certain that all businesses comply with contracts and established policies. Within this committee there is a subcommittee who creates, reviews and puts into action business related proposals.

CAMPUS DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE: By providing a Student Impact Report at the end of each quarter this committee informs students about campus development. Part of this information will involve addressing issues that affect the quality of graduate and undergrad life at UCSB.

COMMUNICATIONS BOARD: This board is an in-

**ELECTIONS COMMITTEE:** With its weekly meetings during the spring quarter the seven members and one chair organize the big general A.S. election and any other elections that fall under the category of being special. This committee helps to keep the students in touch with the candidates and their positions on the issues.

PROGRAM BOARD: All students interested in being a part of this board are encouraged to visit the Program Board office on the third floor of the UCen. Find out more about the diverse entertainment this board provides the students and community with each year. If you want to gain experience in coordinating entertainment events and producing activities for the campus you may want to check them out.

The Campus Administrative Committees and Advisory Boards serve two functions (1) to respond to requests for advice and (2) to identify needs or concerns within the charge the

of the committee and to recommend action. These committees are *advisory* only, and do not have policy-making changes.

## **Administrative Advisory Committees**

ADMISSIONS: Recommends on admission policies, selection criteria, procedures and guidelines.

ARTS AND LECTURES: Works with Arts and Lectures on the development of Arts and Lectures programs.

BIOSAFETY: Assists the Environmental Health and Safety area in developing guidelines for safe use of biohazards.

CAMPUS ACTIVITIES CENTER ADVISORY: A forum for discussing and making recommendations about the services provided by the Campus Activities Center to aid the center in carrying out its responsibilities and its interactions with the campus community.

COMPUSWIDE ELECTIONS: Make recommendations on all issues related to campuswide elections. This includes, but is not limited to ballot wording, election timing, election operations, policies, practices and violations.

COMPREHENSIVE CHILDCARE ADVISORY: Studies childcare issues and develops recommendations for addressing the childcare needs of the campus community.

COUNSELING AND CAREER SERVICES: Provides advice on policies and programs pertaining to Counseling and Career Services.

DIVING CONTROL BOARD: Establishes and/or recommends training programs. Recommends changes in policy. Recommends or approves locations, new equipment or techniques.

EVENTS CENTER ADVISORY BOARD: A board which makes crucial decisions about student use of and rights to the Events Center.

FINANCIAL AND ADVISORY: Advises and recommends to the Director and staff of the Office of Financial Aid.

HUMAN SUBJECTS: Establishes and administers policy on the protection of human subjects.

INCOME AND RECHARGE: Reviews and makes recommendations on the rate structures and proposed changes to rates submitted by campus service units for goods and/or services.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS POLICY: Provides advice on policies and procedures (excluding eligibility) pertaining to intercollegiate athletics programs and club sports.

NATURAL RESERVE SYSTEM: Recommends to the Systemwide committee concerning potential reserve sites. Review the activities of the reserve advisory committees and assumes any other responsibilities which may fall within its purview.

OMBUDSMAN: Serves as an advisor to the Ombudsman Office.

PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION: Reviews plans, policies, operations, rates, and budgets for the UCSB transportation and parking program.

PHYSICAL PLANNING: Provides advice concerning the physical development and alteration of the campus.

**PROGRAM REVIEW:** participates in the periodic external site reviews of undergraduate and graduate academic programs and departments.

PUBLIC SAFETY: A forum to discuss, evaluate, and make recommendations to campus officials on public safety issues on campus, including bicycle safety.

RADIATION SAFETY: Reviews and recommends on safety policies and procedures, purchase of radioactive materials, resolution of potential safety problems.

RECREATION GOVERNANCE BOARD: Address policies governing the Rec Center's purpose and image, facilities, services, programs, activities, scheduling, access and establish user fees. Authority over operation and development of the Center with respect to matters involving policy and have authority for approval of Rec Cen budget.

SCHOOL AND COLLEGE OUTREACH AND VISITA-TION: Provides advice and recommendations to the Director of Admissions and the Director of Public Relations regarding the school and college visit plan.

STATUS OF WOMEN: Research and advises the Chancellor on issues relating to the status of women at UCSB and makes recommendations to the Chancellor concerning these issues.

STUDENT/FACULTY CONDUCT: Recommends disciplinary action in response to inappropriate student conduct in academics, and in all other areas, with exception of the Residence Halls. Also reviews readmission requests. Advises on organizational discipline and regulation interpretation.

STUDENT FEE ADVISORY: Advises on activities supported by income from student registration and education fee supported programs and recommends priority for funding.

STUDENT HEALTH: Define and make recommendations for the solution of college health problems, to allow students to examine, evaluate, and make specific recommendations regarding service on issues relevant to the operation of the Student Health Service.

UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE: Develops policies which affect all areas within the University Center including budget, long range planning, operations, programs, facilities, purpose, and image.

WOMEN'S CENTER: A forum for discussing and making recommendations about the services provided by the Women's Center to aid the center in carrying out its responsibilities and its interactions with the campus community.

The faculty participates in administration of the campus through the Academic Senate and its committees. Because of its inclusiveness and the power it yields (both by and

strong tradition), the Senate is regarded as highly influential determining the policies of the campus. Many Senate committees include students but as non-voting members.

### **Academic Senate Committees**

ACADEMIC FREEDOM: To study and report to the Faculty Legislature concerning any condition which may affect the academic freedom of the University, especially with regard to acceptance of university appointments, resignations from such appointments, and to the reputation of the university and individual members of its faculty.

ADMISSIONS AND ENROLLMENT: To consider and report to the Faculty Legislature and to the Chancellor on matters involving admissions, enrollment and redirection at Santa Barbara.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION: To study and report to the Faculty Legislature on all matters of affirmative action including (a) academic personnel and policies affecting women and ethnic minorities; (b) access of women and ethnic minorities to graduate and undergraduate programs in all academic areas, (c) seeking information and making recommendations regarding actions necessary to remove and correct inequities of opportunity.

AMERICAN HISTORY AND INSTITUTIONS: To formulate policies for the administration of the Senate Regulations regarding American History and Institutions, and to review the application of these policies by duly authorized officers and agencies

ATHLETIC POLICY: To determine eligibility for intercollegiate competition. To consider and report to the Legislature and the Chancellor on matters involving the intercollegiate athletic

CAPITAL PROJECTS: To establish, from within its membership, a Capital Planning Subcommittee whose responsibilities shall be to work directly with the administration and its professional planners in reviewing the academic impact of major capital projects and to delineate the criteria used in developing detailed plans for particular major capital projects. The committee shall also establish, from its membership, an Architecture, Physical Planning and Environment Subcommittee whose responsi-

bilities shall be to work directly with the administration in the selection of professional architects, planners and landscape architects; work with administration and planners in setting and reviewing campus planning goals and implementation; review specific planning and design proposals pertaining to campus landscape and architecture; consult with facilities management respecting maintenance and alterations of campus facilities, including landscaping.

COMPUTING, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS: To represent the division and its faculties on all matters affecting academic instruction and research policy involving the use of computers, information technology and telecommunications; and to advise the Chancellor and/or designees on all matters concerning computers, and information and telecommunications technology.

EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAM: This committee represents the Santa Barbara Division in all matters concerned with the Education Abroad Program.

EDUCATIONAL POLICY AND ACADEMIC PLANNING (CEPAP): To formulate and recommend on educational policy as its primary responsibility in all matters of Divisional concern. To establish, from within its membership, a Planning and Resources Subcommittee, whose responsibilities are: (a)to formulate recommendations to the Chancellor regarding the long range educational plan of the campus and the university, and (b) to formulate recommendations to the Chancellor regarding the university budget for the Santa Barbara campus.

EFFECTIVE TEACHING AND INSTRUCTIONAL SUP-PORT: To promote good teaching, to propose programs that will foster it, and to develop criteria for its evaluation. To formulate and recommend to the Chancellor general policies concerning instructional support activities of the Santa Barbara campus.

**EXTENDED LEARNING:** To advise the Chancellor on any matters concerning the functions and the educational and related

budgetary and personnel policies of University Extension and of Off Campus Studies. To report to the Faculty Legislature on matters affecting University extension and Off Campus Studies.

FACULTY WELFARE: This committee advises the Faculty Legislature on matters concerned with the economic welfare of the faculty such as salaries, benefits, insurance, retirement, housing, and other matters that affect this conditions of employment.

GENERAL EDUCATION: To study every aspect of the general education program at Santa Barbara, make comparisons with similar programs in other institutions, consider recommendations from members and committees of the Division, and in general seek to provide a common cultural experience for all students. To determine standards governing the general education requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and specify the means of satisfying these requirements, subject to ratification by the Faculty Legislature.

LIBRARY: To advise the Chancellor regarding the adequacy and growth of the Library at Santa Barbara.

STUDENT AFFAIRS: To meet regularly with the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and to consult with him on matters affecting the relationship between the administration of student affairs and the academic mission and goals of the University.

UNDERGRADUATE COURSES: To exercise plenary powers regarding the authorization, discontinuance, supervision, and final approval of undergraduate courses, including the power to determine the appropriateness of the assignment of an instructor to a specific course.

UNDERGRADUATE PREPARATORY AND REMEDIAL EDUCATION (CUPRE): To monitor and conduct periodic reviews of preparatory and remedial education and to supervise placement examinations.
