Owing to a lack of help, we this week issue our paper on a half sheet.

In all American communities the question of roads occupies the earliest attention of settlers, and becomes an important, as it is a vital, object of local self-government.

The peculiarly dry climate of California, while it furnishes facilities unparalleled for building substantial and lasting highways,

The trial of the case of John L. Durkee and Charles E. Rand, charged with piracy, was commenced in the U. S. Circuit Court at San Francisco, before Judges McAllister and Hoffman, on the 10th inst.

Oroville, Butte county, employs three watchmen, at \$100 per month each, which is raised by voluntary subscriptions of the citizens.

The Democratic State Convention met at Sacramento on the 9th inst. On the 10th, Messrs. C. L. Scott, of Tuolumne, and Joseph McKibbin, of Sierra, were nominated for Congress.

We have received the first number of a neatly printed paper entitled the "Alameda County Gazette," published at San Leandro, by Messrs. Rodgers & Hamilton.

Five hundred and ninety-seven passengers sailed in the Golden Age on the 5th inst., among which were thirty-eight ladies and nineteen children.

Lewis Mahoney, one of the men banished by the Vigilance Committee, but who returned, has been arrested for grand larceny in San Mateo county.

The sixth anniversary of the admission of California into the Union was celebrated in San Francisco in an appropriate manner.

The total shipment of treasure by the Golden Age on the 5th inst., amounted to \$2,835,608 63.

The Supreme Court has decided that the Governor has no power to remove Notary Publics.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRES. A telegraphic despatch to the San Francisco papers, dated Marysville, September 5th, says:

A fire broke out here about one o'clock this morning, and destroyed about forty buildings, mostly wooden tenements, occupied by Mexicans and Chinese.

The town of Colusi has been entirely destroyed by fire. It broke out at about half past two o'clock this morning in a stable.

The entire town is burned down, except the Colusi House, the American House, and two or three wooden tenements.

The American State Convention, which met at Sacramento, made the following nominations on the 3d and 4th inst.: For Members of Congress—B. C. Whitman, of Solano; A. B. Dibble, of Nevada.

The following is a list of the nominations made by the Republican Convention, which met at Sacramento: For Members of Congress—Ira P. Rankin, of San Francisco; Thomas Cox, of Plumas.

The San Francisco Herald says a fire broke out in the mountains back of San Antonio on the 5th inst., and extended to the town, but fortunately no houses were burnt.

The statistics of the San Francisco Mint for the month of August are as follows: Gross weight after melting, 122,141 ounces; value of the gold, \$2,241,758 51; value of silver contained in the gold, \$14,673 43; value of deposits, \$2,236,383 12; paid in gold coin, \$1,730,755 79; paid in gold bars, \$505,766 63.

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The publication of the True Californian has been discontinued.

Later from the Atlantic States. By the arrival of the Sierra Nevada at San Francisco, on the 5th inst., we have dates from New York to the 9th of August, and from Nicaragua to the 16th.

Since the departure of the Illinois on the 5th, we have had election returns from the States of Kentucky, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas and North Carolina. The first-named State has rather unexpectedly gone for Democracy.

The State election in Alabama took place on the 7th. We have no reliable returns as yet, but there is but little doubt that it has gone for the Democracy.

The Pennsylvania Know Nothing State Convention met on Tuesday, and refused a proposition for a fusion with the Republicans.

A call of inquiry has been made on the President by Congress, as to the instructions under which Colonel Sumner acted when he dispersed the Kansas Free-State Legislature at Topeka.

A bill has passed both Houses providing for running the boundary line between Washington Territory and the British north-western territory; and also one providing for a Wagon Road to the Pacific.

On Wednesday the President sent to the Senate his reply to the resolution calling for information relative to affairs in San Francisco. He says the Governor of California had called on him for the loan of three thousand muskets and other munitions of war, promising that they should be paid for or returned.

Our latest advices from Mexico indicate a collision on the northern borders between Vidaurri and Comonfort. The former refuses to obey the orders of the President, who had commanded him to deliver up the government of the Northern Department to Señor Rodriguez.

The Asia brought us European advices to the 26th July. The news is of but little importance, saying that relating to the revolution in Spain. At last accounts the insurgents still held out in Saragossa, but at nearly all other points tranquility had been restored.

On the 3d of August Don Mariano Salazar was shot in the Plaza at Granada for treason. The Revolutionists in Leon had seized Dr. Livingston, an American citizen, and Consul of the United States, as a hostage for the safety of Salazar.

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From the following decree it will be seen that General Walker proposes to raise a loan of \$2,000,000 on the credit of the State for the carrying on of the Government:

Art. 1. There shall be a loan of two millions of dollars negotiated upon the public credit of the Government of this Republic, and the security of a certain tract of land in the Department of Matagalpa, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter described.

Art. 2. The said loan of two millions of dollars shall be represented by the bonds of this Government, signed by the President of the Republic, the Minister of Hacienda and Public Credit, and the Treasurer General. They shall bear date at Granada, October first, the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and shall have twenty years to run, from January first, the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

Art. 3. The interest on the said loan shall be paid semi-annually, on the 1st of July and the 1st of January, by way of El Paso to San Diego, in California. A committee was appointed to draft resolutions and make a report. The following is a portion of the report, in which the advantages of the route are spoken of:

"That they are deeply sensible of the great importance of calling public attention to the necessity and propriety of establishing a tri-monthly line of mail coaches from some point on the Gulf of Mexico, by way of San Antonio and El Paso, to San Diego, in California. This route is eminently the best and most practicable; free from the snows of winter and the withering heat of summer; passing through a salubrious climate and delightful valleys, and not endless prairies and scorching deserts of sand; encountering abundance of wood, water and grass, and not thirsty desert plains, and bleak barren mountains, burning as a furnace in summer, and frozen and ice-clad in winter; open and passable at all seasons, with every thing to cheer the emigrant and traveller, in rich soil and varied landscape; with no mountain barriers, no natural wall across its pathway, the route contemplated is superior for a great mail and emigrant road across the continent to any other north of it, and there can be none south passing through our own territory.

NEW PROPOSED STAGE ROUTE. The Austin (Texas) State Gazette publishes the report of a public meeting of the citizens of El Paso county, held for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of a tri-monthly mail coach line from San Antonio by way of El Paso to San Diego, in California.

"That they are deeply sensible of the great importance of calling public attention to the necessity and propriety of establishing a tri-monthly line of mail coaches from some point on the Gulf of Mexico, by way of San Antonio and El Paso, to San Diego, in California. This route is eminently the best and most practicable; free from the snows of winter and the withering heat of summer; passing through a salubrious climate and delightful valleys, and not endless prairies and scorching deserts of sand; encountering abundance of wood, water and grass, and not thirsty desert plains, and bleak barren mountains, burning as a furnace in summer, and frozen and ice-clad in winter; open and passable at all seasons, with every thing to cheer the emigrant and traveller, in rich soil and varied landscape; with no mountain barriers, no natural wall across its pathway, the route contemplated is superior for a great mail and emigrant road across the continent to any other north of it, and there can be none south passing through our own territory.

"The establishment of a tri-monthly mail line, on coaches, by this route, would tend greatly not only to develop the resources of Northwestern Texas, but would be the first active, progressive step in the establishment of the great Southern Pacific Railroad. It would direct public opinion to definitely settle down on the route which is marked by nature as the nearest, cheapest and best. It would form an active stream of travel across the continent, and unfold to light not only our great resources, but the practicability of the railway. It would be the cheapest and best means of transporting the mails, and we believe that a contract could be procured for carrying them tri-monthly, for what is paid by the government to the Panama mail steamers."

FROM THE PLAINS. We learn from Mr. Willis, who arrived in Oroville on Tuesday, Sept. 3d, says the Butte Record, that a very large number of cattle are on the way to California this season, and also that the stock generally is in fine condition.

IMPORTANT DISCOVERY. A correspondent writes to the Stockton Republican, under date of Sept. 1st, of an enterprising citizen of Angel's Camp, who went hunting on the 30th ult., and before he returned found a lead of quartz from which he washed \$700, at the rate of \$59 to \$75 to the pan.

IMPROVEMENTS. Forty fire-proof buildings have been erected—and in the course of erection, in this city during the present season, at an average cost of about \$5000 each, or a total of near \$200,000. We understand that the Messrs. Heslep will soon commence the erection of some fine fire proof buildings on their vacant lot on Washington street. The new brick church will probably be erected this season.

SOMETHING NEW. An entirely new business in California has been started in Sacramento within the last few days. It is the manufacture of fire-proof salamander safes, and will no doubt do away with the great importation of these articles. The factory is owned by Mr. J. Scott.

EARTHQUAKES. The Pacific Sentinel of the 6th inst. says: A shock of an earthquake was felt throughout this county and at St. Johns and Monterey at about nine o'clock on the evening of Wednesday week. Another severe shock was felt at about two o'clock on the morning of Saturday last; the shock was so hard that quite a consternation was created in some neighborhoods, and a general stampede of the inmates of several houses took place, which are described as being very amusing.
