BIGGEST, BESTEST LA CUMBRE GIVEN HIGH
PRAISE

"The best yearbook since the war!" That's the student reaction to the appearance this past weekend of the 1949 issue of La Cumbre, published annually by the Associated Students. The book is not only the best since the war, it is also the biggest, featuring 288 pages of photographic highlights of the 1948-49 year's activities.

The La Cumbre this year contains an index listing of the pages on which individual and group pictures appear. A further innovation is a listing of photography credits on page 284.

The cover of the 1949 La Cumbre contains a Kodachrome picture of the steps leading up to the quad, with the University of California, Santa Barbara College sign in the foreground. One of the most popular sections centers around student life, carried forward in a calendar presentation. Four pages of excellent photographs containing considerable numbers of students tell the story for each month of the school year. The editorial staff have successfully achieved their aim to make this annual appeal to a majority of the students by including full coverage of activities.

Students who have reserved their yearbooks may secure them at the Graduate Manager's Office. A few copies are still available to both students and faculty at \$3.50 per copy.

Students who compiled the La Cumbre worked under the direction of Larry Sanchez and George Outland, co-editors.

U.C.S.B.C. SCORES AGAIN

Represented by two of the finest track and field men in the United States, Delfs Pickarts and Willie Dancer, the University of California Santa Barbara College placed 16th out of 70 competing schools in the NCAA Track and Field meet held last weekend at Los Angeles.

Pickarts placed second in the javelin, with a new school record toss of 221', 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". This throw was the third best mark made in the country this year.

Dancer cleared 6' 4" in the high jump to place fourth. Previously this year, Dancer had cleared 6', 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for the UCSEBC record.

Both men, under the tutelage of Coach Nick Carter, will compete at the National AAU meet at Fresno this Saturday. Men who win the first three places in each event will be honored as members of the United States AAU team which will tour Norway, Sweden, and Finland later this summer. Competitive meets with amateur athletes of the Scandinavian countries are already scheduled.

Among the schools UCSEBC outscored in the NCAA meet in Los Angeles were California, Minnesota, Michigan, Princeton, Indiana, Oklahoma, San Jose State, Illinois, Oregon, College of Pacific, and others.
