State College Receives Word for N.Y.A. Men

Headquarters Okays Reports and Sends Checks to Students Directly

Nine Payrolls Throughout the 1935-1936 Year in Month Periods

Instructions and blank forms for N. Y. A. workers have just been received from the N. Y. A. headquarters in San Francisco by the Santa Barbara State college.

There will be nine pay rolls during the school year of 1935-36. The first month closed October 12. The second month began Sunday, October 13, and will close November 12. Thereafter, the monthly pay roll will cover the period from the thirteenth of one month to the twelfth of the next, inclusive.

Supervisors of projects should arrange the work so that the student's daily work shall not include fractions of hours. Where fractions of hours can not be avoided, decimals should be used and recorded to the nearest tenth. Thus, 50 minutes would be recorded as 0.830 minutes as 0.5. Daily entries of time amounting to less than one hour must always be preceded by a zero and decimal point.

Instead of checks being made out here, the pay rolls will be sent to N. Y. A. headquarters where they will be checked carefully, and individual checks will be forwarded to the students from there.

Shop Installs Print Machine

A new printing press was received last Friday by the print shop which now puts the printing department in high rating for efficiency and production, according to Ralph Porter, instructor.

The machine is a high speed automatic Vertical Miehle press. The production speed of the machine is 3,800 impressions an hour, with a maximum sheet size of 13½ by 20 inches. The press represents an investment of \$2,000.

A side of the print shop had to be taken out in order to install the new press. With the installation of the new equipment, an antiquated Colt Armory press was discarded.

"The purpose of securing this machine is to offer a wider scope of printing experiences to students who intend to enter the field of teaching," said Mr. Porter. "This also equips the shop more adequately for the vocational courses in printing now being offered by this institution," he concluded.

Landscape Students Build Gravel Walks

Under advisement of a local landscape expert, the new gravel walks leading to classrooms in Pine hall will be completed as one of the first projects of the landscaping class.

With the beginning of the rainy season, work on the walk will be hurried, to prevent the present muddy condition.

Amberg-Hurth Will Buy Student Work

Giving students an opportunity of working their way through college, the Amberg-Hurth gallery in San Francisco has offered to buy art work from the students in this school. Mrs. Mary E. T. Crosswell, head of the art department, recently received a letter stating that because of the good work done at State college they are offering to help students in this way.

Committee Calls Off Bonfire Rally

Plans for the annual bonfire scheduled for Homecoming week have been definitely cancelled.

"I regret the necessity of postponing this traditional event, but I think it would be impractical to stage two major rallies. We, of the freshmen class, urge student cooperation and interest in making the theater rally a great success," states Danny D'Alphonso, frosh president.

The bonfire will take place at a later date.

Relations Club Members Meet

McKelvey Offers to Act as Sponsor of Local Unit of World Group

International Relations club announced that its members would gather in a general introductory meeting for the purpose discussing plans for the organization. The meeting will be held in the auditorium, Tuesday noon, October 17, and all State college students that are interested in the group are invited to attend.

Raymond Goss McKelvey, who recently returned from a leave of absence after working on his Ph.D. in political science at Columbia university, has offered to act as faculty sponsor for the group.

World Clubs

These clubs which are in existence in all parts of the world are aided and chartered by the Carnegie Peace Foundation. At regular intervals, this foundation supplies each chartered group with the latest books dealing with international affairs, for the purpose of creating a more sympathetic understanding of world affairs.

Each year regional conferences are held to which the Carnegie Foundation sends speakers of national and international reputation to lead the group discussions of vital problems concerning the peace of the world.

State Host Last Year

The International Relations group of Santa Barbara State last November acted as host to the Pacific Southwest conference held at El Mirasol hotel which was attended by representatives from nineteen junior colleges and universities in Southern California and Arizona.

Senor Mario Santos, consul from Brazil; Lewis Brown, noted author and lecturer; and Hillis Lory, professor and world traveler, were the principal speakers for the occasion.

Confusion in Book Covers Is Result of Delayed Publication

Book Will Include the New Constitution, Names, Officers and Rules

Student handbooks will be on sale for the nominal sum of 15 cents next Tuesday during student body meeting and thereafter may be obtained in the student body office and from various salesmen on the campus, according to Don Follett, editor.

Due to confusion over the covers, the discovery of the impossibility of working out a suitable loose-leaf form and the general rush in the print shop, these books have not appeared before.

The handbook, a handy publication of 100 pages, will be printed in a convenient size with a white leatherette cover carrying the school insignia. It will include the constitution printed for the first time in its accepted form as well as names, addresses and telephone numbers of all students, a faculty directory, office data for all organizations, fraternity and sorority rules, names of members of A. S. B. governing bodies, songs and yells, campus customs and traditional social events.

The staff for the book is Don Follett, editor; Bob Moore, assistant editor; Alistair Anderson, Barney Jameson and Bruce LeClaire, statistics; and Virginia Moon, business manager.

Music-Art-Drama

Miriam Hopkins shows up again in black and white in "Barbary Coast" and until our mental images of the colorful Becky Shary were erased Mary Rutledge seemed quite bleached out. So much about color in films.

"Barbary Coast" should do much to redeem Miriam Hopkin's place as an actress after her none too brilliant appearance as Becky. Not that Miss Hopkins was at fault in that poorly dramatized story, but a star's reputation suffers after a poor show, and few deny that excluding color Becky Sharp was a poor show. This picture, however, is logically connected, well-photographed, and vividly portrays San Francisco's vicious "hobbies" during the gold rush days. Edward Robinson makes a debonair gambler-boss of Frisco; and Joel McCrea (of bathing trunks fame) fills the romantic hero's part in respectable masculine style.

Though the basic plot is neither original nor brilliant the treatment is interesting. But we would like to have seen the plot altered to permit roughening up spots where Louis became a bit soft and sentimental—even though the denouement had been less in the "happy-ever-after" rut. As it is, "Barbary Coast" is melodramatic, entertaining, and better suited to the likes of the box-office public which evidently does not care to pay for less fortunate endings.

Badly outplayed from the kick-off to the final gun, the Santa Barbara State Gauchitos were beaten by a fast-moving Cal-Poly eleven by a score of 31-0, in a game played Saturday afternoon on the northerner's field.

Score Touchdowns Early

The Mustangs kicked off to the frosh pigskinners. After two attempts into the line, Gardenhire punted to the Polytechnics. The punt was blocked, and recovered by Poly. In a series of line plunges through center, the ball was pushed to the one yard line. Sweeney, left-half, on a run around left-end, went over for the first score of the game. Failing to convert, the northerners again kicked to the Staters. After a fumble by Monson, the Gauchitos booted once more to the San Luis squad, who again blocked, and, with Dooley carrying the pigskin into the end zone scored the second time in the first five minutes of play. Dooley converted for the extra point.

On the third kick from the fifty-yard marker, State fumbled with Poly recovering, but after three tries for a first down, Dooley punted over the end zone. State was unable to gain, and the quarter ended with the ball on State's 22 yard line.

After several exchanges of punts, the half ended with neither team doing much damage.

Dooley Blocks Punt

Fumbles by the Mustangs and Gauchitos brought the scoring possibilities temporarily to a standstill early in the third quarter. Late in the period, Dooley, star fullback for the opponents, again blocked a State punt. Sweeney, in a run around right end, scored another six points for the O'Daniel's squad. The Polymen failed to convert. A pass from Gardenhire, intended for Monson, was intercepted by Sweeney, who galloped forty yards to put the ball over the end stripe for another six points. Conversion failed.

On an intercepted pass late in the fourth quarter, the Mustangs scored their final touchdown. Try for the extra point failed.

Voorhies Stars

Roy Voorhies, former all-valley tackle, played a bang-up game for State on both defense and offense. The big Gaucho broke through time after time to stop the Mustang carriers before they could get under way. Sweeney, former San Luis Obispo high star, showed up well for the Northerners, with his open field running.

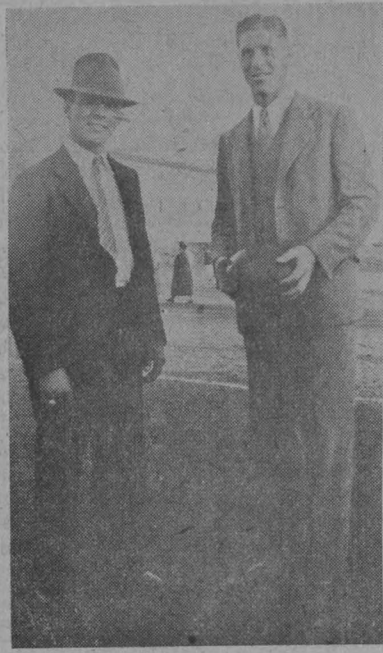

The unanimous vot of the judges was cast in favor of Varner, as he floored his opponent five times in winning the decision. Hernandez put up a tough battle, but it was evident the Arroyo Grande fly-weight was thoroughly outclassed by the local boxer.

YARDAGE GAINED UNDER AVERAGE

Individual yardage gained fell somewhat below the average in last Friday's game with U. S. C. Included in the tabulation are: Yards from running plays, passes, intercepted passes, and return of kicks.

"Rezy" Rezzonico, led the GaUCHO backs with a total of 33 yards in 6 plays for a 5 1-2 yard average. Yeager in 9 plays made 42 yards for a 4.7 yard average. Sanderson ran up 50 yards in 11 tries for an average of 4 1-2 per play.

Pollock also averaged 4 1-2 yards per play with a total of 36 in 8 tries. In one attempt each, Monson and Clemons made 12 and 3 yards respectively.

The Staters scored early in the second period, when, after several exchanges of punts the Barbarens drove 45 yards to the one yard line where Pollock, GaUCHO signal caller went over. Harold Sanderson kicked the goal for extra point.

The Hardermen scored again in the last quarter when a quick kick by Sanderson went out on the three yard marker, was fumbled by the Spartans and recovered by a GaUCHO. After two failures bucking into the line, plus a five yard offside penalty, "Snakehips" Yeager ran ten yards to a touchdown. This run by Yeager was termed by many as the best bit of open field running ever seen on a Santa Barbara gridiron. The try for the extra digit was not good.

Following this the Spartans opened up with a passing attack which was finally broke up on the GaUCHO seven yard line. "Lefty" Williams, former star of the Bakersfield J. C. under "Spud" Harder, did most of the passing and ball carrying for the southerners. His left hand pass flinging was one of the main high lights of the fray.

Harold Sanderson's kicking was outstanding. His punts and quick kicks kept the Spartans under fire throughout the evening. Doug Oldershaw, GaUCHO tackle, and "Mert" Miller center turned in a bang up game for the Staters. Both these boys stopped play after play for the Gauchos. "Rezy" Rezzonico, veteran halfback brought the stands to their feet several times with his tricky open field running.
