Prospective candidates are required to take a Constitution test Wednesday, Feb. 13. The exam, which will judge the student's knowledge of the UCSB Constitution, will be given in the S.U. Conference Room.

Elections are scheduled for Feb. 18 and 19 in Storke Plaza from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

AS officers serve as voting members on the Legislative Council. The Council also includes approximately 35 nonvoting members who are the heads of various committees and boards on campus.

The AS officers are the president, vice-president, sorority representative, fraternity representative, two women's RHA representatives, two men's RHA representatives, women's representatives - at - large men's representatives -at-large, and one men's and one women's non-affiliated representatives.

To be eligible to hold an elective office in any activity on the UCSB campus a student must be a registered undergraduate in the university for the term of the office. He must have carried a minimum load of 12 units with a C or better grade average the semester preceding his taking office. If the person is a student teacher the minimum unit requirement is eight.

Cellost Starker Featured Tomorrow At Granada

Cellist Janos Starker will be featured tomorrow in a performance of the Dvorak Cello Concerto at 8:30 p.m. in the Granada Theatre, Santa Barbara.

Tickets for students are \$1.25, a savings on the regular single ticket price range of \$2 to \$3.50. The box office number

is 2-1416.

Included in the orchestral portion of the program will be "Symphony No. 2" by Franz Schubert and "A Children's Symphony" by Los Angeles composer Eugene Zador.

Both Starker and the local symphony orchestra's director, UCSB's Dr. Erno Daniel, are natives of Budapest and graduates of the Royal Academy of Music. When Starker graduated Dr. Daniel was a member of the piano faculty.

After graduation Starker was engaged as solo cellist in the Budapest Philharmonic Orches-

Starker later performed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under Fritz Reiner. His performance of the "Prokofiev Cello Concerto" was described as "a performance of extraordinary beauty, of virtuosity, elegance and a moving reticence of style."

London's Gramaphone Magazine, which recently reviewed his performance of the "Dvorak Cello Concerto," said "with the appearance of the fabulous Mr. Starker, Casal's recorded performances, historic as they are, are put in the shade.

More than 900 incidents during January gave the campus police department's nine-man staff one of their busier months.

The police department's thick case log shows 924 reports for last month. Included were nine petty thefts, most of them from cars left unlocked in campus parking lots.

The police department office in Bldg. 427 is open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

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

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40 Slots Now Available For Fall 1963 Foreign

New openings for students from UCSB in the University Abroad Program at Bordeaux, France; Goettingen, Germany; and Padua, Italy, were announced recently by the Education Abroad

UCSB's quota for next year is a total of 40 students. Bordeaux will accept 20, and Goet-tingen ten. Those wishing to go to the University of Padua will be included in the group from

Requirements for applica-tion are a "B" GPA and four semesters of the language of the country with a "B" average. Deadline to apply for the pro-gram is March 4. The Educa-tion Abroad Office is located in

The Regents' action to increase the enrollment came from reaction to reports by President Clark Kerr. He said that the Bordeaux program, inaugurated last fall with 80 students was 'highly successful.' There was satisfying evidence that the exposure of University students to French students had achieved The Regents' academic and cultural expectations.

The program will include 100 students at Bordeaux, 80 at Goettingen, and 40 students at Padua.

According to President Kerr, the Regents' action to esstrong interest expressed by Governor Brown in a student exchange program, and from the University's long tradition of interest and activity in the field of international education.

UCSB has been designated as the major agency of the University to develop, guide and co-ordinate the study-abroad pro-

Kerr said The Regents recognized that the centers should strengthen a student's general education, his understanding of the modern world, and provide language training useful in teaching or later graduate work.


