## Embassy Representative

### DOBROSIELSKI, TO SPEAK ON POLISH FOREIGN POLICY IN SOUTH HALL TODAY

Professor Marian Dobrosielski, Counselor to the Embassy of the Polish People's Republic, will give a special lecture entitled "Main Problems of Polish Foreign Policy" in the South Hall Lecture Room at 3 p.m. today. His discussion will include problems of the Polish plan of creating an atom-free zone in Central Europe--the Rapacki Plan.

Before assuming embassy duties in 1957, Prof. Dobrosielski was a member of the Philosophy Department of the University of Warsaw and the Institute of Philosophy of the Polish Academy of Sciences.

He served with the Polish Army in France during World War II as a volunteer and participated in campaigns against Nazi occupation forces.

### Ph.D. in ZURICH

He received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Zurich, Switzerland in 1948. From 1948 to 1950, he was a member of the Polish Legation in Berne, Switzerland. He then returned to Poland as section chief of the press and information department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. In 1952-3, and 1958 he was a member of the Polish Delegation to the 7th, 8th, and 13th sessions of the U.N. General Assembly. He was elected secretary of the Polish Philosophical Society in 1955.

The award-winning Russian film, "Ballad of a Soldier," will be shown in Campbell Hall this Sunday at 7:30 p.m. The film is the story of the adventures of a young Russian soldier on a four-day leave to see his mother. Admission is 25¢ for students, faculty and staff.

UCSB'S DE CONDE WILL DISCUSS AMERICAN  
SECRETARY OF STATE ON TUESDAY

On Tuesday, June 26, Professor Alexander De Conde will lecture on "The Secretary of State in American History" in South Hall at 3 p.m.

Dr. De Conde's book on the same subject, "The American Secretary of State: An Interpretation," will appear this August from Praeger Press in New York.

The historian came to UCSB from the University of Michigan as a full professor in the fall of 1961. He is also the author of three books relating to American foreign policy and numerous articles in professional and scholastic journals.

In the spring of 1963, Scribner's & Co. will publish Dr. De Conde's 1500-page work on "American Foreign Policy: A History," which chronologically traces the complete history of U.S. foreign policy.

In addition to the University of Michigan, Dr. De Conde has taught at Stanford, Whittier College, and Duke University.

Dr. De Conde is a former Guggenheim Fellow, and a member of the American Historical Association, the Mississippi Valley Historical Association, the University of Michigan Research Club and the Historical Society of Michigan.

**"WHERE'S CHARLEY?," REVUE TO BE SEEN  
ON CAMPUS BEFORE FAR EAST TOUR**

A group of 18 talented actors and actresses will put on the plays and variety acts July 2-4 that will be seen across the Far East.

In a farewell appearance, the UCSB Players, directed by Dr. Theodore Hatlen, will present "Where's Charley?" and individual acts from the famous "Roadrunner Revue." The drama troupe will leave July 6 to tour schools, hospitals and bases in Japan, Formosa, and the Philippines this summer.

On July 2 the variety repertoire will be presented in Campbell Hall at 8:30 p.m. It consists of individual acts which will be used in places where there are no facilities for a full-fledged play to be staged.

"Where's Charley?" will be in the Little Theater on July 3 and in Campbell Hall on July 4, beginning both nights at 8:30 p.m. The reason for the change is to get the players used to different stage arrangements - something that will be changing constantly from place to place.

Student/faculty rates for the three nights are \$1.

**NSF MATHEMATICS INSTITUTE "BRUSHES UP"  
INSTRUCTORS ON TEACHING TECHNIQUES**

Fifty high school and junior college teachers from all over the U.S. and Canada are attending the National Science Foundation mathematics institute on campus this summer.

Directed by Dr. William Meyer, undergraduate mathematics curriculum head at the University of Chicago, the institute will run concurrently with the summer session.

The purpose of the institute is to give the selected teachers a mathematical background which will help improve their knowledge and teaching abilities when they return to their home districts.

Upon returning home, the teachers will conduct local math clinics using methods learned at UCSB during the summer. Similar NSF institutes are being conducted on over 100 campuses in the U.S. this summer.

The staff of the institute includes Director Meyer, Dr. David M. Merrill, associate director, and associate professor of mathematics, UCSB; Dr. Andrew M. Bruckner and Dr. Adil M. Yaqub, both associate professors of mathematics, UCSB.
