

Republicans Need Definite Platform

It is far from the role of this paper to become involved in national partisan political questions, but with a new presidential election but a short way off, it is imposible to ignore the statements of he men who would be our next leading citi-

It seems that the Republican party in general, and Republican hopefuls in particular, would take some notice of the lesson to be learned in the last election, when a planless party went down to one of the worst defeats in the history of the nation. The whole campaign was based purely on opposition to the New Deal, but offered absolutely nothing in exchange for the policies of the present administration. In short, the voter was not asked to choose between two plans of governmental action, it was the New Deal or nothing.

From the preliminary remarks of the men who aspire to the Republican nomination in the coming fray, it appears that the new campaign will be a duplication of the first. The same trite and meaningless remarks on allowing business to realize the full extent of its capacities without fear of governmental action, the same and equally meaningless statements on the necessity of balancing the budget and reducing expenditures, all are quite evidently unchanged since 1936.

This sort of a campaign will be as fruitless as the last. The people of the United States are looking for a way out of the mess into which a blind, do-nothing policy has led them, and they will choose that party which has something to offer. This does not mean that the democratic party is and will be in control through the fundamental excellence of its policies, but merely that it will be in control until the G.O.P. realizes that the age of "rugged individualism" has passed, and governments must plan for the Public welfare to gain the support of the people. Until they do realize this and do something about it, their cut of the political pie will be mighty thin.

Civil Liberties Hit At Several Schools

A murder somewhere over in Europe excited no interest on the Santa Barbara State campus. If the murder is in Los Angeles, it might cause some comment. But if it should happen in Santa Barbara, and a student be in some way involved, plenty of comment and excitement would ensue.

The same principle applies to civil liberties. Someone is retained in "protective custody" in Germany for saying Hitler is on a mental holiday. Chances are slight that we ever hear of it. Mayor Hague decrees an "I am the Law Policy." We read of it, but it is too far away to worry us much. The La Follette committee discloses "dirty work" among the Associated Farmers right here in the state where "the sun shines on the sun shine in the sun." More interesting.

But it has come even closer to home than that. In at least three colleges in California, charges that civil liberties are being denied have been made, and in at least on case, proven. And this, if nothing else, should move us to guard the liberties which we all hold so high: freedom of speech, press, religion and the others granted us in the bill of rights.

At the liberal and democratic University of California, a questionnaire was recently held in regards to the student newspaper, and it was alleged the ulterior motive was to gag that publication. At the Southern branch of the same university, a candidate for a high position on the school paper was ruled ineligible in a secret meeting because of alleged affiliations with American Student Union publicity.



Editor's Note:

You may recall a certain Mr. Herbert Hoover. Mr. Hoover, to refresh your memory once resided in the White House at Washington, D.C., holding the office of Chief Executive between the years 1928 and 1932. After 1929, the year of the great economic cataclysm, Mr. Hoover spent his leisure time in peering

around corners, looking for something called "Prosperity," apparently an elusive object, for the Republican forecast of two cars in every garage and two chickens in every dinner pail never quite came about.

Of recent days, Mr. Hoover has become newsworthy as the American head of the various drives for European relief. We do not know how Mr. Hoover achieved this position, other than the fact that his record during World War I was praiseworthy. Mr. Hoover's actions are commendable but we fear that



Realizing this, Mr. Hoover seems to have decided that the best way to get back in the good graces of the public, besides attacking the President and the New Deal, would be sponsorship of a popular cause. Finnish relief provided an excellent opportunity. The fly in the ointment that set up doubts in our mind as to Mr. Hoover's unselfishness was a small news about Mr. Hoover's campaign for raising funds in Chicago. In that mid-western city, with a population of some half million Poles, Mr. Hoover made no mention of the Freezing Finns but appealed on behalf of the starving Poles. Thus, in Chicago Mr. Hoover is the hero of a half million Poles while in Minnesota, the Scandinavians are certain that he is the savior of their Finnish brothers. The Finns, of course, are not in the least Scandinavian, but their geographical proximity to the Scandinavian peninsula and their similar customs have caused many Swedes, Norwegians and Danes to enlist in the Finnish cause.

After his adventure as a candidate in 1932, we would be inclined to think that Mr. Hoover would be sent into nervous prostration at mention of his placing his name on the ballot once more. If we were Mr. Hoover's best friend, which we are not, we would politely inform him that his reception by the American people in 1932 is an indication of his popularity. In the back of our mind, too, lurks the memory of an army of bonus marchers and the methods Mr. Hoover used to disperse them. Certainly, Mr. Hoover, not the "American way," to use the phraseology of your Republican coiners.

Human interest story of the week, we believe is the fire which last week dispossessed four local lads, carrying with it clothing, money and other articles. We can scarcely imagine having to sit home waiting for our single pair of socks to dry, or finding a home in which to sit to wait for our socks to dry. To get the boys started, a benefit is being given. The problem, it seems to us, is a much more pressing one than that of Finnish or Polish relief and takes precedence over any other charitable work going on at the present time.—S.C.
