Cal Poly Game Will Be Setting For Auditions



37% Of Students Call Campus Home

The Office of Housing Services has announced almost 37% of the students enrolled at UCSB this fall are living in campus residence halls.

Anacapa, Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa, and the fifteen Las Casitas halls have a total of 1,736 students.

The off-campus total is 2,972 and includes students living at home, with friends or relatives, in apartments, in sororities and fraternities, and those commuting from nearby towns.

There are 489 off-campus students living in sororities and fraternities, and 1,622 single students living in apartments.

UCSB has 439 married students this fall, 256 men and 183 women. Seventy-three couples are living in the new University Apartments for married stu-

In addition to students living in Isla Vista, Goleta and Santa Barbara areas, there are students commuting from Bakersfield, Carpenteria, Lancaster, maria, Solvang, Summerland, and Ventura.

Undergrads Show 17% Increase; Grads 32%

Undergraduate enrollment at UCSB has increased 17.1 per cent from last fall, while graduate enrollment has shown a 32.1 per cent increase, announced Chancellor Vernon I. Cheadle.

The final official tally of the fall enrollment shows 4,865 registered students. This is an over-all increase of 17.8 per cent. With this rapid rate of growth we will reach our planned maximum of 15,000 in about ten years," said the Chan-



Because they are without any means of transportation many students must walk long distances each morning from the Isla Vista area to campus. After having walked back to Isla Vista in the afternoon many of these same students again make the long trek to campus in the evening to study at the library.

The recent night attacks made on girls returning unescorted from the library makes this problem more urgent.

For the past few weeks I have been trying to find a feasible remedy, and have satisfled myself that there is one.

What I am going to propose to the Legislative Council and Administration this week is that the Associated Students operate a bus service to and from the Isla Vista area and campus. The University does have a

bus available that we could use

for this purpose. To pay for the salary of the driver (which

would be a part-time job for a student) and for gas and maintenance a nickel would be charged for a round trip ticket. If costs exceed the income from the fare, which I don't anticipate, the Associated Students could appropriate the difference for this needed service.

Hopefully, if there are no legal snags and the Administration makes the University bus available to us, in the next edition we will announce the times of departure and pickup points of the new Associated Students Bus Service.

There are some who say the cigarette companies are actualy ineffectual, that a college student can easily ignore them. If this is so, why have these companies persisted with these practices through the years? Their advertising experts seem to feel that these practices do work--why else persist with them?

Cigarette companies contribute heavily to our school paper through advertising, and give students prizes in the course of promotional contests. It is argued then that since some of the practices of these companies are advantageous to us we should reciprocate and allow the companies to have their way with our school's facilities. Is it worth it? Now that we have allowed these companies to move in on us further, we have no reason not to expect more and more flagrant misuse of the university in the future.

Now that Legislative Council has seen the result of its actions, I hope that it will revoke the privileges it has granted to these companies and never again allow them to engineer a similar promotion on this cam-

Yucca's losing cause was led by tailback Frank Murphy, halfs Lee Nelson and Dave Kruger, and ends Dick Watson and Steve Lawrence. The Yuccites never gave up and played aggressive ball to the last whistle, but just couldn't move the ball nor stall the Goleta attack. But then, the Yuccites are not alone in having faced the GBAC and meeting this dilemma. It has been so for two seasons.

In the consolation game for third place, Sigma Phi Epsilon came from behind an 18-6 halftime deficit to soundly thump Yuma Hall 32-18.

Dundas snagged three long passes to give the Sig Ep men the lead, and they were not headed from then on, Dick Lotts also contributed two tallies for the winners, one on a 70 yard interception return.

Stan Williamson Will Be Honored At USC Luncheon

UCSB Director of Athletics Stanley L. Williamson will be honored as a former University of Southern California football All-American Friday, Nov. 23 at the 12th annual Football luncheon, a traditional event each year on the day before the USC-UCLA game sponsored by Los Angeles Rotary Club No. 5

Williamson will be joined at the head table by USC Director of Athletics Jess Hill, UCLA Director of Athletics Wilbur Johns, opposing coaches John McKay (USC) and Bill Barnes (UCLA), and three other All-Americans from the two universities.

Williamson, who coached Gaucho football teams from 1941-56, and was appointed Athletic Director in February, 1962, was center and captain of the late Howard Jones' undefeated national champions Trojans of 1931, the same year that he won All-American acclaim. He won the Trojan Diamond Medal Award in 1931 and was selected to the USC Football Hall of Fame in 1957.



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Gauchos Lose Again, 14-8

By R. A. Walter The UCSB footballers fell to their seventh defeat of the 1962 season before a contingent of Redlands' Bulldogs by a score of 14-8 Saturday as only a small band of faithful Gaucho rooters were on hand as the invaders controlled the ball almost the entire game.

The Bill Hammer-led Gauchos came on strong in the second half only to have their hopes dashed by what appeared to be faulty time keeping. During one time out and one out of bounds play the running clock cut off any hopes of a last minute Santa Barbara drive to win the game.

As it was, however, the Gauchos could only manage one touchdown the entire night and the Bulldogs are trying to figure it out. Behind 8-0 at the beginning of the second half, UCSB

took the kickoff. As soon as the referee marked the ball ready for play, center George Dyer picked up the ball threw it to halfback Jim Fisher and he promptly ran for 25 vards. The whole Gaucho team had been on the right side of center Dyer and Redlands was in their huddle when the play started.

Carried by this momentum, Dawson threw a 25 yard pass to end Bill Peters for the score. Still continuing to confuse Redlands, the locals lined up in a kicking formation for the extra point. Dawson, however, passed the ball to Doug Fell to tie the game 8-8.

The Gauchos started to roll again, but on their next series of plays Fisher fumbled the ball and Redlands recovered to start them on the way for the winning touchdown. The Santa Barbarans were unable to contain quarterback Joe Cortez, tailback Don Robben, and fullback Bill Bryant as they collected 92, 72, and 90 yards respectively on the ground.

UCSB's Jim Fisher collected top rushing honors for the evening, however, as he gained 97 yards, the most that one person has gained for the Gauchos in one game this year.

Chris Dawson's passing also looked sharp after his long period of inactivity due to a broken leg. He hit for 58 yards including a touchdown and a conversion and may be able to break loose next week when Santa Barbara entertains the Mustangs of Cal Poly for the last game of the year and the last game for UCSB in the California Collegiate Athletic Association.

Mermen Drown Cal Poly For Second

This was the largest crowd to witness a UCSB water polo game this year, and it was only fitting that the home folks saw their team roll into second place behind Long Beach State.

When the final gun sounded, the Gauchos emerged with an 8-2 season mark and a 5-1 league record the best in the history of UCSB. But the fun wasn't over. After the game, Mike Schiesel and Captain Blair presented Coach Frank Rohter with a gift from the team, and the traditional dunking followed.
